I INTRODUCTION TO THE QUARTER-FINALS

Dear handball friends,

It is a great honour for me to welcome supporters, players, officials and partners to the quarter-finals of the Machineseeker EHF Champions League for the 2022/23 season. The EHF and EHF Marketing are delighted to have seen action on court worthy of Machineseeker's first season as the title sponsor of the competition, and thanks to the support of our partners we are sure that the EHF Champions League will remain the leading indoor sports competition in Europe.

The group phase was exhilarating, then the play-off round did not let us down! We witnessed two national derbies, beginning with the all-Hungarian clash between two great rivals; Telekom Veszprém and OTP Bank - PICK Szeged, in which Veszprém were victorious. GOG have advanced to the quarter-finals for the first time having edged out fellow Danes Aalborg Håndbold over two pulsating legs, while Orlen Wisla Plock will also be making their maiden appearance in the last eight having beaten HBC Nantes in a shoot-out! THW Kiel will be a more familiar face at this stage after their commanding first leg over C.S. Dinamo Bucuresti. Congratulations to the four teams who progressed from the play-offs.

This means, naturally, that we are now only one round away from the flagship event of the club handball season, the TruckScout24 EHF FINAL4 2023 in Cologne. Anticipation may be growing for the LANXESS arena on 17/18 June, but first we have four quarter-finals, in which this season's top four teams will book their tickets to Cologne. The first legs will be played on 10 and 11 May, with the second legs on 17 and 18 May. The Machineseeker EHF Champions League continues with the format that we introduced before the start of the 2019/20 season; the top two clubs in each of the two groups of eight qualified directly for the two-legged quarter-finals. The four teams joining them were victorious in the two-legged play-off round which featured the teams who ranked third to sixth in their respective groups.

GOG's reward for beating Aalborg Håndbold is a meeting with Barça, who became the first team to defend the title in 2022, and are therefore seeking their third title in a row this season. Orlen Wisla Plock will face SC Magdeburg, meaning we are guaranteed a new name and a new set of fans entering the LANXESS arena. THW Kiel and Paris Saint-Germain Handball are regulars in Cologne, but only one will be making it there this time, while the other quarter-final sees a repeat of the 2016 final between Industria Kielce and Telekom Veszprém. We have six different nations represented in the quarter-finals, as the Machineseeker EHF Champions League once again shows the importance and strength of handball across the continent.



I DANISH TOP SCORER DUO, TWO NATIONS WITH TWO TEAMS

FACTS AND FIGURES: ALL THE NUMBERS YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE THE START OF THE QUARTER-FINALS

On 11 and 18 May the four participants of the TruckScout24 EHF FINAL4 in Cologne will be confirmed in the quarter-finals of the Machineseeker EHF Champions League. After the completion of the play-offs, two quarter-final debutants and four former Champions League winners are among those eight teams. As THW Kiel and defending champions Barça both look forward to their 22nd quarter-finals, here are all the facts and figures you need to know before the crucial knock-out stage on the way to Cologne.

O goals was the closest gap after 120 minutes of a play-off pairing: Orlen Wisla Plock needed the penalty shoot-out to eliminate HBC Nantes after two draws (32:32, 25:25). It was the first penalty shoot-out in an EHF Champions League Men knock-out stage since Chekhovskie Medvedi eliminated Montpellier in the 2009/10 quarter-finals

quarter-final pairing is a Champions League final re-match: Kielce vs Veszprém. In 2016, Kielce won their only trophy so far in a penalty shoot-out against Veszprém

