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
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

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CORONAVIRUS MEASURES

These measures are to be applied for all persons involved in the championship:

- Wash your hands several times a day with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand disinfectant
- Media representatives are recommended to each carry a personal hand sanitiser
- Always wear a mask fully covering mouth and nose in public areas. Face shields do not offer enough protection and should therefore not be used as a stand-alone protective measure. In the arena, masks can be taken off when seated.

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- Turn away from other persons near you if you need to cough or sneeze
- Cover mouth and nose with a paper towel or the crook of your arm whenever you cough or sneeze and dispose paper tissues promptly
- Maintain social distancing. A distance of at least 2m is recommended wherever possible
- Do not shake hands with other people
- Avoid busy places (even where social distancing measures are in place) and large crowds of people
- Avoid public transport
- Avoid carpooling
- Be aware of all the symptoms of Covid-19 and notify medical staff if symptoms appear

Face masks & hand sanitiser

Face masks covering the mouth and nose must be worn by all media representatives in the arena at all times except when seated. The only exception are persons working in front of the camera, TV and radio commentators. Those persons are permitted to work without face masks for the period of the TV transmission. Failure of wearing face masks will be reported to the Tournament Management and might result in revoking the accreditation. Hand sanitiser will be provided in all public areas in the playing hall. Hand Sanitiser must be used regularly, and in particular must be used by everyone entering the arena.

MEDIA SERVICES

The accreditation centre opens on 30 November and you can collect your accreditation there. If you have indicated another venue on the accreditation platform than the one you will actually collect it at, it will not be a problem. Please bear in mind that in order to collect your accreditation, you need to:

- Present a negative test not older than 72 hrs

Transport

A media shuttle operates between the media hotels and the competition venues in Herning and Kolding on match days. It is reserved only for media staying at the media hotel.

Catering

Hot meals have to be pre-ordered and the price per meal is €10. Each meal will consist of a main course and a desert. Vegan options will also be available. Due to one person one seat policy, there will not be a dedicated dining area. Media representatives will have to pick-up the food from the catering area and bring it to their assigned seat. Sandwiches, snacks and beverages will be available for free in an area close to the media tribune.

Technology

Media Wi-Fi is available in all media areas: connection information is available at the media info desk on the media tribune.

Cable connections are available at the press and photo positions as well as in the media tribune. Should you have any issue with the internet connection, the LOC media team can help you.

Live streaming

All matches will be available live and on-demand via the EHF's official OTT platform, EHFTV, with geo-blocking applying in selected countries.

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Live ticker

All matches will be available on the EHF EURO's live ticker with up-tothe-second updates. The service can be accessed via the official website ehf-euro.com

Statistics

Extensive statistics will be provided and will be available to download from the official website - *ehf-euro.com*. For health reasons, the availability of printed copies will be reduced to the absolute minimum necessary and all teams are asked to use the pdfs available on the website.

MEDIA OPERATIONS

Due to strict Covid-19 measures in Denmark but also in order to safeguard the tournament and minimise the chances for potential infection, media operations at the Women's EHF EURO 2020 will be changed.

Media centre

Due to "one person one seat policy" there will be no media centre in arenas in Herning and Kolding. Each media representative will be assigned with a table at the media tribune which he/she will occupy until the end of the tournament.

There will be an Info desk at the media tribune where you will be able to get necessary information. Additionally, photographers will be able to pick-up their photo bibs at the info desk.

For health reasons, the availability of printed copies will be reduced to the absolute minimum necessary and all media representatives are asked to use the PDFs and live statistics available on the website.

Online media centre

All media representatives will be invited to join the online media centre on Microsoft Teams which will be administrated by the EHF.

Through the online media centre, all media representatives will be able to access conference calls for mixed zone, press conference and media calls. In addition, members of the EHF media team will be posting important updates in the online media centre.

Mixed zone

There will be no physical presence possible in the mixed zone. Instead, media representatives will be able to join the mixed zone via MS Teams. The mixed zone will be conducted only in the respective native language of the teams involved in the match.

Direct connection to the mixed zone will be available in the online media centre. The links to the conference calls will also be available through the email new service.

Post-match press conference

Media presence will be possible for the post-match press conferences and media representatives covering the event remotely will also be able to join via MS Teams.

