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INTRODUCTION



The 16th edition of the Men's EHF European Handball Championship, the EHF EURO 2024, will be hosted by Germany from 10 to 28 January 2024.

For you, the media, the EHF Media and Communications Department has prepared this media guide to provide a comprehensive overview of all 24 teams participating. It contains an extensive summary of all records of players and teams, head-to-head statistics for the six preliminary groups, tournament history, and media contacts for each of the competing national federations. You can also find seven player profiles and the head coach profile for each team.

The defending champions from Sweden start in group E in Mannheim. After winning their first title for 20 years in 2022, Sweden will be determined to go deep into the tournament once more. Find out about the squad on page 103 of the media guide.

Spain missed out on becoming the second team in history to win three consecutive titles in 2022, but did pick up another silver medal to add to their extensive trophy cabinet. The Hispanos have reached every final weekend at the EHF EURO since 2012 and showed with 2023 World Championship bronze that they have the quality to get there again, by first progressing out of group B in Mannheim. Read about the team on page 49.

World champions Denmark won their first European medal for eight years in 2022 when they defeated Olympic champions France in the bronze medal match. They start their 2024 campaign in group F in Munich. Find about their squad on page 121.

Hosts Germany had a good tournament in 2022, finishing seventh, but they certainly have their eyes set on the final weekend in Cologne this time around. Their group A, including France, North Macedonia and Switzerland, begins in Dusseldorf in front of world record-breaking crowds of more than 50,000 before moving to Berlin for the rest of the preliminary round. Three teams are set to make their EHF EURO debuts in Germany: the Faroe Islands, Georgia, and Greece. The Faroe Islands are in group D alongside 2020 bronze medallists Norway, Slovenia, and Poland. The Faroese team are profiled on page 97 of the guide.

Georgia have a tough group, drawn against Sweden, the Netherlands and Bosnia and Herzegovina in group E – discover more about them on page 115. Greece face Denmark, Portugal and Czechia in group F. You can learn about the squad on page 133.

Throughout the Men's EHF EURO 2024, the EHF Media and Communications Department will continually update the media with results and news relating to the tournament.




The journey through Germany includes stops at the Mercedes-Benz Arena in Berlin, SAP Arena in Mannheim, and Olympiahalle in Munich for the preliminary round; Cologne and the Barclays Arena in Hamburg for the main round; and back to Cologne for the final weekend.

MEDIA SERVICES

ACCREDITATION

The accreditation centre opens three days before the first match and you can collect your accreditation there. If you have indicated another venue on the accreditation platform than the one you will actually collect it at, it will not be a problem. See exact dates and opening hours in competition venues (pg. 8).

TRANSPORT

Discounted train tickets

The official event partner Deutsche Bahn is offering discounted train tickets for all media representatives travelling to the six playing venues by train.

A special fare has been arranged at a fixed price of €28.90 (2nd class), or €38.90 (1st class) for inter-city commutes to and between the six host cities (Dusseldorf, Cologne, Hamburg, Mannheim, Munich and Berlin). The validity period for the discounted tickets is from 8 to 30 January 2024. Please note that tickets cannot be cancelled or exchanged.

If you are travelling to your first venue by train from anywhere (e.g. from Stuttgart to Dusseldorf), please use one of the documents available here for the respective venue and print it out. You will have to show this to the ticket inspector in the train. This document is only valid for your first travel when you still do not have your accreditation.

For all travels between the venues and after the end of the EHF EURO, you will need your accreditation as a proof of validity.

Free public transport

The German Handball Federation and the host cities have secured free public transport in all six host cities for all media representatives. Free public transport will be available only with a valid media accreditation.

PARKING

All media representatives could have applied for a parking permit in each of the playing venues of the Men's EHF EURO 2024 until 19 December 2023.

Media parking places in all venues are limited and the principle of priority and "first come - first serve" basis applied. The priority is given to the persons with disabilities and the photographers & TV crews with heavy equipment.

With sustainability as one of the most important pillars of the upcoming event, the EHF and the German Handball Federation encourage media representatives to make use of the free public transport and discounted train tickets to arrive to the venues.

CATERING

The media centre offers a snacking table for free with hot and cold drinks, sandwiches and light snacks at all times.

Warm meals for media representatives will be served between the matches. Exact times will be communicated in the media centre.

TECHNOLOGY

Media Wi-Fi is available in all media areas: connection information is available at the media welcome desk at the media centre.

Cable connections are available in the media centres as well as on the media tribune and photo positions in the court surrounding area. Should you have any issue with the internet connection, the LOC media team can help you.

LIVE STREAMING

All matches will be available live and on-demand via the EHF's official OTT platform, EHFTV, with geo-blocking applying in selected countries. Check *TV Guide* to find the full TV schedule and your local broadcaster.

LIVE TICKER

All matches will be available on the live ticker with up-to-the-second updates. The service can be accessed via the official website *ehfeuro.eurohandball.com*.

STATISTICS

The official line-ups, half-time statistics and final statistics after each match will be provided for all media representatives. Statistics will also be available at the media centre. Statistics will also be distributed to the media seats, photographer positions and TV studios.

To promote sustainability, the EHF and the Organising Committee urge media representatives to use the official website for statistics and request as little printed material as possible. QR codes leading to the official website and statistics will be available in the media centre and media tribune.

ONLINE COVERAGE

Full coverage will be provided on the official website at *ehfeuro*. *eurohandball.com* in English as well as on the event's social media channels. Official hashtags are #ehfeuro2024 and #heretoplay.

MEDIA OPERATIONS

MEDIA CENTRE

The media centre is the central working space for media at the venues. It is open on match days as well as on non-match days.

It is composed of the info desk and the work room for both media and photographers.

The info desk is located at the media centre, where you can find all the information you need on information boards as well as stats and match information. The LOC media team is at your disposal to help you with:

- Media bag collection
- Photo bib collection
- · Documents printing on demand

Several online tools are available:

- EHF media portal (communications, stats, flash quotes, etc.): https://bit.ly/Media_Portal
- Shared training calendar: contains days, times and venues for team training sessions, updated in real time: https://bit.ly/MEURO24_trainingschedule
- Media calendar: Available within the Media Portal and updates in real time. It will feature all media activities organised by teams, the EHF and the organising committee

All the matches taking place at the other venues, on match days will be broadcast at the media centre.

Please note that media cannot book or reserve a position in the media centre.

PRESS CONFERENCE

The press conference starts 20 mins after the end of the match, apart from the final and bronze medal match: it will start 20 mins after the end of the medal ceremony. Press conferences will feature coaches of both teams.

- Opening words and welcome media
- Statements from coaches should be made in the following order: coach winning team, coach losing team
- Open floor to journalist questions (in English)
- Close official part of press conference
- Open floor to questions in language of two teams (coach/players may leave if there are no questions for them)

Questions may only be asked during the press conference, TV interviews in the press conference room/media centre are not permitted after the end of the press conference. Any TV interviews can only be carried out in the mixed zone.

