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I INTRODUCTION TO THE NEW SEASON

The summer wait is over and all is set for a new edition of the EHF Champions League Men. Following two seasons marked by the Covid-19 pandemic there is much excitement for the upcoming 29th edition, and not only because all handball fans eagerly await new match action.

Europe's premium competitions opened their new chapter last year after the EHF has teamed up with Infront and DAZN for the next decade and the EHF Champions League got a fresh look across several layers. The playing times have been fixed with Wednesdays and Thursdays reserved for the EHF Champions League Men and weekends for the DELO EHF Champions League. On every match day in the men's top-flight an appointment to view has been confirmed with all matches starting either at 18:45 or 20:45 (CET/CEST).

Both competitions open as usual with a group phase, though this time only two groups of eight teams are starting the long and exciting road to the EHF FINAL4.

The group phase will be followed by the play-offs and the quarter-finals, to find the four teams that will battle for the prestigious title in Cologne.

Six former winners and 35 nations represented among the players

The number of participating teams has remained at 16 as the number of countries at 13 from almost all the corners of the continent are represented. In addition the 300+ players entering the courts come from no fewer than 35 countries.

Most of the teams have a rich history in the European top-flight and besides the record holders with the biggest number of participations, like HC PPD Zagreb (28) and Telekom Veszprém HC (27), also the most decorated teams can be found with Barça (nine titles) or THW Kiel (four titles). In total, there will be six former EHF Champions League winners on the starting grid when the race for the newly designed trophy commences on 15 September.

I WE PLAY HANDBALL: OUR BRAND IDENTITY

We play handball. It is what we do, and it is the sport we have had in hearts ever since the European Handball Federation was born back in 1991. In the three decades that have followed we have kept pace with an ever-evolving society that shapes the way we work and see ourselves. One thing we have not changed, however, is our commitment to staying true to the origins of handball. This spirit of an active, social community is a core part of the handball DNA even today. Since the European Handball Federation was founded, we have served each national federation, each club, thousands of players and millions of fans with respect, honesty and transparency.

A fresh approach to logo design

At the heart of the new approach implemented in 2020 is an updated and fresh representation of how the origins and successes of European handball are communicated, expressed and promoted. Therefore, subtle alterations have been made in the visual presentation of the EHF and its associated competitions with a newly developed design, created to offer consistent communication of the new handball umbrella brand across all European competitions. The shape of a handball itself is referenced throughout the entire EHF brand system. On a national team level, the circular shape of the ball is used to empower all national team competition logos.



By emphasising an individual tile on the ball – represented by the pentagon and the lines which form the stitching – the form becomes a strong abstract symbol for the club competitions, including the pentagon which is visible in the distorted version of the logo. The new EHF Champions League logo is the best example with a rejuvenated golden star forming the basis of the refreshed emblem of European handball's elite competitions.

I NEW OFFICIAL EHF CHAMPIONS LEAGUE SONG

The official EHF Champions League Song is a first spin-off from the EHF Brand Sound. At its core is the handball sound DNA: a rhythmic interpretation of the sport's most iconic movement, the jump shot. Composing a unique song dedicated to Europe's premium handball club competition has been the next step after sound logos and anthems for the EHF Champions League and the EHF European League as well as opening and closing sequences for TV elements, OTT streaming platforms and social media had already been released earlier.

MESMERIZE is the title of the official EHF Champions League Song, deriving from the handball sound DNA. With a catchy synth hook line and raw and massive dancehall power, it provides the recipe to become a new in-arena hit and to attract a younger audience. The official EHF Champions League Song is the first single of JOIN7, an international producer team. The track will be part of the official opening ceremony of all matches during the EHF Champions League Season 2021/22 and can be listened to on various platforms including: Spotify, iTunes, [YouTube](#) or Amazon music.

THE BRAND SOUND PROJECT

As part of a holistic brand experience strategy, sound is an essential brand asset. Together with the sound agency WESOUND, EHF and EHF Marketing developed an acoustic identity for their brands, reflecting and representing the core of handball.

A modern brand sound approach is part of the vision of positioning handball as the most attractive indoor sport and it supports the goal of attracting a younger audience. Through the coherent and consistent use of unique and recognisable sound elements together with the consistent graphical picture conveyed, an improved connection of the competitions and their followers will be achieved. Much like the visual brand identity, the brand sound identity will acoustically connect the various leagues and tournaments which fit under the EHF umbrella.

I NEW PLATFORMS FOR NEW SEASON

Follow your favourite EHF Champions League clubs and players with the new Home of Handball app. The EHF announced the launch of its very first dedicated mobile app, Home of Handball, just before the start of the new season.

The app, available on iOS and Android, follows the EHF's 'Home of Handball' approach and unites all of Europe's major handball competitions – from the club as well as from the national team side – under one roof. The integration of highlights from EHFTV, as well as of live scores, club and player information, are key ingredients for an enriching user experience. The app features gamification elements and furthermore allows for each user to completely individualise his or her experience by selecting their favourite club and/or favourite competition.

The arrival of the app offers handball fans across the globe European handball at their fingertips while at the same time creates an entry point for new fans to enter the arena and learn about the excitement of handball.