The post-match press conference will be conducted in two parts. 15 minutes after the end of the match, the losing team will arrive with two players and the coach. The winning team will come 30 minutes after the match also with two players and the coach. The maximum duration of the press conference will be 15 minutes.

The media covering the event remotely will be able to ask questions through chat function of MS Team conference calls. The moderator will ask a maximum of five questions from the remote media representatives The first part of the press conference will be conducted in English, after that the moderator will open the floor to the questions in the respective native languages for the media representatives on-site.

Direct connection to the press conference will be available in the online media centre and the link will also be shared through the email news service.

Media calls

All participating teams are required to hold a media call for the international media on match day -1 before the preliminary and main rounds.

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The media calls will be held via MS Teams from the team hotels. No physical media presence will be allowed.

Direct connection to the media call will be available in the online media centre and the link will also be shared through the email news service.

Open training sessions

There will be no open training sessions in the playing arena.





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SPECIAL MEDIA ACTIVITIES

Preliminary round & main round

The teams themselves will organise a minimum of one media call, and one of these must be open to international media.

For the main round, teams themselves will organise a minimum of one media call, and one of these must be open to international media. Detailed information will be provided.

Final weekend in Herning

17 December - TBC

Semi-finals press conference, with head coach and one player from each semi-final team.

Teams playing placement match 5/6 need to organise a media call open to international media.

19 December - TBC

Finalists and bronze medial match press conference with head coach and one key player from each team. Up to four more players will be available for flash interviews (right holders only).



PHOTO OPERATIONS

Photographers have photo positions behind the goals. Lockable lockers where they can leave their equipment can be found in the proximity of the media tribune. They have access to the media Wi-Fi and cabled connections.

Photo briefing

A photo briefing will be sent to all accredited photographers via email.

Bib

In order to photograph you have to wear your photo bib at all times, as well as your accreditation. You can collect your photo bib at the info desk on the media tribune with an ID or your press card and a deposit. Please have the exact amount of money for the deposit (20€ or equivalent in DKK). You can pick up this document and the deposit when you return your bib.

It is forbidden to wear team or country outfits and we kindly ask you to wear an outfit as neutral as possible.

Due to Covid-19 measures, photographers are not allowed to exchange bibs with other photographers. Once the bib has been taken, needs to be kept until the end of the respective photographers' stay at the Women's EHF EURO 2020.

Photo positions

Photo positions are located behind the goals. You must wear your accreditation and your bib to be able to access them.

Photographers are requested to take their places in the photo positions ahead of the start of each game.

It is mandatory to remain seated during a match and it is forbidden to enter the field of play.

Changing sides is only possible at half-time and it is forbidden to cross the field of play to do so: the adequate routing will be presented in the photo briefing.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, the number of photographers' seats behind the goals will be limited to a maximum of six on each side of the court. Seats will therefore be allocated by the EHF. Priority will be given to the EHF photographers, major agencies, team photographers and national media of the teams playing. Subject to approval, a certain amount of remaining photographers, who have not be allocated with a seat behind the goal, shall be able to take photos from the stands.

Mixed zone and press conference

Photographers are not allowed to access the mixed zone.

Photographing the press conference is allowed, however only if using the camera platform and provided there is enough space and it does not trouble the cameras in place.

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Locker

If you would like a locker, you may register at the info desk at the media tribune: a key will be given to you, which we kindly ask you to return before you leave.



MEDAL CEREMONY

For the EHF EURO 2020, positions 1 – 3 (Gold, Silver and Bronze) will be awarded directly after the final. Position 4 will be awarded gifts after the match 3/4.

The All-star Team will be announced via a video clip in the arena, on the website and all social media channels on the final match day.

Awards will be handed over to the players' in course of the Player of the Match Award Ceremony after the Bronze Medal Match and the Final.

The handover of the Player of the Match Award as well as the All-star Team Award will be carried out in a way that players collect their award by themselves from a podium.

Players who are part of the All-star Team and not playing at the final day will be awarded in an unofficial way (if there is a change to this the EHF will inform the DEN OC). The Player of the Match Award procedure will take place directly after both bronze and gold medal matches.