MEDIA TRIBUNE

Wi-Fi, cable internet and power outlets are available on the media tribune. For any assistance, get in touch with the volunteers, LOC media manager or EHF media supervisor.

Please note that media cannot book a position in the media tribune. In case of high interest, seating plan can be implemented. Priority will be given to the EHF media team, major agencies, team media staff and national media of the teams playing.

MIXED ZONE

The mixed zone is a mandatory post-match procedure. Teams must go through immediately after the final whistle, even though they have no obligation to speak to the media. If a player is asked to go to a TV studio, he will do so before going through the mixed zone. Head coaches will only

go through the TV/radio part of the mixed zone (for right holders – RH1 & RH2, radio RH). The rest of the media (written press/NRH) will have the opportunity to speak to the coach at the press conference or after.

MEN'S EHF EURO 2024

10-28 JANUARY

The mixed zone is accessible to all media except photographers. It is possible to interview the teams, but please note that only TV rights holders and non-rights holders have the right to film. This is valid for any kind of filming (camera, mobile phone, tablets, DSLRs). All filming equipment needs to be labelled with a sticker provided by Infront Venue Managers. The placing order in the mixed zone is as follows:

- TV Right holders (RH1, RH2)
- Non-rights holders
- Radio
- Written press

TRAINING SESSIONS AT / OUTSIDE COMPETITION VENUES

Team training sessions can be held at the competition venue or in training halls outside the competition venue.

Please refer to the shared calendar.

- Training at the competition venue is open to media for the first 10 minutes
- The team decides if the rest remains open to the media or not. If not, the media must vacate and go to the media centre (according to opening hours)
- TV studios are allowed to continue working in the arena and to film provided they do not directly film the training
- Training sessions outside the competition venue are not open to the media unless the team also decides to invite the media to the training venue

MEDIA OPERATIONS

NON-RIGHTS HOLDERS

Non-rights holders do not have the right to film/record audio in the competition venue, apart from the mixed zone and press conference. Any infringement to that rule will be handled by Infront and the EHF.

MEDIA CALLS

All participating teams are required to hold a media call for the international media on match day -1 before the preliminary and main rounds.

The media calls can be held online and with physical media presence. In case teams wish to organise a media call with accredited media physically present, these media calls may take place in the team hotel and arena immediately before or after a training session of the team in question, i.e. in the mixed zone or adjacent to the playing court.

In case teams wish to organise an online media call, direct connections will be shared through email news service.



SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

PHOTO OPERATIONS

BIB

In order to photograph you have to wear your photo bib at all times, as well as your accreditation. You can collect your photo bib at the info desk on the media tribune with an ID or your press card and a deposit. Please have the exact amount of money for the deposit (€20 or equivalent in local currency). You can pick up this document and the deposit when you return your bib. It is forbidden to wear team or country outfits and we kindly ask you to wear an outfit as neutral as possible.

Photographers are not allowed to exchange bibs with other photographers. Once the bib has been taken, it needs to be kept until the end of the respective photographer's stay at Men's EHF EURO 2024. If the photographer is changing the venue after the preliminary or main round, the bib must be returned at the venue and the new one will be obtained in the next venue.

PHOTO POSITIONS

Photo positions are located behind the goals. You must wear your accreditation and your bib to be able to access them. Photographers are requested to take their places in the photo positions ahead of the start of each game.

It is mandatory to remain seated during a match and it is forbidden to enter the field of play. Changing sides is only possible at half-time and it is forbidden to cross the field of play to do so: the adequate routing will be presented in the photo briefing.

If needed, a photo positions plan may be implemented. Please note that photographers cannot book or reserve a photo position. Priority will be given to the EHF photographers, major agencies, team photographers and national media of the teams playing.

MIXED ZONE AND PRESS CONFERENCE

Photographers are not allowed to access the mixed zone.

Photographing the press conference is allowed, however only if using the camera platform and provided there is enough space and it does not trouble the cameras in place.

LOCKER

If you would like a locker, you may register at the info desk at the media tribune: a key will be given to you, which we kindly ask you to return before you leave.

Presentation

At an EHF EURO, the administration of justice is in the hands of two bodies, the Disciplinary Commission and the Jury. The Disciplinary Commission constitutes the body of first instance, whose decisions can be appealed to the Jury acting as a body in second instance. Both instances together may also be referred to as the ad hoc bodies. Both ad hoc bodies are composed by members of the Court of Handball and Court of Appeal acting as ad hoc bodies.

Composition

To rule upon a case, each panel is composed of a Chairperson and two members. The President of the Court of Handball, acting as the Chairperson in all cases, nominate two members among its commission's members and ensure the independence and the impartiality of the decisions rendered by the legal bodies. For example, if a case arises from a match between Denmark and Serbia, members of the Disciplinary Commission or the Jury from these two national federations, as well as the nationality of the delegates and referees of that game, will not be part of the deciding panel.

Competence

The ad hoc bodies are competent to settle protests filed in by participating teams, cases relating to regulations infringements and disciplinary situations such as direct disqualifications.

Handling

Regardless the nature of the situation, proceedings are handled following an express procedure to comply with the need of quickness and effectiveness inherent to an EHF EURO. For example, to ensure the balance of the competition, decisions relating to a direct disqualification are rendered before the next match of the concerned player and team.

Despite winning gold at the World Championship and Olympic Games recently – in 2017 and 2021, respectively – France have not been able to lift the trophy at a European championship since 2014.

If you only look at the statistics, things do not look too encouraging. It has been 16 years since "Les Bleus" were able to step on the podium at a EHF EURO in Olympic years. Last time, their trip to Trondheim for the EHF EURO 2020 turned into a disaster, with an elimination in the preliminary round and a coach replacement a few weeks later.

Things seem much more stable now than they were four years ago. Guillaume Gille has now found the core of his team, relying on some of the best players in the world. Just think about the potential of a roster made of Ludovic Fabregas, Dika Mem or Nédim Rémili, to which you would add the experience of the Karabatic brothers. To be honest, the potential seems endless.


But now is the time to translate it on the court. Results have been gradually improving since 2020, with an Olympic title in Tokyo in 2021, as well as a silver medal at the last World Championship. The motivation will be high in the French team to finally prove the statistics wrong, as well as to offer a last EHF EURO medal to Nikola Karabatic.

Karabatic has won the competition three times already, in 2006, 2010 and 2014, but the French superstar will be playing for the last time in Germany in January, before retiring at the end of the season. With a roster so talented and such a big motivation, no need to say that France are aiming high this time again.





GERMANY



For the first time in history, Germany are the hosts of a Men's EHF EURO – and therefore have a special anticipation, but also pressure for their 15th participation at the final tournament. Since 2016 – when they were EHF EURO champions and Olympic Games bronze medallists - Germany have not won any more medals at major tournaments. Now, it is the big hope and dream of the rejuvenated team to make it to at least the semi-finals on home soil.