- 1 team Telekom Veszprém HC won both playoff matches against their domestic rivals OTP Bank-Pick Szeged
- 2 countries are represented by two teams in the quarter-finals: Germany with Kiel and Magdeburg, and Poland with Kielce and Plock
- 2 play-off matches ended with a margin of 10 or more goals (Szeged vs Veszprém, 23:36, and Bucuresti vs Kiel, 28:41)
- 2 players still in competition are in the race for their individual fifth EHF Champions League titles: Barça's Aitor Ariño and Gonzalo Perez de Vargas
- 2 quarter-final debutants are still part of the competition: GOG and Plock. Both played the EHF European League last season

former EHF Champions League top scorers are still part of the competition: Alex Dujshebaev (Industria Kielce, 99 goals in 2018/19); Nikola Karabatic (now Paris Saint-Germain, scored 89 for Kiel in 2006/07); and Aleix Gómez (104 goals for Barça in 2021/22). Filip Jicha (top scorer in 2008/09 and 2009/10) is Kiel's coach and Momir Ilic (2013/14, 2014/15) is Veszprém's coach

- 3 former or current IHF World Handball Players of the Year are part of the eight squads still in competition: Nikola Karabatic (PSG/2007, 2014, 2016), Domagoj Duvnjak (Kiel/2013) and Niklas Landin (Kiel/2019, 2021). Besides, two coaches were previously IHF Players of the Year: Talant Dujshebaev (Kielce) and Filip Jicha (Kiel).
- **3** for the third consecutive time Kiel and Paris lock horns in the quarter-finals. In 2021, Paris proceeded, while Kiel progressed last year. The successful side had the home right in the second leg both times
- 4 coaches of the eight teams still in competition have won the EHF CL as coaches: Carlos Ortega (Barça, with Barça), Talant Dujshebaev (Kielce, with Ciudad Real and Kielce), Filip Jicha (Kiel, with Kiel) and Raul Gonzalez (PSG, with Vardar)
- 4 former or current EHF CL winners representing 16 trophies are still part of the knock-out stage: Barcelona (10), Kiel (four), Magdeburg and Kielce (one each)
- 4 times in 13 years, the defending champions made it to Cologne: Barça (2012 and 2022), Kiel (2013) and Vardar (2018). Last year, Barça became the first team ever to defend their trophy at Cologne
- 4 people won the EHF CL as both players and coaches: Talant Dujshebaev, Roberto Parrondo, Filip Jícha and Carlos Ortega. Dujshebaev won the competition in 1994 playing for Santander and 2006, 2008 and 2009 as Ciudad Real coach,

before steering Kielce to their first trophy in 2016. Parrondo was a player in the successful Ciudad Real squad in 2008 and 2010, then led Vardar to the trophy in 2019. Jícha won the trophy as a player in 2010 and 2012 and as a coach in 2020 (all with THW Kiel) and is the only person to win as player and as a coach at Cologne. Ortega, who won six times as a player for Barça, also coached the record winners to the 2022 trophy

- 5 coaches of the eight teams still part of the competition have won the EHF Champions League as players: Momir Ilic (coach at Veszprém) and Filip Jicha (coach of Kiel) won the trophy together in 2010 and 2012 with Kiel; Carlos Ortega (Barça) won the trophy six times with Barça; Talant Dujshebaev won with Santander; and Bennet Wiegert (SC Magdeburg) with Magdeburg
- 5 teams which were part of the 2021/22 quarterfinals are back: eventual EHF FINAL4 2022 participants Barça, Kielce, Veszprém and Kiel, plus PSG
- 5 teams again Barça, Kielce, Veszprém, Kiel and PSG – have been part of previous editions of the EHF FINAL4 in Cologne
- 6 countries are represented by the previous 29 EHF CL champions: Spain (16 titles), Germany (seven), France (two), North Macedonia (two), Poland and Slovenia (one each)
- 6 different nations are represented by the eight clubs still in competition: Germany (two), Poland (two), France, Hungary, Denmark and Spain
- 8 of 13 winners of the previous EHF FINAL4 are still part of the competition: Barça (four), Kiel (three), Kielce (one). Hamburg, Flensburg, Montpellier and Vardar (two) are missing
- 10 times (1995-2000, 2011, 2015, 2021, 2022) Barça have won the EHF CL to be the record winner. In addition, they won the forerunner competition, the IHF Champions Cup, once
- 12 matches eight quarter-final duels and four matches at the TruckScout24 EHF FINAL4 in Cologne are still ahead to confirm the winner of the 30th anniversary season of the EHF CL
- 13 goals was the biggest margin in the play-offs, when Veszprém won 36:23 at Szeged and when Kiel won 41:28 at Bucharest