The Women's EHF EURO 2020 will become the first European Championship in handball history completely led by female referees.

On 9 October the EHF released the names of the 10 referee pairs set to officiate at the tournament in Denmark (3-20 December).

Five couples will lead the games in Herning, which will stage matches in all three phases of the competition: preliminary round, main round and final weekend. Another five couples will be in charge of the matches in Kolding, which will host games in the preliminary round and also see the main round action.

Five pairs of referees will be nominated for the final weekend in Herning (18-20 December), while the remaining five couples will return home after the main round.

LEGAL PROCEDURES

Presentation

At an EHF EURO, the administration of justice is in the hands of two bodies, i.e. the Disciplinary Commission and the Jury. The Disciplinary Commission constitutes the body of first instance, which decisions can be appealed to the Jury acting as a body in second instance. Both instances together may also be referred to as the ad hoc bodies. Both ad hoc bodies are composed by members of the Court of Handball and Court of Appeal acting as ad hoc bodies.

Composition

To rule upon a case, each commission is composed of a Chairman and 2 members. The members are nominated by the President and two of the relevant body on a case by case basis to ensure the independence and the impartiality of the decisions rendered by the legal bodies. For example, if a case arises from a match between Sweden and Poland, members of the Disciplinary Commission from these two national federations will not be part of the deciding panel.

Competence

The ad hoc bodies are competent to settle protests filed in by participating teams, cases relating to regulations infringements and disciplinary situations such as direct disqualifications.

Handling

Regardless the nature of the situation, proceedings are handled following an express procedure to comply with the need of quickness and effectiveness inherent to an EHF EURO. For example, to ensure the balance of the competition, decisions relating to a direct disqualification are rendered before the next match of the concerned player and team.

France have been crowned world champions twice, in 2003 and 2017, and come into EHF EURO 2020 as reigning champions after triumphing on home soil in 2018.

The French women's national team have always delivered a high performance at major international competitions. Under the leadership of Olivier Krumbholz since 1998, they have consistently proven their ability to adapt to the evolution of the sport and always maintain a top level.

Les Bleues are feared for their fabulous ability to never do what you expect them to, and always play with a signature touch of extravagance. They take pleasure in competing at the highest level and in playing together as a group. Their playing style is built on solid foundations, with fast offensive play and an impermeable defence, but the French players have the opportunity to express themselves freely on the field and often deliver improbably audacious shots.

This year is the fourth time that Denmark will host the EHF EURO, and Denmark have – together with Norway, Germany, Russia and Hungary – participated in every European Championship since the beginning in 1994.

The Danish national team have won a total of five medals through the years at the EHF EURO, giving them the second-best record of all the nations, behind Norway. Their record includes three gold medals in 1994, 1996 and 2002. However their last European

podium spot came back in 2004, when the Danes grabbed the silver medal at the EHF EURO in Hungary.

Denmark are bringing a young, talented squad to the EHF EURO 2020, but it also includes experienced stars such as goalkeeper Sandra Toft and right wing Trine Østergaard. Under the leadership of new coach Jesper Jensen the team will be hoping to step back on the path to international medals as they compete once again on home turf.

The women's handball team has consistently been one of the most successful national sports teams in Montenegro after the country became an independent state in 2006.

In 2012, the women's handball team won Montenegro's only Olympic medal to date at the London Olympic Games. In the same year, the Lionesses went on to win EHF EURO in Belgrade.

Since 2006, Montenegro has been a regular participant in major competitions, appearing five times at EHF EURO (2010, 2012, 2014, 2016 and 2018), five times at the Women's IHF World Championship (2011, 2013, 2015, 2017 and 2019), as well as twice at the Olympic Games (2012 and 2016).

Montenegro arrive at the EHF EURO 2020 with a brand-new coach, Dane Kim Rasmussen, who previously coached Poland and Hungary before being appointed to the Montenegro role in November 2020.

The team is lacking some of its big names, with former captain Milena Raičević on maternity leave and Katarina Bulatović having retired. Yet it includes some up-and-coming stars like centre back Matea Pletikosic, who has excelled for RK Krim Mercator at club level this season..