Developed together alongside Austrian start-up House of Web, the app offers smooth user experience, allowing for an easy as well as exciting entry into the world of handball with a comprehensive overview about every single match in the EHF's competitions each season.

The EHF Champions League Men 2021/22 throws off on Wednesday and fans will not have to miss one minute of the unscripted drama that awaits throughout the season, with 35 broadcasters across more than 50 territories set to bring the action to TV screens across Europe. The thrills start with the first round 1 matches this Wednesday, with a standing weekly schedule that sees games played at 18:45 and 20:45 CEST/CET on Wednesdays and Thursdays throughout the season — as was introduced in 2020/21.

In addition to the TV broadcasters, fans will be able to view all 132 matches on the path to deciding the 2021/22 champions on the free-with-registration platform EHFTV.com (geo-restrictions apply), which also shows highlights and other special video features. EHFTV garnered over 250,000 users in 2020/21, as fans around the world tuned in to witness the season that ended with Barça's unprecedented perfect run to the trophy.

10 DEBUTANTS, SIX FORMER WINNERS AND 13 NATIONS

FACTS AND FIGURES: THE MOST IMPORTANT NUMBERS PRIOR TO THE START OF THE 29TH SEASON OF THE EHF CHAMPIONS LEAGUE MEN

16 clubs from 13 countries, with six former champions among them, will embark on the journey to the 13th EHF FINAL4 in Cologne.

Here are the most important numbers you need to know prior to the start of the group phase:

0 Not a single team managed to defend the trophy in Cologne since the implementation of the EHF FINAL4 in 2010 — a total of 12 editions.

0

debutants are among the 16 teams competing in the EHF Champions League 2021/22 season.

1 trophy, showing the moment the ball hits the net, is the award the 16 teams play for. It was produced by the Spanish agency Sustain Awards by Oiko Design Office. For the first time ever, in the previous season, the men's and women's winners received the same trophy.

1 draw is needed from this point in the season until the EHF FINAL4 2022 — the one for the semi-finals. The other rounds leading towards the pinnacle event are decided by the final ranking of the group phase. The 13th edition of the EHF FINAL4 will be played on 18 and 19 June 2022.

1 Danish team has made it to the final of the EHF Champions League: Aalborg Håndbold, in the previous season.

1 player transferred from the 2021 EHF Champions League winners to the team they beat in the final: Aron Palmársson, who left Barça and joined Aalborg.

1 time only — in 2018 — there was no German or Spanish team at the EHF FINAL4.

1 EHF FINAL4 final needed to be decided by a penalty shootout: The 2016 edition, Kielce vs Veszprém (39:38).

2 changes only, compared to the previous season, occurred in the starting grid of the 2021/22 group phase: Montpellier replace Nantes as the second French participants, and Dinamo Bucuresti are in while Celje are out. The remaining 14 clubs are the same as last season.

2

group winners and 2 runners-ups will skip the play-offs and advance to the quarter-finals directly.

2 coaches have led two different teams to the EHF Champions League trophies: Alfred Gislason (SC Magdeburg in 2002; THW Kiel in 2010 and 2012) and Talant Dujšebaev (Ciudad Real in 2006, 2008 and 2009; Kielce in 2016).

2 current coaches won the EHF Champions League as players together in the same team: Momir Ilic (new coach for Veszprém) and Filip Jicha (coach of THW Kiel) won the trophy together in 2010 and 2012 with Kiel.

2 teams per group, who finish seventh and eighth on the final table rankings, will see their international journey end after the first stage of the competition.

2 times in now 12 years have the defending champions made it back to Cologne: Kiel in 2013 and Vardar in 2018.

3 people have won the CL as a player and a coach: Talant Dujšebaev, Roberto Parrondo and Filip Jicha. Dujšebaev won the competition in 1994 as a player with Santander (ESP) and in 2006, 2008 and 2009 as coach of Ciudad Real, before steering Kielce to their first trophy in 2016. Parrondo was a player in the successful Ciudad Real squad in 2008 and 2010, then led Vardar to the trophy in 2019. Filip Jicha is the only one to win in Cologne as both a player (2010, 2012) and a coach (2020) of THW Kiel.

3 teams from the EHF FINAL4 2020/21 are part of the 2021/22 group stage: Barça, Aalborg and PSG. Nantes did not qualify and will contest the European League.

4 previous CL top scorers will be on court in the competition this season: Kiel's Niclas Ekberg (top scorer in 2019/20), Kielce's Alex Dujšhebaev (2018/19), and PSG's Mikkel Hansen (2011/12 and 2015/16) and Nikola Karabatic (2006/07). Two other top scorers will be on the benches: Filip Jicha (top scorer in 2008/09 and 2009/10) is Kiel's coach and Momir Ilic (2013/14 and 2014/15) is Veszprém's coach.

4 current coaches of the 16 teams have won the EHF Champions League as coaches: Talant Dujšhebaev (Kielce — with Ciudad Real and Kielce), Xavi Pascual (Bucharest — with Barça), Patrice Canayer (Montpellier — with Montpellier) and Raul Gonzalez (PSG — with Vardar).