- 16 goals was the biggest margin since the start of the group phase, when Barça won 46:30 at Elverum
- 18 goals (11 plus seven) were scored by Veszprém's wing Gasper Marguc against Szeged to be the top scorer of the play-offs ahead of GOG duo Simon Pytlick and Lukas Jørgensen (both 16 goals)
- 20 years ago, in 2002/03, Magdeburg played their last EHF Champions League quarter-final
- 22 Kiel and Barça qualified for a Champions League quarter-final for the 22nd time for both teams. For Veszprém, it is quarter-final 21
- 23 unbeaten CL matches in a row (21 victories, two draws) is the current series of defending champions Barça their last defeat was 27:29 on 22 November 2021 at Kielce
- 68 times, 60 or more goals were scored in the group phase (64) and the play-offs (four)
- 71 goals in the match Veszprém vs Szeged (38:31) was the highest score in a single play-off match, ahead of 69 goals at Dinamo vs Kiel (28:41)
- 78 goals was the highest score since the start of the group phase, when Nantes won 42:36 at Elverum, ahead of 77 goals in the matches Kielce vs Kiel (40:37), PSG vs GOG (41:36) and Magdeburg vs Porto (41:36)
- 82 matches (74 in the group phase, all eight playoffs) were attended by 3,000 or more fans
- 92 goals each were scored by GOG players Emil Madsen and Simon Pytlick to top the scorer list so far ahead of Alexs Vlah (Celje/88)
- 280 victories in 360 EHF Champions League matches (as well as 23 draws and 61 defeats) were taken by Barcelona so far to top the all-time Champions League table
- 499 goals were scored in the eight play-off matches, an average of 62.38 goals per match
- **7,507** goals were scored since the start of the group phase including the new group phase record of **7,008** goals.
- **42,246** fans saw the eight play-off matches, an average of 5,280 fans per match



THW KIEL VS PARIS SAINT-GERMAIN HANDBALL



First leg: Wednesday 10 May, 20:45 CEST Second leg: Wednesday 17 May, 20:45 CEST



- Kiel had to go through the play-offs to book their quarter-finals ticket, where they defeated Dinamo Bucuresti (72:60 on aggregate)
- before that, THW finished fourth in group B, having won six games, lost five and drawn three times
- last season, Kiel finished third of the EHF Champions League, having lost to Barça in the semi-final. The Zebras have won the competition four times already, the last one in 2020
- the quarter-final match will be the last in the Champions League at the Wunderino Arena for major THW Kiel players Miha Zarabec, Niklas Landin and Sander Sagosen
- Kiel's best scorers, Harald Reinkind and Niclas Ekberg, netted 58 since the start of the season
- THW will welcome their first French player since 2016 next season, as national goalkeeper Vincent Gérard signed a contract starting next July

- this season is the third in a row where Kiel and Paris play against each other. So far, each time qualified once for the EHF FINAL4, Paris in 2021 (63:59 on aggregate) and Kiel in 2022 (63:62 on aggregate)
- Paris qualified directly for the quarter-finals by finishing first in group A
- they played twice against a German club in the Champions League this season, and enjoyed mixed results: a win away and a loss at home against SC Magdeburg
- three Paris players have scored 70 goals or more this season (Syprzak, Prandi, Kristopans)
- Paris will still be without Nikola Karabatic, as the left-back is out until the end of the season with a phlebitis
- PSG are currently on top of the French league and could well win their eighth title in a row

Filip Jicha



- took over as head coach in 2019 after one season as assistant, becoming only the third THW head coach since 1993 – after Noka Serdarusic (1993-2008) and Alfred Gislason (2008-19)
- led Kiel to the domestic title in his first season and was awarded best Bundesliga coach of 2019/20
- as a player, he was part of the golden generation in 2007-15
- twice CL top scorer, he ended his career in Barcelona in 2017
- first in handball to win the EHF FINAL4 as a player (2010, 2012) and a coach (2020), and third after Talant Dujshebaev and Roberto Parrondo to win the CL as a player and a coach