SLOVENIA





Slovenia are now firmly established back on the international handball scene after many years fighting to qualify for international events. EHF EURO 2020 is their fifth consecutive appearance at a major competition.

In 2016, they returned to the EHF EURO after a six-year wait, playing their fifth campaign and ranking 14th. In 2017, they qualified for the World Championship for the first time since 2005, where they impressed with their strong performances – including an opening win against France, who were then Olympic silver medallists and EHF EURO 2016 bronze medallists. France went on to win the world title, and Slovenia were the only side that beat them on that path.

In France two years ago, the Slovenians were eliminated at the preliminary round stage on goal difference, with the French team responsible for their elimination. France await Uroš Bregar's team once more at EHF EURO 2020.

Slovenia have showed they can challenge any team and that their main stars are serious threats. However, they have never ranked higher than eighth at a major event, so the first goal is to reach the main round and seek their best-ever ranking.

Russian women's handball team has one of the best records of any of the nations competing at EHF EURO 2020. In 2001 Russia won the Women's IHF World Championship in Italy and has since clinched this title three more times in a row – in 2005, 2007 and 2009, as well as winning bronze last year.

At European level, Russia won bronze at the EHF EURO 2000 in Romania and followed up with silver in 2006 and 2018 and another bronze in 2008 – although EURO gold has so far eluded the team.

Russia added Olympic silver in 2008 after being beaten by Norway in the final, but notched up eight consecutive wins at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games to win their first Olympic title. Daria Dmitrieva and Polina Kuznetsova were elected to the All-Star team and Anna Vyakhireva was MVP of the tournament.

After the Olympics in Rio the coaching staff made huge changes to the Russian national team's squad. Several players retired or suspended their careers, but this did not prevent further success at European and world level in 2018 and 2019. Russia surely remains a significant threat at EHF EURO 2020.

In 2010 the Swedish women's team reached the final of a major championship for the first time in its history, losing to co-hosts Norway at EHF EURO but winning Sweden's first senior championship medal.

The Swedes have since consistently reached the final stages of big tournaments. At EHF EURO 2014 Sweden made it to the semi-finals again, this time winning bronze. The first semi-final at a World Championship came three years ago after winning the group, beating Slovenia in the round of 16 and Denmark in the quarter-finals.

In the semi-final Sweden lost by just one goal to the future world champions France and finished fourth in the tournament after losing to the Netherlands in the bronze medal game.

With sixth and seventh places at the EHF EURO 2018 and the World Championship 2019, Sweden showed they are now used to performing at a high level. They come to EHF EURO 2020 with a new coach, Tomas Axnér, and a team packed with a mixture of stars like Isabelle Gulldén and exciting young players such as Emma Rask.

Although Spain have won medals at all three major championships since their first EHF EURO silver in 2008, they are yet to win gold, meaning the stakes are high as they arrive in Denmark.

The Spanish team heading for EHF EURO 2020 will be aiming to improve on their 12th place finish at the last European Championship, but have plenty of confidence after winning silver at the World Championship last year.

Although the Spaniards are missing the likes of left back Alexandrina Barbosa, who was part of the All-star Team in Japan but is out of the EURO through injury, they will still expect to reach the final weekend in Herning – provided other key players, such as Nerea Pena and Alicia Fernandez, can step up.

Spain are led by coach Carlos Viver, who has been in charge since 2017. Since he took on the job, Viver has refreshed the squad, giving seven players their debut at the World Championship in 2017 and another five at EHF EURO 2018, leading to Spanish success last year.

The Czech national women's handball team is on the rise. Coach Jan Bašný is the longest-serving national coach at EHF EURO, having led the Czech women since 2010, and has overseen a consistent improvement in performance since he took over.

The Czech Republic featured at the EHF EURO in 2012, 2016 and 2018 as well as the World Championship in 2013 and 2017. They finished eighth at EHF EURO 2002, and reached this height again at the World Championship 2017 when they defeated Romania in the round of 16 and finished eighth overall.

A focus on youth programmes which has included hosting younger age category EHF EURO and World Championship events has led to several players looking to boost their careers abroad, mainly in Germany, Hungary and France.

Among the Czechs to watch in Denmark are rising stars Marketa Jeřábková, the seventh best scorer of the World Championship 2017 in Germany, and wings Veronika Malá and Jana Knedlíková.

