YAC Qualitative Analysis



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TOURNAMENT — FACTS & FIGURES

- 24 teams competed in four preliminary groups.
- 96 matches were played over the course of 11 days.
- 5,569 goals were scored from 9,038 shots, at an average of 62 per cent.
- The goalkeepers made 2,092 saves from 7,696 shots, at an efficiency of 27.18 per cent.
- None of the four finalists had a perfect record coming into the final matches.
- Sweden, Denmark, Hungary and Iceland played in the final weekend.
- For the third time, Sweden took the title in this age category after beating Denmark 37:36 after overtime.

MATCHES & PLAYERS — FACTS

- The top three goalkeepers in terms of save percentage were Frederik Møller (DEN 79 saves at 35.1 per cent), Gjorgji Nikolovski (MKD – 83 saves at 34 per cent), Daniel Guretzky (GER – 70 saves at 33.3 per cent).
- The top three goal scorers in terms of shooting efficiency were Asaf Sharon (ISR 71 goals at 69.6 per cent), Yoni Peyrabout (FRA – 65 goals at 83.3 per cent) and Djordje Drasko (SRB – 63 goals at 77.8 per cent). Yoni Peyrabout (FRA) also had the highest shooting percentage of the top 37 scorers.

COACHES

- Only 1 foreign coach (ISL) was active at the YAC competition, equating to 0.04 per cent of participating teams.
- Austria had the only female coach at the tournament.

DEFENCE ANALYSIS



DEFENCE GENERAL ASPECTS

- The teams at the M18 EHF EURO 2024 used a variety of defensive formations.
- Looking at the number of blocked shots and steals, Denmark had the best defence in the tournament with 24 blocks and 16 steals (an average of 5 per match), followed by Sweden with 21 blocked shots and 18 steals (an average of 4.88 per match) and Germany with 30 blocked shots and 8 steals (an average of 4.75 per match).

DEFENCE TACTICAL ASPECTS

- Most of the teams used a 6:0 zone defence, although with different styles.
 - 2nd defenders aimed to pressure decision making of the playmaker.
 - Man to man defence was used both in the final match and the bronze medal match in overtime
 - Crossing
- Some teams played a 5:1 defensive system as a second system.
- · Best individual defenders:
 - Aim for an attacker foul
- · Numerical inferiority:
 - outside defenders have an important role
 - back defender aims to pressure the playmaker

GOALKEEPER PERFORMANCE

- The overall goalkeeper performance was very similar to that of the M18 EHF EURO 2022.
- There was a very similar overall save percentage (37 per cent in 2024 and 33 per cent in 2022).
- The two goalkeepers of Denmark were in the top 10 of the overall goalkeeper statistics.
- The top three goalkeeping teams in the tournament were Denmark, North Macedonia and Germany (35.1 per cent, 34 per cent and 33.3 per cent, respectively).
- Good cooperation between defence and goalkeeper:

ATTACK ANALYSIS



ATTACK GENERAL ASPECTS

• At the M18 EHF EURO 2024, 5,569 goals were scored from 9,038 shots, at a rate of 62 per cent.

ATTACK TACTICAL ASPECTS

- In common attack, most teams played crossings against zone defence, transitions:
 - cross between back players
 - cross with the line player
 - double crosses
 - wing transition
 - back transition
- · More important role for wing players
- When attacking in numerical superiority, the teams often played with two line players
- Fast break played from direct goalkeeper pass or extra pass through player
- Attack transition defence attack together with the goalkeeper:
 - The counterattack showed the individual techniques of most of the players.
- Passive play
- Completing the attack with a free throw when passive play had been called

CONCLUSIONS AND FINDINGS



- For the third time, Sweden took the title in this age category.
- They beat Denmark 37:36 after overtime.
- Spain scored the most goals in the tournament (280 goals from 428 shots, an efficiency of 65.4 per cent).
- Slovenia had the highest percentage (68.3) comparing goals scored versus shots taken (258 vs 378) followed by Serbia (65.3) and Sweden (64.3)
- Offensive defences are an area of focus. Most of the teams started from zone defence but with offensive defenders up to 9 metres.
- More important roles for the line players and wing players.
- · Good individual techniques of players.