- Veszprém and Kielce played 17 times against each other in the EHF Champions League since 2003, as the Hungarian side won 11 games and Kielce 5
- the last time both teams played against each other was in the semi-final last season, when Kielce defeated Veszprem 37:35
- Veszprém booked their quarter-finals ticket through the play-offs, where they beat fellow Hungarian side Szeged (74:56 on aggregate)
- in the group phase, the Hungarian side finished third in group A, behind Paris Saint-Germain and SC Magdeburg
- Veszprém's best scorer, Rasmus Lauge Schmidt, netted 78 times this season already
- French right-back Nédim Rémili started the season in Kielce before moving to Veszprém in February. He will be joined next season by two fellow French players, Hugo Descat and Ludovic Fabregas, who are part of the five new players who will join the club next season

- Kielce have not played a Champions League since the group phase, as the Polish team progressed straight to the quarter-finals after finishing second in group B
- Kielce's second best performance in the Champions League dates back to last season, when the club lost in the EHF FINAL4 final against Barça after a penalty shoot-out
- however, Kielce beat Veszprém in the penalty shoot-out as well at the 2016 EHF FINAL4, when they lifted the most coveted trophy
- the Polish side came out victorious of its last two confrontations with a Hungarian team in the Champions, beating Szeged twice this season
- Kielce's Arkadiusz Moryto is currently the Champions League's fourth best scorer, with 84 goals

I IMPORTANT REGULATIONS — NO AWAY GOALS RULE

Away goals not among the criteria to decide the ranking anymore

All matches shall be played in accordance with the IHF's current Rules of the Game. Variations on a technical level are possible. All matches of the shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

The matches shall be scored as follows:

- a) win = 2 points
- b) draw = 1 point
- c) loss = 0 points

Teams' rankings are obtained by adding up the number of points won.

OUARTER-FINAL MATCHES

If, after completion of the two matches, both clubs have won the same number of points (no extra time will be played), the teams' standings shall be determined by the following criteria:

- a) goal difference
- b) penalty throws

RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- Only players (incl. goalkeepers) who are listed on the match report and are not suspended or disqualified at the end of the playing time are entitled to participate at the penalty throws.
- Prior to the penalty throws, each team shall name five players by handing the referees a list of numbers.
 These players shall then take one throw each until a decision (a winner) is reached, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws.

- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the Game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may perform as goalkeepers.
- The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.
- If the scores are equal after the first round of penalty throws, it shall be continued until a decision is reached.
 In the second round, the other team shall start. Again, five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).
- In the second round, a decision (a winner) is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.
- Serious infractions committed during penalty throws shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be supplementary named.
- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing court.
- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.



I ON THE ROAD TO COLOGNE

The TruckScout24 EHF FINAL4 is the culmination of the European handball season. The two-day event sees the best four men's teams in Europe playing to decide the ultimate winner of the Machineseeker EHF Champions League Men. The 2023 edition will take place on 17/18 June in Cologne, which hosts the event for the 14th straight time and will continue to do so until 2026.

On the eve of the 2022 semi-finals it was confirmed that Cologne's LANXESS arena will host the highlight of European club handball until 2026.

The success story between the EHF FINAL4 Men, the LANXESS arena and the City of Cologne started in 2010 when the first event was held in front of a capacity crowd of 19,750 spectators. The decision to create a new format for the final phase of the EHF Champions League was seen as crucial for the growth of handball across Europe. The aim was to create a flagship event, one that could compete on the international sports market and make the Europe's leading club competition even more attractive to fans, partners and sponsors. The success of all previous editions up to date showed that this format has been the right strategy. It has set new standards in organisation and entertainment: it is not just four games played over two days but an event that combines outstanding sports and unique entertainment.

After two years of pandemic with the EHF FINAL4 being played behind almost closed doors in 2020 and in front of only 1,000 fans in 2021, the