NETHERLANDS





The Dutch national women's handball team has been quite successful in recent years, reaching the semifinals at all of the last six major tournaments played.

At the World Championship 2015 the Netherlands won their first-ever silver medal ever, and followed up with another silver at EHF EURO 2016. They narrowly missed out on a medal at their debut Olympic Games in 2016, finishing fourth.

The Netherlands collected bronze medals at the World Championship in Germany in 2017 and at the EHF EURO in France in 2018, but their biggest triumph

came in Japan last year when they won their first World Championship title under the leadership of new coach Emmanuel Mayonnade.

Mayonnade remains in charge as the Dutch travel to Denmark for EHF EURO 2020, leading a squad that includes World Championship 2019 top scorer Lois Abbingh and All-star Team goalkeeper Tess Wester, as well as EHF EURO 2018 best defender Kelly Dulfer. A maiden EHF EURO title is surely in the Netherlands' sights.

HUNGARY





The history of the Hungarian women's national team is full of success. Until 2012, Hungary was the only non-Scandinavian team to have ever won the women's EHF EURO, with gold in 2000 and bronze medals in 1998, 2004 and 2012. The recent EURO success followed a World Championship title in 1965 and several silver and bronze medals in the 1950s to early 1980s.

The new golden era started in the mid-1990s, and Hungary was one of the most successful teams in women's handball between 1995 and 2005. From 1993 until 2011 Hungary participated in all major championships and consistently finished in the top six between 1998 and 2006.

Hungary's most recent international results include seventh at the 2018 EHF EURO, and 14th position at the World Championship 2019. The team has never missed an EHF EURO.

The Hungarian team is led by Gábor Danyi and Gábor Elek, who coach the two most successful Hungarian clubs in recent years, Györ and FTC – whose players form the backbone of the national team. Hungary can also count on advice from veteran Györ player Anita Görbicz, who will act as an adviser in Denmark rather than featuring on the squad.

The Serbian national team has participated at Women's EHF EURO events since 2008 in North Macedonia. The team's biggest success so far is silver at the Women's World Championship 2013 in Belgrade, where the final match against Brazil was attended by a record number of fans (19,400). Serbia's best results at the EHF EURO is fourth at the same venue in 2012.

Serbia failed to qualify for the EHF EURO main round in 2008, 2010 and 2014. At EHF EURO 2018 in France Ljubomir Obradovic's team finished 11th.

They improved on this result at the World Championship 2019 with a sixth-place finish, giving them a spot at the Olympic qualification tournament which will be held in March 2021.

Serbia's squad for EHF EURO 2020 includes several players with significant international experience, perhaps most notably Andrea Lekić, who was All-star Team centre back at EHF EURO 2012 and IHF Player of the Year in 2013, and captain Katarina Krpež-Šlezak, who recently returned to the court after maternity leave.

The EHF EURO 2020 is the 10th European Championship for the Croatian women and their eighth in a row.

Their best result so far saw Croatia finish fifth at EHF EURO 1994. They also reached the quarter-finals at the World Championship in 1997, and participated at the Olympic Games in London 2012.

Croatia have lost several strong players who featured at the EHF EURO 2018 in France, including Marina Glavan, Ana Turk and Kristina Plahinek. But there are several very young and talented players who are ready to shine on the European stage, such as Lucija Bešen, Nikolina Zadravec and Lea Franušić. After a long time, Camila Micijevic and Marijeta Vidak have also returned to the national team.

Perhaps all eyes will be on centre back Dejana Milosavljevic, who has had an outstanding season so far for HC Podravka Vegeta. Milosavljevic is one of a number of Podravka players on the Croatia squad for EHF EURO 2020, giving coach Nenad Sostaric a solid foundation to work with.



ROMANIA





Romania have a long tradition on the international stage, having never failed to qualify for a World Championship and missing only one EHF EURO, in 2006. The team always aim to rank among the best, but have not had the same success at EHF EUROs as at World Championships. Romania's EHF EURO medal record is one bronze, from 2010.

However, two years ago in France, the side came close to reaching the final, losing out to Russia by six goals in the semi-final. In the end Romania finished fourth after defeat to the Netherlands in the fight for bronze – still their joint-second best performance at an EHF EURO.