Some experienced players such as Uwe Gensheimer and Hendrik Pekeler have quit playing for the national team, while other experienced players like Paul Drux or Fabian Wiede are ruled out of EHF EURO 2024 with injuries. But a new generation of stars have arrived in the German team: after Julian Köster and Juri Knorr (both 23 years old) made an impact at previous major tournaments, five players of the provisional squad are even younger – and became U21 world champions last summer in Germany. Goalkeeper

David Späth, World Championship MVP Nils Lichtlein and All-star Team line player Justus Fischer have good chances to be part of the EHF EURO 2024.

Knorr, goalkeeper Andreas Wolff and line player Johannes Golla are supposed to be the leading figures. All three were part of the All-star Teams at EHF EURO 2022 or the 2023 World Championship. Having been nominated on his 24th birthday in November 2021, Golla is the youngest ever team captain of the German team. Directly qualified as EHF EURO 2024 hosts, Germany played the EHF EURO Cup – and lost five of six matches against Denmark, Sweden and Spain. Despite those results, head coach Alfred Gislason is confident of his team playing a strong role in the tournament, boosted by the fans in the sold-out arenas.

In 2004, Germany became the first nation to win the full set of silverware at Men's EHF EURO events, winning bronze in 1998, silver in 2002 and gold in 2004 - but then it was not until their victorious event in Poland in 2016 to win a medal (gold) again.

- was the German hero at the victorious 2016 EHF EURO, saving more than 50 per cent of all shots faced in the final against Spain

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

The Macedonians secured a place at EHF EURO 2024 after finishing second in the qualifiers behind Portugal in group 1. The final tournament in Germany will be the team's seventh consecutive EHF EURO and additionally, Kiril Lazarov's third major tournament at the helm of the national team.

The Red and Yellows are placed in group A at EHF EURO 2024. Lazarov's men will have an incredibly difficult task to secure progress to the main round as they face the reigning Olympic champions France; hosts Germany; and the ambitious Switzerland.

The core of the squad has drastically changed over the past couple of years with Stole Stoilov and Filip Mirkulovski drawing the curtain on their illustrious playing careers and Goce Georgievski calling an end on his time with the national team.

Lazarov was tasked with conducting an inevitable as well as a necessary generational change and a lot of young and talented players have joined the senior squad. However, the

experienced captain Nikola Mitrevski is still part of the fold to help Lazarov's young guns and the same goes for Zharko Peshevski, Filip Taleski and Filip Kuzmanovski.

In a country where handball is the undisputed number one sport, there are always high expectations when it comes to the national team, and with the legendary Lazarov at the helm, the Macedonians will hope for a higher finish than 22nd at the EHF EURO 2022 and 27th at the 2023 IHF Men's World Championship. However, their continuity and stability is reflected in the fact this is their 13th major tournament in a row.

The passionate Macedonian supporters will undoubtedly be present at the opening match in Dusseldorf and afterwards in Berlin to support their favourites from the stands in hope of matching or bettering their all-time top result of fifth place, achieved in 2012.

SWITZERLAND



After missing out on the 2022 edition, Switzerland return to the EHF EURO final tournament in 2024. In recent years, the team has been making steady progress under head Michael Suter. Switzerland did qualify in 2020 and also competed at the 2021 IHF World Championship in Egypt, where they even reached the main round. In the EHF EURO 2024 Qualifiers, Switzerland defeated Lithuania and Georgia twice, while they displayed some interesting handball during their confrontations with Hungary.

A glance at their squad confirms that Switzerland belong at the EHF EURO 2024. Goalkeeper Nikola Portner and Lucas Meister won the EHF Champions League with SC Magdeburg in June 2023, and many of the nation's brightest young talents have made the move to neighbouring Germany to make progress and gather more experience. Talking of experience, Andy Schmid's will be key at EHF EURO 2024 for Switzerland one last time. The centre back, who competed with HC Kriens-Luzern in the EHF European League group matches this season, will be displaying his genius for the last time with his national team, having announce his retirement at the end of the 2023/24 season. Whoever can take pick up the torch in the forthcoming years remains to be seen, but for now, Schmid will remain the undoubted leader of this team.

In a group composed of France, Germany, and North Macedonia, Switzerland might be regarded the outsiders by many, by they have proven they can be dangerous opponents for any team, let alone in the inspiring surroundings of an EHF EURO final tournament.





Spain have been one of the most consistent teams – if not the most consistent – over the last six editions of the EHF EURO. "Los Hispanos" have made the semi-finals each time since 2012 and have won a medal in the past five editions, winning the title twice in 2018 and 2020, silver in 2016 and 2022, and bronze in 2014.

This era has coincided with the appointment of coach Jordi Ribera in 2016. He oversaw a great streak, with some excellent handball delivered by Spain over these years in an excellent playing system which worked wonders both in attack and in defence. Over the past five editions of the EHF EURO, Spain boast an overall 66 per cent winning efficiency in the competition.

For EHF EURO 2024, Spain will be once again one of the big favourites and will hope to create more magic in the preliminary round, where they face Romania, Austria, and


Croatia in Mannheim. They will hope to start the competition with three wins in a row, setting them up nicely for another semi-finals berth.

Players like Joan Cañellas, Gonzalo Pérez de Vargas, Rodrigo Corrales, or Adrian Figueras will surely bring the experience to the table, but overall Spain have plenty of talent, as well as experience, to challenge for the trophy once again, having featured in the last four finals of the EHF EURO.

"Los Hispanos" will rely once again on the same core, albeit an aging one, but with plenty of talent and experience at their disposal. And with the return of right back Alex Dujshebaev, who missed the 2022 edition with a shoulder injury, Spain are likely to be considered once again as main contenders in this edition of the European premium national team competition.



AUSTRIA



Austria are one of just three teams – alongside France and Portugal – who came through the Men's EHF EURO 2024 Qualifiers with a perfect record of six wins from six matches. The team of head coach Ales Pajovic will need to be at their very best again for the final tournament in Germany, where they face the likes two-time champions Spain and three-time runners-up Croatia in the preliminary round. Their tough group is completed by Romania, an opponent Austria have already met – and beaten – twice in the qualifiers.


The 2024 edition marks Austria's fourth straight appearance at the EHF EURO. Their debut came when they hosted the event in 2010 – but since then, Austria have failed to qualify only two times. Their fortunes at final tournaments have been varying: three times, Austria made it to the main round; in 2022, however, they suffered three straight defeats in the

preliminary round and finished 20th – their worst result at a European Championship. The same year, they faltered in qualification for the 2023 IHF World Championship.

Still, a closer look at Austria's squad gives them every reason to be hopeful for EHF EURO 2024. At age 27, team captain Nikola Bilyk, an EHF Champions League winner with THW Kiel, has arrived in the prime of his career; and the same goes for 28-year-old left wing Sebastian Frimmel, a key asset for OTP Bank - PICK Szeged who has grown into a more important role in the national team, too. Also, a new generation of talented players has become an integral part of coach Pajovic's team – most notably 23-year-old Lukas Hutecek, who can play left or centre back and who became Austria's top scorer at the 2021 IHF World Championship only one year after his debut in the national team.



