DRAW PROCEDURE AND POTS

The Women's EHF EURO 2022 Qualifiers came to an end over the weekend when the last berths at the final tournament in Slovenia, North Macedonia and Montenegro in November were confirmed.

A total of 16 teams are now eagerly awaiting which three opponents they are going to meet in the preliminary round of the EHF EURO 2022.

That question will be answered during the draw on Thursday (28 April) at 17:00 CEST (live on EHFTV) at Ljubljana Castle in the Slovenian capital.

So, with 16 teams to be allocated over four groups, how does the draw exactly work? Let's first look at the participants.

Four teams were qualified directly for the EHF EURO 2022: the three co-hosts Slovenia, North Macedonia and Montenegro, as well as defending champions Norway. During the qualifiers, 12 more teams earned a place at the final tournament: Croatia, Denmark, France, Germany, Hungary, Netherlands, Poland, Romania, Serbia, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland.

For Thursday's draw, the 16 teams have been divided into four pots:

Pot 1: Norway, France, Denmark, Poland

Pot 2: Netherlands, Montenegro, Hungary, Sweden

Pot 3: Slovenia, North Macedonia, Croatia, Germany

Pot 4: Spain, Romania, Serbia, Switzerland

Four teams have already been placed in a specific group for the preliminary round: Hungary will play in group A in Ljubljana; Slovenia in group B in Celje; North Macedonia in group C in Skopje; and Montenegro in group D in Podgorica.

The draw will be conducted in the following order:

Step 1 – two teams of pot 3 are drawn to row 3

Step 2 – two teams of pot 2 are drawn to row 2

Step 3 – four teams of pot 4 are drawn to row 4

Step 4 – four teams of pot 1 are drawn to row 1

WOMEN'S EHF EURO 2022 BRAND AND LOGO



The Women's EHF EURO 2022 brand and logo were unveiled in March 2021 at the draw for the qualifiers.

The brand identity's palette takes colours linked to landscape and landmarks associated with Ljubljana, Celje, Skopje and Podgorica as well as the national flags of the three nations.

Yellow, blue, red and green are the prominent colours of the logo, blended around an image of a heart, designed to show the team unity and spirit in handball and the respect of the competition.

The additional elements of the logo, which was developed by Roy Wedema – who was also responsible for the Men's and Women's EHF EURO 2020 logos – are linked to the motion, dynamics and celebrations associated with handball.

The logo brings together all these elements into a single, vibrant whole that encapsulates the joy of handball and the excitement of the competition.




EHF EURO 2022 HOSTS & VENUES

The EHF EURO 2022 will be the 15th edition of the tournament and the last to feature 16 national teams before it expands to 24 teams in 2024. It will be co-hosted in three countries, Slovenia, North Macedonia and Montenegro, whose joint bid to host the championship succeeded at the 14th EHF Ordinary Congress in Glasgow, Scotland in June 2018. While Macedonians hosted the tournament in 2008, for both Slovenia and Montenegro it will be their first Women's EHF EURO on the home court.

The EHF EURO 2022 will be hosted by Celje (preliminary round), Podgorica (preliminary round), Skopje (preliminary round and main round) and Ljubljana (preliminary round, main round and final weekend) from 4-20 November 2022.

The playing system with four preliminary round groups and two main round remains the same as in 2020.