4

current coaches of the 16 teams have won the CL as players: Talant Dujšhebaev (Kielce — with Santander), Momir Ilic (Veszprém — with Kiel), Filip Jicha (Kiel — with Kiel) and Børge Lund (Elverum — with Kiel).

4 former or current IHF World Handball Players of the Year are part of the 16 squads of this season. Nikola Karabatic (PSG — 2007, 2014, 2016), Mikkel Hansen (PSG — 2011, 2015, 2018), Domagoj Duvnjak (Kiel — 2013) and Niklas Landin (Kiel — 2019). In addition, two coaches were once IHF Players of the Year: Talant Dujšhebaev (Kielce — in 1994 and 1996) and Filip Jicha (Kiel — in 2010).

4 Barça players won their third CL title with the Catalan side in June 2021: Aitor Arino, Raul Entrerrios (ended his career), Gonzalo Perez de Vargas and Cedric Sorhaindo (now playing for Bucharest). Aron Palmársson (now Aalborg) secured his third trophy but won the first two with Kiel. Besides them, Nikola Karabatic, Viran Morros (both Paris Saint-Germain) and Ivan Cupic (Zagreb) are the treble winners among the current group phase players.

6 former or current CL champions, representing 18 trophies, are part of the 2021/22 group phase: Barça (nine), Kiel (three), Montpellier (two), Vardar (two), Flensburg and Kielce (one each).

6 countries are represented by the previous 26 EHF Champions League title winners: Spain (15 titles), Germany (seven), France, North Macedonia (two each), Poland and Slovenia (one each).

8

of the 16 current teams have been part of the EHF FINAL4 in Cologne: Barça, Nantes, Paris, Flensburg, Kiel, Veszprém, Kielce and Vardar.

9 times (1995–2000, 2011, 2015, 2021), Barça have won the EHF Champions League, making the club the record winners. In addition, they won the Champions Cup (forerunner competition of the Champions League) once. Kiel (2007, 2010, 2012, 2020) have taken four trophies, while Vardar (2017, 2019) and Montpellier (2003, 2018) each won two.

9 different Spanish coaches account for an overall of 18 EHF Champions League trophies so far: Valero Rivera (five), Dujšhebaev (four), Pascual (three), Javier Cuesta, Julian Ruiz, Francisco Equisoain, Francesc Espar, Raul Gonzalez and Roberto Parrondo (each one). Dujšhebaev, Parrondo and Gonzalez were the only ones to win the trophy with non-Spanish teams.

13 goals, in the 2021 final Barça vs Aalborg (36:23), were the biggest margin in all 24 matches at the EHF FINAL4 at Cologne so far.

13 nations — the same as in the previous season — are represented by the 16 group phase participants: Belarus, Croatia, Denmark, Spain, France, Germany, Hungary, North Macedonia, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Romania and Ukraine. The only change was from Slovenia to Romania.

14 of the 16 current teams were part of the Champions League group phase in the previous season — all except Bucharest and Montpellier.

15 times, Spanish teams have won the EHF Champions League — Barça (nine), Ciudad Real (three), Santander, Irun and Portland (each one).

16 or **18** matches will be played by the four teams that make it to the EHF FINAL4 in Cologne (18 and 19 June 2022), depending on whether the semi-finalists skip the play-offs and qualify directly for the quarter-finals or not.

20 victories in 20 matches were taken by Barça in their perfect 2020/21 season.

20 times, Aron Palmársson was on court at the EHF FINAL4 in Cologne — for Kiel, Veszprém and Barça — making him the record holder in terms of number of matches at the pinnacle weekend.

28 times (including the new season), Zagreb have been part of the EHF Champions League, ahead of Veszprém (27 participations) and Barça (25).

68 goals were scored by Kiril Lazarov in his 14 EHF FINAL4 matches. The Macedonian, who plays for HBC Nantes, is the all-time top scorer of the event in Cologne.

132 matches are ahead until the winner of the EHF Champions League 2021/22 is confirmed in Cologne — 112 group matches, eight play-offs and quarter-finals, and four games at the EHF FINAL4.

254 victories in 332 EHF Champions League matches (besides 20 draws and 58 defeats) were taken by Barça so far, for them to top the all-time Champions League record table.

7,663 goals were scored in the 127 matches decided on court in the previous season, including 6,102 in the group phase, 835 in the play-offs, 483 in the quarter-finals and 243 at the EHF FINAL4 club the record winners. In addition, they won the Champions Cup (forerunner competition of the Champions League) once. Kiel (2007, 2010, 2012, 2020) have taken four trophies, while Vardar (2017, 2019) and Montpellier (2003, 2018) each won two.



GROUP A PREVIEW



THREE FORMER WINNERS AND A STRENGTHENED 2021 FINALIST

In group A, THW Kiel, Aalborg Håndbold, Pick Szeged and Montpellier HB are regarded by many as the favourites for the top spots in the group. Still, the other sides, HC Vardar 1961, HC Meshkov Brest, HC PPD Zagreb and Elverum Handball are well capable of springing a few surprises.