Croatia qualified for their 16th EHF EURO in a row after exciting matches in qualification group 5. Croatians secured second place after two strong victories against Greece and Belgium and two well-fought duels against the Netherlands, ending in a draw and a defeat.

Croatia have never missed the EHF EURO and after three bronze and three silver medals, they are still dreaming about the only gold missing in their collection. Finishing eighth at the EHF EURO 2022 and ninth at the 2023 IHF Men's World Championship prompted new coaching changes.

Hrvoje Horvat was replaced by former Croatian player Goran Perkovac, who was part of the squad that won a bronze medal at their first-ever appearance at the EHF EURO 1994.


Perkovac introduced new additional young players to the team with an expansion of the base while keeping the core the same – the backcourt line of Domagoj Duvnjak, Igor Karacic and Luka Cindric.

Croatia hope to present a new style while bringing back their famous 3-2-1 defence into the mix and two young goalkeepers Matej Mandic and Dominik Kuzmanovic will welcome their first major competition having the main role.

Looking for another solid performance, with the first goal set to be in the main round, Croatia will try to overcome Spain at the start of the competition and later beat Austria and Romania. However, the hopes are high as the last EHF EURO 2022 marked their worst placement in 20 years.





ROMANIA



No team in the history of the EHF EURO has waited more time than Romania between two appearances. After making the cut in 1994 and 1996, when they won a single match each time, Romania needed 28 years to secure their next berth, but they finally did it after a plethora of failures.

It was far from easy, as Romania were the only team in the qualifiers to make it from the second spot with only four points, after conceding two losses against Austria and one each against Ukraine and the Faroe Islands, with the only wins coming against the latter two sides in Bucharest.

While lucky in the draw for the EHF EURO 2024 Qualifiers, Romania have drawn the short straw for the final tournament, as they will face perennial contenders Spain, an experienced and well-versed side in Croatia, and once again Austria, with their underdog status confirmed once again.


The lack of experience looks to be Romania's main issue, with the core of the team featuring in the domestic league, albeit several crucial players have been getting important minutes in the EHF European League Men this season for Dinamo Bucuresti and CSM Constanta, an important plus for the team's chances of delivering a surprise at the EHF EURO 2024.

Another big advantage is the coach, as Xavi Pascual returned on the bench after his previous stint, between 2016 and 2018, when Romania failed to qualify for any major international competition. A demanding and experienced coach, Pascual will have to do with what he has at his disposal, as he is striving to implement a system and build a better squad for the future, with plenty of the players being still some years away from hitting their prime.

Iceland were one of the big stories of the EHF EURO 2022, as they came close to clinching one of the semi-final places, only just missing out after a headline-grabbing campaign up to that point.

Iceland topped a competitive preliminary round group that included co-hosts Hungary, Portugal, and Netherlands — against all of whom Iceland won. The Nordic team finished third in the main round group that included back-to-back Olympic finalists Denmark and France. Iceland's record in that stage included their first ever EHF EURO victory against France, which was also their first win in an official encounter against the side since the London 2012 Olympics and France's biggest EURO defeat.

Iceland were exceptionally strong during the EHF EURO 2022 and took sixth place after three straight finishes outside the top 10, from 2016 to 2020. Iceland are looking

to replicate their biggest EHF EURO successes — two semifinals, in 2002 and 2010, with the latter ending in the bronze medal — and seem poised to do it. They only just missed out on the top four in 2022 and were impacted by a number of Covid-19 cases — a fact that proves their strength, as Iceland kept recording big results even as key players were sidelined and less experienced players stepped up.

On an individual level, Iceland's players have grabbed the spotlight in the last year. Three of them play for EHF Champions League title holders Magdeburg: Gísli Kristjánsson, Janus Smarason and Ómar Ingi Magnússon. Kristjánsson was MVP of the EHF FINAL4 2023 as Magdeburg took the title. Although Smarason transferred after the title-winning season, he was part of the 2023 IHF Super Globe victory alongside his two compatriots.

HUNGARY



EHF EURO 2022 did not end up the way co-hosts Hungary hoped. The team led by Istvan Gulyas received massive support from the Hungarian fans but could not make it past the main round, partly due to injuries.

Two years later, some things have changed. Chema Rodriguez, once assistant coach, has taken over the head coach position. And various players have gained additional experience at top level, playing for some of the best clubs in Europe. Dominik Mathe has been wearing the Paris Saint-Germain HB colours for two seasons, Miklos Rosta plays under Xavi Pascual at Dinamo Bucuresti, and Gergö Fazekas has developed into a key asset for Orlen Wisla Plock.

Will it be enough for Hungary to finally deliver? Usually among the pre-tournament favourites on paper, Hungary

have not made it to the semi-finals of a major event again since the London 2012 Olympic Games. And this handball-crazy country is eager for success.

Their preliminary round group at EHF EURO 2024 looks well balanced – with Iceland, Montenegro, and Serbia all being able to win points against each other.

In the qualifiers, Hungary suffered one defeat – at home against Georgia, but in that game many of the stalwarts were rested to give the young guns some playing time. Otherwise, they easily got past Switzerland and Lithuania, earning themselves the first place of the group.

With the bright individual talents showing up in their squad list, there are no reasons why Hungary should not be able to go far at EHF EURO 2024.



Serbia hope the EHF EURO 2024 will cap off all the hard work they have done in the last three years since Spanish coach Toni Gerona took over the helm. Failing to progress further from the preliminary round at EHF EURO 2020 after numerous problems and finishing 11th at the IHF Men's World Championship did not show the real power of Gerona's team.

Serbia, after winning the silver medal at the EHF EURO 2012, have not featured among the top teams since and the last time they sealed a main round berth was at the EHF EURO 2018 in Croatia. Thus, their main goal is to leave their mark in Germany.

They already showed what they are capable of in qualification group 2. Their successes included beating

Norway 25:24 and leaving Slovakia and Finland without a place in the final tournament; just as they defeated the 2020 Olympic champions France 27:24 and drew the return fixture 26:26 in the EHF EURO 2022 qualification.

With the core of the team the same in recent years, and their experienced players now being in their 30s, Serbia are eyeing at least main round participation. Their key could be defence backed by duo Dejan Milosavljev and Vladimir Cupara between the posts as they have one of the most well-balanced groups in the competition – Hungary, Iceland and Montenegro.

The Golden Lions reached the EHF EURO 2022 main round for the first time in Montenegro's history under the previous coach, Zoran Roganovic. They finished 11th, a record-high ranking at the European championships, and followed that up with an 18th-place finish at the 2023 IHF Men's World Championship.

However, Roganovic's tenure came to an end after the World Championship and the results in the EHF EURO 2024 Qualifiers did not go to plan, as they lost three of their last four matches. But, they still successfully booked a place at EHF EURO 2024 under the newly-appointed Vlado Sola after they finished as one of the best-ranked third-placed teams.