This year, having won both qualification matches before the Covid-19 pandemic stopped play, the Romanians were drawn into a tough group containing hosts Norway, Germany and Poland.

The Romanian team is in a period of transition, developing young and talented players, but still relies heavily on four-time IHF World Player of the Year Cristina Neagu and other stars such as Crina Pintea and the exceptional goalkeepers Denisa Dedu and Yuliya Dumanska.

Norway have been the leading force in women's handball for the last decade. Their record in all competitions is outstanding, but their EHF EURO history is unrivalled. Norway hold the record for most trophies won, with seven – including four consecutive titles from 2004 to 2010. They have won three World Championship trophies and collected two Olympic titles, along with 15 silver and bronze medals at the major competitions.

After winning their third World Championship in 2015, Norway suffered a minor setback, losing a thrilling extra-time semi-final at the 2016 Olympic Games to eventual champions Russia. That defeat meant they could not defend the Olympic gold won in 2008 and 2012.

At the EHF EURO 2016, coach Thorir Hergeirsson's team struck back, winning their seventh EHF EURO title by beating the Netherlands in the final – a success that was followed by their silver-medal performance at the Women's World Championship 2017.

Having failed to land a medal at the past EHF EURO in 2018 and at the World Championship in 2019, hopes are high for a return to the podium in 2020.

Since Henk Groener took over as head coach in January 2018, the German team has been in transition mode with only one player, team captain Kim Naidzinavicius, holding more than 100 caps.

A new generation started their long-term mission at the EHF EURO 2018 in France, when one goal against Hungary in the main round prevented Germany from securing a top six finish. At the World Championship 2019 in Japan history repeated itself: one goal was missing against Serbia in order to secure a semifinal spot and a place at the Olympic qualification tournaments. In the end, the young German team finished eighth, and the Olympic dream has to wait.

With many rising stars playing at international level for top clubs in the DELO EHF Champions League, including Dinah Eckerle, Emily Bölk, Alicia Stolle and Evgenija Minevsklaja, the team hope to start the EHF EURO 2020 with more experience and consistency.

Germany have not missed a European Championship since the first EHF EURO in 1994, when they won silver – but are yet to collect more European silverware. Twice, in 2006 and 2008, Germany made it to the semifinals, but finished fourth on both occasions. Now, the race for a medal is on again.

Poland enter the Women's EHF EURO 2020 with a new head coach following Arne Senstad's arrival in August 2019. The Norwegian took over from Leszek Krowicki and got off to a great start with five successive victories, including two wins in the EHF EURO qualifiers against the Faroe Islands and Ukraine.

This year the Polish team will be aiming to improve on their previous EHF EURO performances that have seen then not finish higher than eighth since 2006. The Poles' best record in the competition came back in 1998 when the team finished fifth, but Senstad's side face a tough ask in their bid to progress from the group phase.

The task is made harder by the lack of stars Karolina Kudlacz-Gloc (shoulder injury), Monika Kobylinska (torn ligaments) and Kinga Achruk (maternity leave), who represented the backcourt axis at the World Championships in 2013 and 2015, when Poland reached the semi-finals.

However there are other players who may well step up, such as left wing Kinga Grzyb, goalkeeper Adriana Płaczek and line player Joanna Drabik.



25th Women's IHF World Championship in Spain

The 25th Women's IHF World Championship, to be held between 2 and 19 December 2021, will be the first time Spain has hosted a major women's handball event, and also the first Women's World Championship featuring 32 teams instead of 24.

Besides hosts Spain and the Netherlands, who were gold medallists in Japan last year, another 14 European teams will be part of this tournament. The four best-ranked teams of the EHF EURO 2020 in Denmark – excluding Spain and the Netherlands, whose places are already booked – will directly qualify for the world championship. The remaining 10 spots will be decided in play-offs in April 2021; all EHF EURO 2020 teams not qualifying directly will be put in pot 1 for the play-offs.

Women's EHF EURO 2022 in Slovenia, Montenegro and North Macedonia

The Women's EHF EURO 2022 will take place in November for the first time, with the tournament hosted by Slovenia, Montenegro and North Macedonia to be played between 4 and 20 November 2022.