Aalborg were the surprise team of the EHF Champions League 2020/21, making it all the way to the final where Barça proved too strong. Ahead of the start of the new season, the ambitions of the Danish champions are high, and rightly so, after the arrivals of some big names. Icelandic three-time Champions League winner Pálmarrsson will strengthen Aalborg's squad, before Mikkel Hansen will arrive in the summer of 2022. Also, defence specialist Jesper Nielsen and wing Kristian Bjørnsen are supposed to lift the level of the team of head coach Stefan Madsen.



Can Aalborg finish first or second in group A and go straight to the quarter-finals? At least three opponents have the power to stop Aalborg's march to the top. Four-time Champions League winners Kiel didn't make changes to their squad but got left back Nikola Bilyk back after he missed the 2020/21 season with a knee injury. "We want to go to Cologne", is the general ambition of the German record champions, who failed to make to the EHF FINAL4 2021 following their quarter-final loss to Paris Saint-Germain HB, just months after winning the delayed 2020 edition. With their well-balanced and well-rehearsed squad, Kiel are among the biggest favourites to finish on top of this group.

After a one-year absence in the competition, 2003 and 2018 champions Montpellier are hungry for new success. But the team lost several key players in the off-season, most notably Melvyn Richardson, who moved to Barça. Jonas Truchanovicus (HC Motor), Alexis Borges (SL Benfica) and Fredric Pettersson (Fenix Toulouse) also left, though Montpellier signed Marko Panic from Brest. Still, the team will rely once again on the magic of coach Patrice Canayer, who is going into his 28th straight season with the club.



Szeged again make an attempt for their first trip to Cologne. They left Hungarian record champions Telekom Veszprém behind in the domestic league last season and extended contracts with coach Juan Carlos Pastor and key player Bence Banhidi. Signing Miguel Martins from Porto as additional playmaker alongside Dean Bombac, Szeged boast world-class players on this position, but they also lost some experience with former Champions League winners Jonas Källman and Joan Canellas leaving the



club. In their 20th CL season, they hope to end the EHF FINAL4 curse, after they lost in the play-offs last season against one of their group phase opponents this season: Kiel.

Vardar, Brest and Zagreb, who will also compete in the SEHA League 2021/22, will challenge the teams that are expected in the top four. After their worst Champions League season ever – losing all matches and three different coaches during the group phase – Zagreb have bolstered their squad with the likes of Ivan Cupic, Filip Ivic, Zeljko Musa, Jakov Gojun and Sandro Obradovic. Mainly the trio of Ivic-Gojun-Musa should give the defence more stability.



Brest are coming off their best Champions League season so far – reaching the quarter-finals, where they lost to eventual champions Barça. Still, new coach Daniel Gordo, who takes over from fellow Spaniard Raul Alonso, has a lot of work thrown at him with several changes to the squad. All eyes will be goal getter Mikita Vailupau again, who netted 93 times last season.

Vardar will appear in a different look after the departure of 11 players and the arrival of 13 others. There is also a new coach: Veselin Vujovic has started in his third stint at the 2017 and 2019 Champions League winners. Much attention will also go to Spanish EHF EURO and world champion Eduardo Gurbindo, who arrived from HBC Nantes.

After top star Luc Abalo ended his career and Alexander Blonz moved to group phase opponents Pick Szeged, Norwegian champions Elverum are seen as the underdogs in this group. But coach Børge Lund is confident he can lead his team to a top-six finish and a place in the play-offs.





GROUP FEATURES IMPRESSIVE LINE-UP

The line-up of EHF Champions League group B is impressive, to say the least. The title holders (Barça), a semi-finalist from last season (Paris Saint-Germain HB), the 2016 winners (Lomza Vive Kielce), the 2014 winners (SG Flensburg-Handewitt), and the 2019 and 2020 semi-finalists (Telekom Veszprém HC) will battle it out for the top spots in group B.



BARÇA

Barça are coming off a unique season, in which the Spanish champions won all their 20 Champions League matches – a feat never seen before in Europe's top flight. They had been at the last three EHF FINAL4 events, and finally managed to win it again in 2021. Aron Pálmarsson moved to Aalborg, but Barça signed French standout Melvyn Richardson and Spanish wing Angel Fernandez Perez. Their squad is just as impressive as last season, but will the players need time to adapt to ideas of their new coach, Carlos Ortega, who replaced Xavi Pascual after 12 highly successful years in charge.



FC Porto

After making it to Cologne five times in the last six editions, can PSG finally lift the trophy? Only once did the French side reach the final, back in 2017. PSG did not sign any new players in the summer of 2021, only welcoming back Sadou Ntanzi who was on loan at Toulouse. On the other hand, coach Raul Gonzalez lost a key player in Dylan Nahi, who joined rivals Kielce.

The 2016 champions start their 2020/21 campaign with an impressive squad once again – and president Bertus Servaas has already announced three more reinforcements for the 2022/23 season. With the likes of Nicolas Tournat, Alex Dujšebaev and Andreas Wolff, and now Dylan Nahi added on the left wing, Kielce are among the serious candidates for an EHF FINAL4 ticket again.