The Montenegro squad is a perfect example of experience and youth, with the likes of goalkeeper Nebojsa Simic, left wing Milos Vujovic and right back Branko Vujovic now joined by centre backs Radojica Cepic and Vasilje Kaludjerovic as well as right wing Luka Radovic who are eager to stake a claim on the international stage.

At the EHF EURO 2024 Montenegro are drawn in group C alongside Iceland, Hungary and neighbours Serbia. It will be a tough challenge for the Golden Lions, but they will certainly bring passion and the support of plenty of enthusiastic fans.



It was the EHF EURO 2016 where Norway saw their breakthrough international championship, as they went from 14th place at the previous edition all the way to the semifinals. After that fourth place in Poland, Norway secured their first EHF EURO medal in 2020. They ranked fifth in 2022.

Since 2016, Norway have firmly established themselves among the top teams internationally, as they also reached the World Championship final twice in a row, in 2017 and 2019. They were defeated both times, but the first medals were something to celebrate.

Aside from the medals won, Norway also qualified for the Olympic Games for the first time, placing seventh at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games.

There have been successes, but a while since a piece of silverware — Norway will be eager to improve on their most recent positions and be part of the medal fight again in

2024. The Scandinavian team qualified for this edition of the EHF EURO as winners of their qualifiers group, above Serbia, after a campaign that saw only one loss.

Although the Norway men's team features a deep bench of world-class backs and lethal wings in particular, there is one standout name associated with the side: attacking juggernaut Sander Sagosen.

Now 28 years old, Sagosen has enough caps to make him one of the most experienced in the side, yet his games played-to-goal ratio is unsurpassed in the current and most squads, with an average of over five goals per match. He was named in the EHF EURO All-star Team three straight times, was top scorer of the EHF EURO in 2020, and adds another three All-star credits when including the EHF Champions League and World Championships. His goal count for 2020, 65, is the record for most goals scored in one EHF EURO.

Slovenia hope they will get back on track after a disappointing EHF EURO 2022 outing. From 14th place at the EHF EURO 2016, to eighth place in Croatia 2018 and fourth place at the EHF EURO 2020 after losing a bronzemedal match against Spain, coming in 16th at the previous European championship downgraded their hard work.

As a consequence, head coach Ljubomir Vranjes was sacked and was replaced by legendary player Uros Zorman. Zorman became Slovenia's 12th head coach in their history and they are coming to Germany with a new vision and ambition.

Slovenia showed their new approach already in qualification, winning group 7 ahead of Bosnia and Herzegovina,


Montenegro, and Kosovo, losing only one match throughout. The squad is boosted with experience from back players like Jure Dolenec, Dean Bombac, Miha Zarabec, Aleks Vlah and impeccable wingers Blaz Janc and Gasper Marguc, together with some young talents.

This will be Slovenia's 14th appearance in 16 European championships. Zorman's players hope the EHF EURO 2024 will show they can compete with the best and give them a chance to fight for their first EURO medal since winning silver in 2004.





Poland start their quest to revive old glory under new leadership. After signing a five-year deal in March 2023, Marcin Lijewski enters his first major event as head coach at EHF EURO 2024. Lijewski's mission is clear: guide Poland back to where the four-time World Championship medallists and 1976 Olympic bronze winners once were – among the very best teams in Europe. Their last notable success was bronze from the 2015 IHF World Championship.


Lijewski has stepped in after Poland failed to deliver in three consecutive EHF EUROs. After making it to the quarter-finals of their 2016 home tournament, Poland did not even qualify in 2018 and had any medal hopes dashed soon in both 2020 (preliminary round) and 2022 (main round). Also, crashing out in the main round of the 2023 World Championship they co-hosted with Sweden was nothing short of a disappointment for Poland.

But if anyone knows how to win medals, then it is Lijewski. As a club player, he won the EHF Champions League with Hamburg in 2013; as a national team player, he helped Poland win silver at the World Championship in 2007 and bronze in 2009 while making the All-star Team as the tournament's best right back on both occasions.

Can he replicate the success as a coach? At least, Lijewski can work with a Polish squad that looks stronger than it has done for quite some time. Industria Kielce stars Szymon Sicko and Arkadiusz Moryto, both 26, are in the prime of their careers and will guide the team alongside experienced on-court leaders like Orlen Wisla Plock right back Michal Daszek and Paris Saint-Germain HB line player Kamil Syprzak. Poland look ready for the challenge in one of the toughest preliminary groups at EHF EURO 2024, which includes Norway, Slovenia, and the Faroe Islands.



The Faroe Islands are one of three teams making their EHF EURO debut in 2024. The successful qualification comes following concerted years of effort on the part of the Faroese Handball Federation to reach this point, after the team began to consistently participate in the qualifiers in 2020 — and since developed rapidly.

The concentration on developing the national squads has brought clear evidence of success: In men's competitions in 2023, the U19 national team debuted at the Youth World Championship and the U21 team returned for their second participation in the Junior World Championship, with both teams reaching the quarter-finals. Competing in slightly different age categories, the same squads debuted at the M18 and M20 EHF EUROs in the summer of 2022. On the women's side, the U19 team played their first Youth World Championship in 2022.

Handball is on the move in the Faroe Islands, and the qualification for the Men's EHF EURO 2024 is another big step. Two home wins in group 4, against Romania and Ukraine, were enough to secure the Faroe Islands the final tournament spot, as they were among the best third-ranked sides.

The Faroe Islands draw on key individual talents — and the future is bright, considering their standout players are all 21 or younger. The top scorers for the side in the EHF EURO 2024 qualifiers were Hákun West Av Teigum, Elias Ellefsen á Skipagøtu (both 21 years) and Óli Mittún (18). Skipagøtu was also the joint-top scorer of the Junior World Championship while Mittún grabbed that title on the youth level, and both received All-star Team nods. Mittún was named MVP of the M18 EHF EURO 2022.

The Faroese stars have caught the attention of big clubs, with Skipagøtu joining THW Kiel for 2023/24 while West Av Teigum went to EHF European League winners Füchse Berlin.





Since Glenn Solberg was appointed as the coach of Sweden men's national team in 2020, their consistency has been nothing short of amazing. Sweden finished second at the 2021 IHF Men's World Championship, fifth at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, won the EHF EURO 2022 and ended up fourth at the 2023 World Championship. Those results were a turnaround from a disappointing performance at their home EHF EURO 2020.

Solberg has been shaping up a strong team with a strong core of players led by stalwarts like Jim Gottfridsson, Hampus Wanne or Andreas Palicka, who came of age more or less at the same time.

At the EHF EURO, no team has won the title more times than five-time champions Sweden. Only Spain (nine medals) and Denmark (seven) have featured on the podium more times

than the Scandinavian side. But with a target on their backs after securing the trophy two years ago, Sweden will be once again one of the main favourites.

A mix of experience and the exuberance of youth from players like Eric Johansson will likely fuel the fire for Sweden once again. They will be heavily favoured to start the EHF EURO 2024 with three wins out of three matches against the Netherlands, Bosnia and Herzegovina and Georgia.

