Founded in November 1991, EHF has shown vigorous development from its very first hour.

This is reflected by the Annual Reports of the years 1991 through 1995, the development of its financial and human resources and, especially, by the echo from the media.

The EHF Committee, entrusted by the Congress with directing European handball affairs, has discharged its duties by holding Committee meetings, serving on working groups, conducting numerous one-to-one talks, attending official functions and representing European interests in the International Handball Federation. Day to day business has been handled in close co-operation with staff at the EHF headquarters in Vienna.

Special attention has been devoted to project work with the aim of sharing member Federations' resources and integrating partner federations.

Development, communication, mini-handball and beach handball projects/working groups as well as other working group activities such as time table co-ordination, transfer administration, referee training, etc. are designed to serve the organisation and the further development of handball in Europe.

The rapid rise in expenditure on activities such as competitions, methods and development has been offset by increased income from marketing as audiences have grown and media coverage expended in response to a continuous sequence of competitions.

As EHF President and on behalf of the entire Committee I wish to mark the 1996 Congress by thanking all Commission members and the General Secretariat for their fruitful work.

I also wish to express special thanks to our partners in the Member Federations, in business and in the media. It is only due to their commitment as players or officials, referees or delegates, in advertising or in the media that handball is able to maintain and further expand its position in international sports.



The Technical Commission and - since the division implemented at the 2nd Ordinary EHF Congress in 1994 - the Competitions Commission have been engaged in developing competitions since the foundation of EHF.

Activities have comprised direction of EHF competitions such as Youth and Juniors', Women's and Men's European Championships plus the respective qualifications and, in particular, some 500 games played annually in the European Cup, including timetable planning, appointment of referees and delegates, and ruling on disciplinary matters in the first instance.

Good preparation and on-the-spot management of European Cup and European Championship qualifications and final tournaments have been one of the Competitions Commission's key concerns.

Beyond this, further needs have been met through the development of mechanisms and courses for referee training and in respect of delegates.

All of these duties have been performed through competent and harmonious co-operation between Commission members and responsible EHF Office staff, and in consultation with the Committee and the Methods Commission.

The Commission hopes to have performed its duties as a provider of Competitions services and thanks for the support and assistance received.



## Methods Commission

## Report President



Claude Rinck/FRA MC President

Following a decision of the 94 EHF Congress in Antibes/FRA the EHF Technical Commission was devided into two branches in May 1994, one being the EHF-Competitions Commission (CC) and the other being the EHF-Methods Commission (MC). Janusz Czerwinski as well as Jesus Guerrero also belonged to the Technical Commission from 1992 - 1994. Within the past two years the following projects have been started or carried out:

#### 1. EHF Periodical for Coaches and Lecturers:

In 1994 and 1995 altogether four numbers were issued by EHF (two each year). With the 4th number (2/95) we tried to improve both lay-out and concept. The responsible MC-member for contents is Janusz Czerwinski. In the future we will try to include also contributions dealing with competition questions based on an agreement with the EHF-CC. At least 2 numbers a year are planned for the next EHF period.

#### 2. Mini-handball:

Starting the EHF Mini-handball Project in 1994 (European Day of Mini-handball on October 1st, 1994) many different countries have been provided with both promotion material and adequate balls. Since that time national activities in our member federations, also supported by our lecturer system, have been considerably increased.

#### 3. Beachhandball:

Within the last few years Beachhandball has become more and more popular in many countries. This is why the EHF wants beachhandball to become an integral part of handball. An EHF Working Group, presided over by Jesus Guerrero, worked out Rule Recommendations, documented in a beachhandball guide and video which will be both provided to our member federations.

#### 4. EHF Concept for Coaches' Education:

Based on a document of the European Union (EU) an EHF Working Group, presided over by Ton van Linder, worked out a proposal concerning a coaches' education in 5 levels to be discussed by our member federations.

#### 5. 96 EHF Top Coaches' Seminar:

The 1st EHF Top Coaches' Seminar with 40 participants and 8 lecturers was held in Paris Bercy / FRA in March 96 with the support of the French Handball Federation.

Finally I would like to emphasize the excellent co-operation not only within the EHF-MC and with H. Höritsch but also with the EHF Committee.

Report Chairman Since the foundation of the EHF in 1991 the Arbitration Commission has not only limited its activities to administering justice in all cases which have been submitted to its competence, the Commission also participated in the elaboration of the punishment proceedings as well as of the Arbitration Regulations of EHF.

Furthermore the Arbitration Commission has made regular proposals concerning improvements which as experiences showed, have become necessary.

One of the main activities of the commission in the past four years has been the problem solving in connection with international transfers, a fact which clearly shows the necessity of having new and better transfer regulations. In this connection the president of the Arbitration Commission took part in the EHF Working Group "Transfer", being in charge of the elaboration of proposals for new transfer regulations.

A historical event in international sports took place in 1995, when the EHF Arbitration Commission first allowed video recordings for its argumentation. It should be clearly stressed that it only depends on the decision of the Commission if it is necessary to do so in the future.

Last but not least I would like to thank my colleagues in the commission for the good job they have done during the last four years as well as the EHF office for its collaboration and support. I would also like to thank all National Federations for their comprehension and appreciation of the commission's work.