The same goes for Veszprém. The Hungarian side, just like PSG, has its eye on the trophy for quite some time now, without actually winning it. Veszprém have to overcome the disappointment of last season's quarter-final loss to Nantes when they start on the road to Cologne once again – this time with former player Momir Ilic as coach on the bench, and a team more focused on local talents.



Flensburg have made the most of their geographic location and signed three Danish internationals and one Swedish. Half of the German team are from Scandinavia, making for an interesting blend. Coach Maik Machulla can be expected to steer his team on a long journey deep into this competition.



Will some might argue that the above mentioned team will finish in the top five of group B, nothing can be taken for granted with FC Porto, HC Motor and CS Dinamo Bucuresti the remaining competitors in this appealing section.

Porto (against Aalborg) and Motor (Barça) played against the eventual finalists in the play-offs – and held up well. Especially Porto went just narrowly down to the Danish surprise pack of 2020/21. It will be interesting to see how the Portuguese side recovers from losing Angel Gomes (Melsungen) and Miguel Martins (Szeged) – but inventive coach Magnus Andersson will come up with solutions for sure.



Getting out of the group for the first time last season, Motor look even stronger for the 2021/22 campaign, thanks to Jonas Truchanovicus' arrival. The left back won the Champions League with Montpellier in 2018 and his experience comes in handy for the Ukrainian side, who also signed Croatian international Luka Sebetic in its attempt to fulfil its quarter-final dreams this season.

Dinamo return to the Champions League after their European League campaign last year. The Romanian side had qualified for the 2019/20 Last 16, which unfortunately could never be played due to the coronavirus outbreak. They are back to get out of the group again this season, and will try to do so under new coach Xavi Pascual, who arrived from Barça. Also, line players Cédric Sorhaindo and Mohamed Mamdouh, left back Christian Dissinger and left wing Alex Pascual Garcia have all won the Champions League in the past, and they surely have it what it takes in Europe's top club handball competition.

After 12 seasons that saw 61 trophies for Barça, Xavi Pascual's tenure as coach of the Spanish powerhouse ended on a high last June, as the club won their ninth EHF Champions League Men title.

The 2021/22 season will be full of new faces at the reigning champions, as Antonio Carlos Ortega replaced Pascual, while crucial players like Raul Enterrerrios and Aron Pálmarsson will not be part of the roster anymore.

- Barça have qualified for the EHF FINAL4 in eight of the last 11 seasons and hold the record for most participations

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

I IMPORTANT REGULATIONS

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN TWO OR MORE TEAMS HAVE THE SAME NUMBER OF POINTS

All matches of the EHF Champions League Men shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

The matches shall be scored as follows:

- a) win = 2 points
- b) draw = 1 point
- c) loss = 0 points

Teams' rankings are obtained by adding up the number of points won.

GROUP PHASE

If two or more teams have scored the same number of points, the ranking will be determined as follows:

During the matches of the group:

- a) higher goal difference in all matches;
- b) greater number of plus goals in all matches;

After completion of the group if two teams have scored the same number of points:

- a) number of points in matches of the two teams directly involved;
- b) goal difference in matches of the two teams directly involved;
- c) higher number of goals scored in the away match of the two teams directly involved;
- d) goal difference in all matches of the group;
- e) higher number of plus goals in all matches of the group;

After completion of the group if three or more teams have scored the same number of points:

- a) number of points in matches of all teams directly involved;
- b) goal difference in matches of all teams directly involved;
- c) higher number of plus goals in matches of all teams directly involved;
- d) goal difference in all matches of the group;
- e) higher number of plus goals in all matches of the group;
- f) higher ranking in the group phase matches
- g) greater number of points in the group phase

* If the ranking of one of these teams is determined, the criteria are consecutively followed until the ranking of all teams is determined.

* If no ranking can be determined, a decision shall be obtained by drawing lots. Lots shall be drawn by the EHF, if possible in the presence of team managers.

QUARTER-FINALS

If, after completion of the two matches, both teams have won the same number of points (no extra-time will be played), the teams' standings shall be determined by the following criteria:

- a) goal difference
- b) greater number of plus goals scored in away match
- c) penalty throws

RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- Prior to penalty throwing, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each until a decision (a winner) is reached, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws

- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may play as goalkeepers.

- The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.

- If scores are equal after the first round of penalty throwing, it shall be continued until a decision is reached. In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).

- In the second round, a decision (a winner) is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.

- Eligible players are players entered in the match report who have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.

- Serious infractions committed during penalty throwing shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be named supplementary.

- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing area.

- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

I HISTORY: 28 YEARS OF EHF CHAMPIONS LEAGUE MEN

1993 – 2007

1993/94

**Final: ABC Braga vs TEKA Santander
22:22/21:23 (43:45)**

The inaugural year of the Men's EHF Champions League saw the classic home and away knockout matches being replaced with a totally new system: 32 teams in two qualification rounds, eliminating 24 clubs. The remaining eight teams were placed into two groups of four. TEKA Santander and ABC Braga topped their respective groups and faced each other in the final. Santander narrowly kept the upper hand and started what should become an eight-year Spanish club winning streak in the Men's EHF Champions League.