Next, tougher clashes against strong sides like Denmark might await. But Sweden made the semi-finals twice in the last three editions of the competition, and are one of the teams with the best winning efficiency in the European championships, having won 60 out of the 96 matches they played.

NETHERLANDS



Until 2020, the Netherlands never played a Men's EHF EURO final tournament. In 2024, they are a force to be reckoned with. EHF EURO 2024 marks the third straight participation for the Dutch team, who qualified in style by winning their group ahead of Croatia. The Netherlands remained unbeaten in the two qualifiers against the Balkan powerhouse, including a 32:27 home win. But in the same qualifying campaign, the team of head coach Staffan Olsson also showed they are still vulnerable at times, too.

Apart from a brief appearance at the 1961 World Championship, the Netherlands failed to make it to any major event for decades. But a few years after the women's national team started to make a name for themselves internationally, the men in orange followed suit. Their debut EHF EURO participation in 2020 stranded in the preliminary round, but two years later they made the headlines by downing co-hosts Hungary in their opening match and

silencing the 20,022-capacity crowd in the MVM Dome in Budapest. The Netherlands ultimately came up short against the likes of Denmark and France in the main round, but it was clear the team had made another step in their rapid progression.

"We can cause the top nations troubles, but we still have to take one or two more steps to become really part of the international top ourselves," said Olsson, who also led the Netherlands to their first World Championship berth in over six decades in 2023. At EHF EURO 2024, the coach aims for that next step with a squad that includes Paris Saint-Germain HB star Luc Steins alongside a range of Bundesliga players like goalkeeper Bart Ravensbergen, and Dani Baijens. Kay Smits, who is 2023 became the first Dutch player to with the EHF Champions League (with SC Magdeburg) will miss the upcoming EHF EURO due to a subacute myocarditis.

BOSNIA & HERZEGOVINA





Bosnia and Herzegovina enter their third straight EHF EURO and their fourth major competition in their history after participating at the 2015 IHF Men's World Championship, EHF EURO 2020 and EHF EURO 2022.

They are coming to the final tournament with their new head coach, Irfan Smajlagic. The legendary former Croatian player took over the helm in September 2022, succeeding Ivica Obrvan who left the team a couple of days before qualification for the 2023 IHF Men's World Handball Championship. After failing to qualify, Bosnia and Herzegovina entered a new era with Smajlagic.

With Smajlagic debuting in his new job right ahead of the qualifications for the EHF EURO 2024, Bosnia and Herzegovina struggled in the first matches against Montenegro and Slovenia, but they made a significant step forward in the rematches and with two convincing wins against Kosovo they finished second in group 7.


The 'Dragons' will once again rely on their most experienced players such as goalkeeper Benjamin Buric, his twin brother Senjamin on the line, Marko Panic and Mirsad Terzic. Still, there are a good number of younger players who are gaining experience in strong European clubs and also in the domestic league. That mixture could be Bosnia and Herzegovina's main force in a strong group with Sweden, the Netherlands and Georgia.

Still waiting for their first-ever win at the EHF EURO, Bosnia and Herzegovina are eager to make that happen and to top their two previous results at the European championship – 23rd place.



Georgia wrote handball history in 2023 when they qualified for an EHF EURO for the first time since gaining independency as a country three decades ago. At the Men's EHF EURO 2024, they will rub shoulders with some of the world's best teams.

Things all came down to one goal, though, as Georgia sensationally beat Hungary 31:30 in the last round of the EHF EURO 2024 Qualifiers, thanks to a last-second goal from Giorgi Tskhovrebadze. It marked their second win in the qualifiers and earned them a spot among the four best-ranked third-placed teams, securing them a ticket to Germany.

This qualification has not come out of nowhere, though, as Georgia have been making steady progresses in the last few years. They won the Men's IHF/EHF Trophy or the first time when hosting the tournament in 2021, when some of their talents arrived in the international spotlight.

Tskhovrebadze is the best-known player in the Georgian roster, having played for two-time EHF Champions League winners Montpellier HB in France and, on loan, for Pfadi Winterthur in Switzerland before moving VfL Gummersbach in the German in the summer of 2023.

Unfortunately, Georgia will arrive in Germany without another prominent name: left back Nikoloz Kalandadze, playing for Chambéry Savoie Mont Blanc in France, will miss the tournament injured.

Even if Georgia's squad hardly features any players over 30, they have been playing together for many years, also in the under-19 and under-21 national teams.

In a group with title-holders Sweden, Netherlands, and Bosnia Herzegovina, the main goal for Georgia will be to gather experience in their efforts to become a regular appearance at EHF EURO events in the future.

In global competitions, Denmark have been the team to beat lately, with three straight world titles and two consecutive appearances in the Olympic final — but the EHF EURO trophy has eluded the Scandinavian nation during what has been arguably the decorated side's most notable period of success.

Denmark came close to the top of Europe in 2022, returning to the EHF EURO semi-finals after a shock 2020 campaign that saw their lowest ranking ever. In 2022, Denmark lost to then reigning champions Spain in the semi-final before defeating France in extra time to clinch third — the national team's seventh EHF EURO medal and 16th across all competitions.

Denmark have taken the EHF EURO title twice, in 2008 and 2012. The bronze in 2022 was their first medal in the competition since silver in 2014. Prior to their first EHF EURO trophy in 2008, Denmark placed third three straight times.

On an individual level, Denmark are in the strong position of having big quality players competing for positions in the squad and almost unrivalled depth on the bench. Led by stalwart stars Mikkel Hansen and Niklas Landin, Denmark also keep unveiling newcomers with immediate impact.

At the World Championship held in January 2023, one year prior to the EHF EURO 2024, Simon Pytlick had his breakout national team tournament, ranking fourth on the top scorer list and earning a place in the All-star Team. Prior to Pytlick, it was one of the biggest stars in the game: Mathias Gidsel. Since his debut at the 2021 World Championship, Gidsel has not missed one All-star Team at a national team competition and was named MVP of the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games.

Pytlick was sidelined with an ankle injury through the end of 2023 but is expected back for the EHF EURO 2024.







Between 2006 and 2020, Portugal missed out on qualifying for the EHF EURO, but a great generation, led by Paulo Pereira from the bench, has returned in style, finishing in sixth place four years ago.

The surprise factor has somewhat evaporated, though, and Portugal ended up 19th in 2022, after conceding three losses in the preliminary round.

This time around, Portugal are coming in hot and aiming for the main round once again. They face Denmark, Czechia and Greece in Munich, and anything but a place between the top 12 teams in Europe would be considered a failure.

There have been changes in the team in the past years, but Portugal are still going strong, as underlined by their performance in the EHF EURO 2024 Qualifiers, where they were one of three teams with a 100 per cent record,


winning all six matches against North Macedonia, Türkiye and Luxembourg. Their goal tally of 210 goals made them the third best attack among the 32 teams taking part in the qualifiers.

