DRAW PREVIEW

Fresh faces, new venues and a chance to break a world record are only some of the aspects heightening the anticipation ahead of this draw for EHF EURO 2024.

Despite its long tradition of hosting major handball events, Germany will be hosting an EHF EURO for the first time, with matches taking place in six host cities; Berlin, Dusseldorf, Mannheim, Cologne, Munich and Hamburg.

Dusseldorf will be the focus on May 10, as not only does the draw take place at 17:45 CEST for the preliminary round, but we will discover who shall face Germany in the opening match at the Merkur Spiel-Arena in the same city.

MEN'S EHF EURO 2024

10-28 JANUARY

With a capacity of 50,000 at the Merkur Spiel-Arena, the opening game is expected to set the world record attendance for a handball match; the ideal spectacle to showcase the passion for handball in Germany and around the continent.

We could potentially see a newcomer to the EHF EURO take on the hosts in the opener, as the Faroe Islands, Georgia and Greece have all qualified for the senior men's European competition for the first time.

The opportunity for new nations to qualify is partly down to the decision to expand the tournament to 24 teams in 2020. This will be the third EHF EURO to feature 24 participants.

As well as rookie teams, many of the more established nations booked their tickets to Germany, too, with some doing so in great style.

Three nations managed to qualify with six wins from six in qualifiers phase 2; current Olympic champions France maintained a 100 percent record in group 8, as did Portugal and Austria in groups 1 and 4, respectively.

Taking nothing away from France's achievement, maximum points for Portugal and Austria was possibly more unexpected. Surely all three teams will want to be avoided in the draw, though.

The four teams who qualified automatically faced each other in the EHF EURO Cup, where Denmark took the crown on goal difference ahead of rivals Sweden after beating them on the final matchday. Spain edged Germany for third place.

DRAW PROCEDURE AND POTS

The 24 teams qualified have been seeded in four pots of six teams based on the results of the EHF EURO 2024 Qualifiers and the ranking of the EHF EURO 2022.



At the draw, these 24 teams will be drawn to six groups of four for the preliminary round. Germany have already been seeded in group A which will start the tournament in Dusseldorf (opening match) and Berlin.

Croatia are seeded in group B in Mannheim; Iceland start their campaign in group C in Munich. Norway have been placed already in group D in Berlin; EHF EURO 2022 champions Sweden head group E in Mannheim and world champions Denmark group F in Munich. The first two teams of each group qualify for the main round.


The final tournament draw will be streamed live on EHFTV and the EHF's Youtube channel.

AMBASSADORS READY TO WELCOME THE WORLD

For the first time at the 2024 edition, the host cities of an EHF EURO will be represented by their very own ambassadors, who will be showcasing the best their handball-mad cities have to offer.

Legends of the sport will be involved in the project, including former German internationals from both the men's and women's teams, such as Dominik Klein in Munich, Emily Bölk in Dusseldorf and Hamburg's duo of Anna Loerper and Johannes Bitter.

But it will not be all about the great and the good of the handball world; for example, legendary Germany wing Uwe Gensheimer will be showing off his native Mannheim alongside comedian Bülent Ceylan, who, like Gensheimer, is used to performing at the SAP Arena.

Gensheimer said of Ceylan, "He is an outstanding representative of Mannheim throughout Germany, everyone knows him, and thanks to him, everyone also knows the Mannheim dialect." It seems like there is no one better to represent the group B and E venue than these two!

More commonly associated with football, television presenter Laura Wontorra will be an ambassador for the final venue, Cologne, as she teams up with Markus Baur, Germany's 2007 World Championship-winning captain.

Baur, like all the ambassadors, is ready to inspire and be inspired by the EHF EURO, calling it a "super great, gigantic honour and task. It's a huge thing for me, I think it's great."



EHF EURO 2024 VENUES