1994/95

**Final: Elgorriaga Bidasoa Irun vs Badel Zagreb
30:20 / 26:27 (56:47)**

The final of the EHF Champions League's second season became the match of a lifetime for Irun's Nenad Perunicic, nicknamed "the canon" or "Il Conquistadore" by the fans. He was his team's key player in the final and, in his first year in Spain, not only he lifted the EHF Champions League but also the national championship trophy with Irun.

1995/96

**Final: FC Barcelona vs Elgorriaga Bidasoa Irun
23:15 / 23:23 (46:38)**

In the season that was marked by the "Bosman decision", which had substantial effects on transfer regulations and transfer fees in sport, FC Barcelona won their first EHF Champions League title. No other should be capable of dethroning the Catalan side for the next four years.

1996/97

**Final: FC Barcelona vs Badel Zagreb
31:22 / 30:23 (61:45)**

In their second consecutive EHF Champions League Final Barcelona dominated both matches against Badel Zagreb. And while the Spanish side celebrated their second EHF Champions League triumph, the Croatian side had lost their second final. Also in 1996/97 the so called "fast break" was born due to a rule change, making handball more attractive and athletic than ever before.

1997/98

**Final: FC Barcelona vs Badel Zagreb
28:18 / 28:22 (56:40)**

Barcelona beat Zagreb once more to win their third consecutive EHF Champions League title. But at least as much news as the repeated triumph made the wedding of Barcelona player Inaki Urdangarin who married Christina, youngest daughter of Spanish King Juan Carlos and Queen Sofia, on 4th October 1997.

1998/99

**Final: Badel Zagreb vs FC Barcelona
22:22 / 18:29 (40:51)**

Once again there were tears in Zagreb and joy in Barcelona. The Spanish team beat Zagreb in their third consecutive final and lifted the EHF Champions League trophy for the fourth time in a row. Zagreb's coach Velimir Klajic had to admit that Barcelona "at this moment in time, were quite simply the best club team in the world."

1999/00

**Final: THW Kiel – FC Barcelona
28:25 / 24:29 (52:54)**

THW Kiel became the first German team to make it into the Final but even a 28:25-victory in the final's first leg was not enough to end Barcelona's EHF Champions League winning streak. Backed by half of the Spanish national team and international stars like Christian Schwarzer and Tomas Svensson, Barcelona won their fifth title.

2000/01

**Final: Portland San Antonio – FC Barcelona
30:24 / 22:25 (52:49)**

For Barcelona it was a whole new feeling to watch another team celebrating at the end of the Champions League Final. Following five consecutive titles an era came to end when Spanish King Juan Carlos handed the huge trophy to Portland San Antonio at the end of all-Spanish Final.

2001/02

**Final: Fotex Veszprem vs SC Magdeburg
23:21 / 25:30 (48:51)**

One year after Barcelona's dominance had ended in the EHF Champions League, the dominance of Spanish clubs also came to an end, when SC Magdeburg became the first German team to win the competition. And late at night, at the end of a glittering party, Stefan Kretzschmar and coach Alfred Gislason were still up for jokes: "Training is on the agenda. The entire team is going to run through the whole town until 08:00 tomorrow morning," they said.

2002/03

**Final: Portland San Antonio – Montpellier HB
27:19 / 19:31 (46:50)**

A new star was born during the finals of the 2002/03 EHF Champions League season. Montpellier's Nikola Karabatic scored 11 goals in the first leg in Spain and another six in front of his home fans, enabling his team to turn around the eight goal defeat from the first leg and to become the first French side to win the CL.

2003/04

**Final: Celje vs Flensburg- Handewitt
34:28 / 28:30 (62:58)**

In March 2003 the EHF had decided on a new structure for the competition. Three teams from Spain and Germany now had a starting slot. Two representatives from Hungary, Slovenia, Denmark and Croatia would start in the Group Phase. Overall 32 teams (8 groups of 4 teams each) made up the Group Phase. Flensburg had

profited from the new system but Slovenian side Celje was too strong in the final.

2004/05

**Final: BM Ciudad Real vs FC Barcelona Cifec
28:27 / 27:29 (55:56)**

Following four years without being present in the final, Barcelona won their sixth EHF Champions League title. And while the spectator record for one match was 10,000 fans, the whole city celebrated Barcelona's victory. "We did a lap of honour in the Stadion Nou Camp in front of 100,000 spectators and were celebrated by the whole town," remembers Barcelona's Dane Lars Krogh Jeppesen.

2005/06

**Final: Portland San Antonio vs BM Ciudad Real
19:25 / 28:37 (47:62)**

Spanish businessman and BM Ciudad Real president, Domingo Diaz de Mera, had put together a team that proved to be unbeatable in the 2005/06 Champions League season. Mera bought superstars from all over Europe and the team around Olafur Stefansson, Mirza Dzomba, Didier Dinart et al. paid justified Mera's expenses when they beat Spanish rival San Antonio in the final.

2006/07

**Final: SG Flensburg- Handewitt vs THW Kiel
28:28 / 27:29 (55:57)**

The EHF Champions League, through the efforts of the 2005 founded EHF Marketing GmbH, became a unified look. Since 2006, TV spectators across Europe know they are watching a men's EHF Champions League match when they see the distinct blue lagoon and black supplied by flooring specialists Gerfloor in addition to the season's individual yellow and blue handball supplied by adidas. On the sport side of things, Kiel won their first EHF Champions League title, beating arch rival Flensburg-Handewitt.