With Pereira still at the helm Portugal are aiming for silverware in the future, especially as a new era is upon them. Right back Francisco Costa, the top goal scorer at the M20 EHF EURO 2022, might be still only 18 years old, but is a transcendental talent, as proven in the EHF European League Men where he scored nearly 200 goals in the past three seasons.

While only making his debut at the EHF EURO, the right back will have plenty of help from his teammates, some of them being already at their third edition of the EHF EURO. Portugal could certainly be a dark horse in the competition, as they were in 2020 and 2022.



CZECHIA



A new era in Czech handball began in 2022 when Xavier Sabaté took over the national team; this is his first major tournament at the Czech helm. The Spaniard's tenure began with a narrow defeat in the double-header against North Macedonia for a place at the 2023 IHF Men's World Championship, but the Czechs have quickly bounced back and are looking towards their fourth consecutive European championship and their 12th appearance in total.

The 47-year-old led the national team to the EHF EURO 2024 final tournament in Germany by finishing second in group 3 of the qualifiers, just behind Iceland with whom the Czechs finished on equal points with only one loss.

Sabaté was tasked with conducting an inevitable generational change and in the past couple of years, the talented left back Matej Klima has established himself as one of the new forces in the squad with the 24-year-old being the top scorer during the EHF EURO 2024 qualifiers.

However, the team is still supported by the experienced THW Kiel goalkeeper Tomas Mrkva and the likes of Jakub Hrstka as well as Tomas Babak.

The Czechs are placed in group F at the EHF EURO 2024 alongside world champions Denmark, the ambitious Portugal and debutants Greece. With the squad disappointed by the latest EHF EURO appearance in 2022 when they finished in 13th place, they are motivated to leave a much better impression under Sabaté.

The Spaniard has instilled confidence among the squad and is building a new national team to bring smiles to the Czech fans for years to come. The Czechs' best ranking at a single EHF EURO tournament remains the record sixth place in 2018.



One of a few debutants at the EHF EURO 2024 in Germany, Greece secured their place after finishing third in group 5.

The 47-year-old coach Georgios Zaravinas is a familiar name in Greek handball as the retired left wing featured with the national team at their home Olympics back in 2004, one of only two major tournaments that Greece have played in – the other being the 2005 IHF Men's World Championship.

The Greek squad is led by the experienced captain Charalampos Mallios, but at the same time is aided by youth and talent with Achilleas Toskas spearheading the national team's attack through the qualifiers as the top scorer. The talented 19-year-old is one of the names who is expected to have a big saying in Greece's future as is the line player, Nikolaos Liapis.

The squad is predominantly composed of Olympiacos SFP players.

Greece are placed in group F at the EHF EURO 2024 in Munich alongside the world champions Denmark, up-andcoming Portugal and the consistent Czechia. Progression seems an uphill struggle, but Greece have already climbed a mountain by reaching their maiden European Championship.

When Mallios leads the squad onto the court for their opening match in Munich and the Greek national anthem echoes through the speakers, it will be a historic and proud sight for them as they have waited so long for that moment.

2025 IHF WORLD MEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP IN CROATIA, DENMARK AND NORWAY

The 29th IHF World Men's Championship will be held between 9 and 27 January 2025 in Croatia, Denmark and Norway. Alongside the three hosts, at least another 14 European teams will be part of this tournament.

The three best-ranked teams of the EHF EURO 2024 in Germany – excluding Croatia, Denmark and Norway – will directly qualify for the world championship. The remaining places will be decided in two parts of qualification phase 2.

Lithuania, Ukraine, Belgium, Italy, Slovakia, Estonia, Finland, and Luxembourg or Israel, will play qualification phase 2, part 1, in March 2024. The four winners will progress to qualification phase 2, part 2, in May 2024, alongside 18 teams participating at the EHF EURO 2024 who have not booked a direct place.

MEN'S EHF EURO 2026 IN DENMARK, SWEDEN AND NORWAY

The 17th Men's EHF EURO marks the first time the three Nordic powerhouses have co-hosted a European Championship, although Sweden and Norway co-hosted alongside Austria in 2020. Denmark last hosted in 2014.

The tournament will be played between 15 January and 1 February 2026.

The joint bid was unanimously approved at the 14th EHF Extraordinary Congress on 20 November 2021, after Switzerland withdrew its bid for the tournament in favour of bidding for 2028 alongside Spain and Portugal.

The main concept of the tournament is 'Scandinavia connect'. The project will see Denmark, Sweden and Norway deliver an EHF EURO with innovation at its core. By connecting to new ways of exchanging best practices, new ways of reaching untapped audiences and new ways of hosting more sustainable events, Scandinavia will ultimately connect European handball to a stronger future.

In addition to the three hosts, who qualify automatically for the tournament, the EHF EURO 2024 champion – or the next best-ranked team, should one of the 2026 hosts win in Germany – will automatically qualify. These four teams will play the fourth edition of the Men's EHF EURO Cup in home and away matches at the same time as the eight qualification rounds for the 20 remaining spots for the EHF EURO 2026.

MULTIPLE EURO WINNERS

Karabatic and Gille can make history together

The tournament in January 2024 in Germany will be the last EHF EURO for Nikola Karabatic, who will end his glorious career after the 2024 Olympic Games on home soil in Paris. In Germany, the prolific 39-year-old back court player will aim for his fourth EHF EURO trophy – and to become the first non-Swedish player to reach that number. Ola Lindgren, Staffan Olsson, Stefan Lövgren, Magnus Wislander, Martin Frandesjö hold the record by winning gold medals in 1994, 1998, 2000 and 2002, respectively. Karabatic and France won gold in 2006, 2010 and 2014.

In 2022 – and after a 20-year long wait – Sweden took the trophy for the fifth time by beating Spain in the final, and in doing so ended Spanish hopes of becoming the second team after Sweden to win the trophy three times in a row, after they succeeded in 2018 and 2020.

Still, Sweden are the first, last and only team to become European champions on home soil, when they triumphed in 2002. For Denmark, right wing Hans Lindberg is the "last survivor" of their 2008 gold medal-winning side, who is still part of the squad and can become the first Dane to be an EHF EURO champion for the third time.

As well as Karabatic, another Frenchman can make a different kind of history. Guillaume Gille, who was twice European champion as a player, can now become the first such player ever to take gold as a head coach, too. But Swede Staffan Olsson has the same goal, now coaching the Netherlands, having failed to take the title when coaching Sweden. The first one ever to win gold as a player and as part of the coaching staff was another Swede: Tomas Svensson, who was part of the Swedish teams in 1994 and 2002 and was goalkeeper coach of the gold medallists in 2022.

Only eight different coaches have steered their teams to EHF EURO glory, and again a Swede is on top of the table: Bengt Johansson, who gave the name to the "Bengan Boys" and died at the age of 79 in 2022, was a four-time champion. Only two coaches in Men's EHF EURO history have steered a team other than their home country to the winners' podium: Icelander Dagur Sigurdsson in 2016 with Germany and Norwegian Glenn Solberg with Sweden in 2022.

TOP SCORERS & MVP AWARDS

The top scorers and Most Valuable Players of the EHF EURO stand out for the contribution they have made to the tournament and their teams. But who has particularly stood out when it comes to winning these awards?

Top scorers

The Czech Republic has generated the most top scorers, with Jan Filip (1998), Filip Jicha (2010) and Ondrej Zdrahala (2018) all making the list.Below the Czech Republic are Spain, with Joan Cañellas (2014) and Valero Rivera (2016); Croatia with Mirza Dzomba in 2004 and Ivano Balic in 2008; and Iceland, with Olafur Stefansson in 2002 and Ómar Ingi Magnusson in 2022.

The 2008 tournament was the only one with three top scorers: Lars Christiansen and Nikola Karabatic equalled Balic's total of 44 goals. In the whole history of the EHF EURO final tournaments, Christiansen is the only top scorer to have won gold. His fellow top scorers in 2008 also reached the podium, with Balic winning silver and Karabatic bronze. Many thought that Kiril Lazarov's 61 goals at the EHF EURO 2012 at Serbia would be a record for eternity, before Norwegian Sander Sagosen scored 65 goals at the EHF EURO 2020.

Most Valuable Players

In 2022 Sweden's Jim Gottfridsson became the fourth MVP to also be crowned EHF EURO champion. He was the third Swede to achieve this feat, after Magnus Andersson in 1994 and Magnus Wislander in 2002. Frenchman Nikola Karabatic in 2014 is the other member of this exclusive quartet.

In 2008 and 2010 the MVP was also the top scorer: Nikola Karabatic and Filip Jicha.

The 15 MVPs represent seven different countries: Sweden (four), France (three), Croatia (three), Spain (two), Germany, the Czech Republic and Serbia.

Gottfridsson's 2022 award also meant he became the third player to receive the MVP award twice. Ivano Balic (Croatia) won it twice in a row (2004 and 2006), while Karabatic won it in 2008 and 2014. Gottfridsson previously won the MVP award in 2018.

For several players, the MVP award was something of a consolation prize, as they received the trophy right after losing the EHF EURO finals. The first was Talant Dujshebaev (Spain) in 1996, the second Serb Momir Ilic in 2012. Between 2016 and 2020 every MVP shared their fate: Raul Entrerrios (Spain), Jim Gottfridsson (Sweden) and Domagoj Duvnjak (Croatia), before Gottfridsson turned things around in 2022.

ALL-STAR TEAM

Record winners Sweden are the top nation in terms of All-star Team nominations: 16 Swedish players have been named among the best of the tournament, as well as winning four MVP awards.

Second-ranked is Spain (15 All-star nominations, plus two MVPs) ahead of Croatia (13 and three MVPs), Denmark (13), Germany (11 and one MVP), France (nine and three MVPs), Russia (six), Iceland (six), Norway (five), Slovenia and Poland (three), Czech Republic, Serbia (one Allstar member and one MVP each), Hungary, Montenegro, the Netherlands and Portugal (one). This means the All-star Teams have included players from 17 nations.

At the EHF EURO 1998 there was no All-star Team, but individual trophies were awarded. Since 2010, the best defender of the tournament is included in the All-star Team.

Looking at the biggest number of nominations, again Nikola Karabatic is on top. Including the MVP awards in 2008 and 2014, he was selected five times for EHF EURO All-star Teams (2004, 2006, 2010).

Denmark's Mikkel Hansen has received four All-star Team nominations (2012, 2014, 2018, 2022). Several players have three nominations, including Swedish goalkeeper Peter Gentzel, Ivano Balic, Olafur Stefansson and Sander Sagosen. Balic also received two MVP awards.

OFFICIAL MATCH BALL

For the Men's EHF EURO 2024, the tournament's match ball is presented by the EHF's premium partner, Danish ball manufacturer SELECT Sport.

The ball has been exclusively designed for the championship, featuring elements in various colours of the tournament's brand.

With the EHF's ongoing partnership with KINEXON for the EHF EURO events, this SELECT Ultimate iBall has a built-in chip that tracks and distributes data in real-time: Shot detection, exact ball speed and position of the shot is captured, used and displayed on the EHF's owned and operated channels as well as on TV and brings fans and spectators closer to the game.

On EHF EURO level, the SELECT Ultimate iBall premiered at the final weekend of the Women's EHF EURO 2018 and has since been used at the Men's and Women's EHF EURO.



OFFICIATING TECHNOLOGIES

The implementation of officiating technology in handball has been a demand of teams, fans, and the media. At the Men's EHF EURO 2024, several technical advancements have been put in place. Their use will also be highlighted to arena spectators via specific visual symbols shown on the arena cube.

VIDEO REPLAY

Video replay offers referees the possibility of immediately watching a situation on a screen if they are not able to see the complete action on the court, and if they wish to check again before reaching a decision. This specifically refers to key match situations where the referees decide to consult the TV picture in addition to their view on the court.

Video replays will only get better at deducing what the human eye cannot, and reduce the number of controversial outcomes in games. The EHF uses video reviews to varying degrees, to aid officials in making the right calls.

GOAL-LINE TECHNOLOGY

The goal-line technology allows referees to utilise a number of cameras fixed to the goal to check whether the entire ball has crossed the goal line. As the video is linked to the match clock, the referees can also check if the ball crossed the goal line before the end of half-time or full-time.

The use of goal-line technology and video replay is solely the responsibility of the referees, and only they may determine whether or not to use it. The regulations governing the use of officiating technology in EHF competitions can be found here.



GOAL-LIGHT TECHNOLOGY

A series of (red) LED lights installed at the rear bars of the goal which light up at the same time as the buzzer sounds for team timeouts and at the end of each half. This provides all those involved in the match an additional visual signal to show that the time has stopped or ended. The signal also provides further help to the referees in deciding whether a last-second shot has crossed the goal line or not.

SUBSTITUTION AREA TECHNOLOGY

A system of micro cameras providing a detailed view of both substitution areas, offering video assistance in case of decisions that concern the substitution areas. The pictures are accessible for the EHF delegates in case of an unclear situation with player substitutions or team timeout buzzer use. Additionally, they are also accessible to referees to consult in case of any serious situation in the substitution area.

ELECTRONIC TEAM TIMEOUT SYSTEM ("BUZZER")

An electronic team timeout system is used instead of the team timeout "green" cards. A button is linked to the official scoreboard system, and, when pressed, the time is immediately stopped. The timeout is also indicated by an audio signal (buzzer) to ensure that all parties are aware of it. The buzzer button is placed at the table, one toward the substitution area of each team.

In the event of a mistake (or misuse) of the team timeout buzzer, the following rules will apply:

- progressive punishment (or disqualification a red card depending on whether the action was on purpose (or not)
- a throw (penalty, free throw, or the corresponding throw) for the team which was in possession of the ball
- the team that called the irregular timeout will lose one timeout

The use of technological officiating aids aims to enhance the overall quality of refereeing at the EHF EURO. By improving referees' decision-making, the integrity of the game is protected and more qualitative content for fans is produced.