2007 – 2019

2007/08

BM Ciudad Real vs THW Kiel 27:29 / 31:25 (58:54)

In the 2007/08 season a second Group Phase with four groups of four teams each replaced the Last 16-matches and the quarter-finals.

The first teams of each group qualified for the semi-finals and in the final 2006 champion Ciudad Real faced 2007 champion THW Kiel. The Spanish side prevailed and could win their second EHF Champions League trophy.

2008/09

THW Kiel vs BM Ciudad Real 39:34 / 27:33 (66:67)

THW Kiel and BM Ciudad Real faced each other in the final for the second year in a row and even though Kiel had won the first leg of the final by five goals, it was Ciudad Real that won the EHF Champions League for a second consecutive time. Kiel were still in the lead by 20:16 after 39 minutes but with a series of 10:3 goals within 11 minutes Ciudad Real turned the match in their favour.

2009/10

FC Barcelona Borges vs HW Kiel 34:36

In the 2009/10 season the number of participating teams in the first Group Phase was reduced from 32 to 24. Four groups of six teams each were formed and the first four teams qualified for the knockout phase which replaced the second group phase. For the first time the VELUX EHF FINAL4 tournament, which combined the Semi-finals and the Final, was held in Cologne, Germany, to decide the champion. THW Kiel won their second title when they beat Barcelona.

2010/11

FC Barcelona vs Renovalia Ciudad Real 27:24

Since 2010 the event is known as the VELUX EHF Champions League. 40,000 fans stormed

to Cologne to attend the VELUX EHF FINAL4 weekend and TV viewing audience figures went to a new height. 310 million viewers from 76 countries worldwide watched 2,800 hours of TV transmissions 2010/11. Barcelona extended their lead as the most successful club in EHF Champions League history when won their seventh title, beating Ciudad Real in the Final.

2011/12

THW Kiel vs BM Atletico Madrid 26:21

The German powerhouse sensationally lost in their first home match of the season against Montpellier, but no other team was able to overcome THW Kiel throughout the remaining of the season. Gíslason led his team to the third trophy in the club's history becoming the first coach who won with two different teams. Defending champions from Barcelona were eliminated in the quarter-finals by AG København, but the Danish side was stopped in the semi-final by Atlético Madrid, who made it to the VELUX EHF FINAL4 for the fourth time in a row.

2012/13

FC Barcelona vs HSV Hamburg 29:30 AET

For the first time the extra-time had to decide the winner. In 20 years of EHF Champions League history there have only been two champions, Montpellier in 2003 and Celje in 2004, who neither came from Spain nor from Germany. The All-Stars team of the 20 years were announced: Goalkeeper Tomas Svensson (SWE), Left Wing Stefan Kretzschmar (GER), Left Back Filip Jícha (CZE), Line Player Andrei Xepkin (ESP), Centre Back Jackson Richardson (FRA), Right Back Oláfur Stefansson (ISL), Right Wing Mirza Džomba (CRO), Best defender Didier Dinart (FRA)

2013/14

SG Flensburg-Handewitt vs THW Kiel 30:28

For the third year in a row a team from Northern Germany prevailed as SG Flensburg-Handewitt took both of their opponents at the VELUX EHF FINAL4 by surprise. In the semi-final the “Vranjes boys” eliminated giants of FC Barcelona after a penalty-shoot-out thriller and made the Cinderella story perfect by beating their neighbours from Kiel 30:28 in the final.

2014/15

FC Barcelona vs MKB-MVM Veszprem 28:23

The defending champions from SG Flensburg-Handewitt were eliminated already in the Last 16 as well as Rhein-Neckar Löwen. The end of the three-year-old reign of Bundesliga was sealed only in Cologne as THW Kiel were unable to repeat their 2014 semi-final win against Veszprem. However, the effort of Hungarian champions for their premiere trophy were denied by FC Barcelona who rose to the throne for the eighth time in the EHF history.

2015/16

KS Vive Tauron Kielce vs MVM Veszprem 39:38 after 7m shootout

This final went down to history books of the Champions League as a breathtaking classic. Deep in the second half Veszprem were leading by nine goals, still Kielce put up a spirited fight to force the extra-time. Even the additional ten minutes could not solve the thriller and in the 7m shootout Kielce were luckier with Julen Aguinagalde’s last effort clinched the maiden title for the Polish champions adding only fifth country to the list of winners.

2016/17

Paris Saint-Germain Handball vs HC Vardar 23:24

For the first time in history no German team made it to the EHF FINAL4. The sold-out arena still saw yet another edition of some showcase handball and three out of four matches ended in only one goal differences. HC Vardar beat the buzzer for two days in a row as Luka Cindric

sank FC Barcelona Lassa in the semi-final and Ivan Cupic clinched the maiden title for the Macedonian team in the final against PSG sending their country into a handball frenzy.

2017/18

HBC Nantes vs Montpellier HB 27:32

In its 25th anniversary the European top flight once again underlined the rule that favourites cannot take anything for granted in this fierce competition. No fewer than three French teams made it to the final tournament in Cologne and after both finalists from the previous edition (Vardar and PSG) failed in the semi-finals it was a showdown between two pre-season underdogs HBC Nantes and Montpellier HB in the final. Mainly courtesy of a brilliant performance of their playmaker Diego Simonet Montpellier returned to the European throne after 15 years and became the first team from Group C or D with this achievement.

2018/19

HC Vardar vs Telekom Veszprém HC 27:24

The Macedonian champions unexpectedly returned to the throne. Despite losing several key players in the summer and during the season Vardar reached their third VELUX EHF FINAL4 in a row. After having stunned Barcelona in the semi-finals they held the upper hand throughout the whole final over Veszprem, whose losing streak in the Champions League finals was extended to four games. After what many saw as the club’s last shot at glory tens of thousands of people were welcoming the champions in the streets of Skopje.

I HISTORY: 28 YEARS OF EHF CHAMPIONS LEAGUE MEN

2020 – 2021

2019/20

THW Kiel vs Barça 33:28

For the first time in the history of the competition, the final of the EHF Champions League could only be played halfway through the following season. In March 2020, the Covid-19 pandemic put the Champions League on hold after the group phase. The Last 16 and the quarter-finals had to be cancelled, but the EHF FINAL4 could be played - on 28/29 December, more than six months after its initial date. It didn't seem to bother Kiel, who had returned to the competition in the 2019/20 season after one year in the EHF Cup. The German side didn't arrive as the tournament favourites in Cologne, but edged Veszprém in the semi-finals before upsetting Barça 33:28 in the final to claim their fourth title, but first in eight years.

2020/21

Barça vs Aalborg Håndbold 36:23

Two clubs who had a stunning season, each in their own way, made it all the way to the final in Cologne in June 2021, and this time favourites Barça truly delivered and took their ninth title. In what was head coach Xavi Pascual's last match in charge, the Spanish champions eased past Aalborg to complete a perfect season: 20 matches played, 20 matches won - a feat never seen before in the EHF Champions League. The success story of Aalborg was also impressive: the Danish side didn't have an outstanding group phase campaign but grew stronger and stronger as the season progressed. They beat Flensburg in the quarter-final to get to their maiden EHF FINAL4, where they defeated PSG in the semi-final, only for their fairy-tale run coming to an end in the final. What a season it was!



THIRTEEN A LUCKY NUMBER FOR COLOGNE

The EHF FINAL4 is the culmination of the European handball season. The two-day event sees the best four men's teams in Europe playing to decide the ultimate winner of the EHF Champions League Men. The 2022 edition will take place on 18/19 June in Cologne, which hosts the event for the 13th straight time.

Introduced in the 2009/10 season and to be played until at least 2024 in the LANXESS arena, the decision to create a new format for the final phase of the EHF Champions League was seen as crucial for the growth of handball across Europe. The aim was to create a flagship event, one that could compete on the international sports market and make the Europe's leading club competition even more attractive to fans, partners and sponsors.

The success of all previous editions of the EHF FINAL4 up to date showed that this format has been the right strategy. It has set new standards in organisation and entertainment; it is not just

four games played over two days but a true entertainment event. The 2021 tournament is still resonating in the most handball lovers' memories as the season's highlight in European handball as millions of fans watched four unforgettable handball games, unique entertainment shows and Barça's return to the European throne.

The success of the EHF FINAL4 is also thanks to the commitment of a great number of volunteers who have been active on the weekend of the event. The preparations for the event have already started and it is planned to welcome volunteers back to the arena.

I THE WINNERS' TROPHY AWAITS

Following their win in the EHF Champions League Men final the players of Barça not only booked their ninth EHF Champions League title but also became the first men's team to lift the brand new trophy. The ultimate prize for Europe's elite handball clubs has been revealed on the fringes of the start of 2020/21 season and will be seen after final battles also in many seasons to come.

One design has emerged from 27 submissions across 12 European nations to become the new EHF Champions League trophy. With a new era of European handball on the horizon, EHF Marketing launched a public tender with the goal of finding the best possible new trophy design for the EHF Champions League. A Spanish agency based in Barcelona, specialising in the design and production of environmentally responsible trophies came out victorious from the tender.

The core idea of the trophy was to represent a goal as the main objective of the sport, to reflect the dynamic movement of a ball hitting the target and to transmit handball as a team sport by forming the net in the shape of a shield. The net itself symbolises the needed connection within a team - all for one and one for all. For the first time, the design is the same for both men's and women's competitions and every element from the font to the logo fits the new competition identity. The materials of which the trophies consist of are aluminium cast (30% recycled aluminium) for the body and base, and recycled balls used for the sculptural ball which hits the net. A golden bath covers the trophies, making sure they are in line with the new brand image, giving them the premium touch that all trophies need. The sustainability of the materials has been a key element in the choice of the winning design. The trophies are each 80 cm high, 57 cm wide and weigh 10 kg.

Also the medals have been designed in a way that resembles the pentagon-shaped panels of the ball's surface.



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