It is the first time ever that three nations have jointly organised a Women's EHF EURO, with the hosts awarded the tournament at the 2017 EHF Congress in Glasgow. The shift in date from December is intended to avoid the EHF EURO from clashing with the 2022 FIFA World Cup in Qatar, which takes place from the end of November through to December that year.

In addition to the three hosts, who qualify automatically for the tournament, the EHF EURO 2020 champion will also directly qualify. They will play the first ever Women's EHF EURO Cup in home and away matches against the three hosts, at the same time as the six qualification rounds for the 12 remaining spots for the EHF EURO 2022.





MULTIPLE EURO WINNERS

Three players to fight for their fifth trophy

There have been 40 winners of multiple trophies in the history of the Women's EHF EURO, including nine Norwegians who will play at the EHF EURO 2020.

Katrine Lunde, Marit Malm Frafjord and Camilla Herrem are all aiming for their fifth individual trophy at the EHF EURO 2020 in Denmark. This Norwegian trio with four titles each top the list of multiple EHF EURO winners who will play in Denmark this year.

If they succeed, they will join three other Norwegians who have each won five of the seven European championships won by Norway: Karoline Dyhre Breivang, Linn-Kristian Riegelhuth-Koren and Kari Aalvik Grimsbö.

Only one non-Norwegian is among the 11 players with three EHF EURO trophies: Danish goalkeeper Lene Rantala, who featured in the three Danish squads which won the trophy in 1994, 1996 and 2002.

As only Norway and Denmark have more than one trophy in their cabinet, no other nation is represented among the 40 multiple EHF EURO champions.

TOP SCORERS AND MVP AWARDS

Since 1996, a Norwegian player has been named Most Valuable Player (MVP) at a Women's EHF EURO five times. Denmark and Sweden have both been represented twice on the MVP list, joined by one player from each of Russia, Hungary and Netherlands.

Norway's Gro Hammerseng is the only player to be named MVP twice, in 2004 and 2006. Her wife Anja Edin-Hammerseng became MVP in 2012.

The MVP has been a goalkeeper just once: Karin Mortensen in 2002 on home ground, when the Danes won their most recent trophy. The MVP has also been the top scorer just once, in Hungary/Croatia in 2014 when the award was won by Swedish star Isabelle Gulldén.

The top scorer of the 12 Women's EHF EURO events from 1996 to 2018 come from nine countries. Norway again tops the list with three top scorers – Kjersti Grini, Linn-Kristin Riegelhuth-Koren and Nora Mørk. Hungary is represented by two top scorers, including Bojana Radulovic, the all-time record holder with 72 goals on home ground in 2004.

Six IHF World Players of the year, winning the award 10 times in total, are among the MVP and top scorers including four-time IHF World Player Cristina Neagu, who was top scorer of the EHF EURO 2010. Radulovic was named World Player twice, while Ausra Fridrikas (Austria), Nadine Krause (Germany), Hammerseng and Riegelhuth have all been IHF Player of the Year once.

Neagu, Gulldén, Nora Mørk and Serbia's Katarina Krpež-Šlezak will all be on court in Denmark.

OFFICAL MATCH BALL

Since the beginning of the 2016/17 season, SELECT SPORT has been providing the European Handball Federation with the official match balls for its club and national team competitions.

Following the use of SELECT balls at the Women's EHF EURO 2016 in Sweden, the Men's EHF EURO 2018 in Croatia, the Women's EHF EURO 2018 in France and the Men's EHF EURO 2020 in Sweden, Austria and

Norway the Women's EHF EURO 2020 marks the fifth time that a European Championship is played with a ball manufactured by the Danish company. The official match ball, which is part of SELECT's high-quality ULTIMATE series, has been designed exclusively for the championship in Denmark.

Red, blue and white – the colours dominant in the EHF EURO 2020 logo – are also the key colours in which the ball's panels have been designed. The logo itself can be found on two of the overall 32 panels.

These panels, 20 hexagons and 12 pentagons, ensure a perfect roundness, reliable aerodynamics, a straight flight and a controlled bounce. Furthermore, every ULTIMATE ball is stitched by hand. The 32 panels are sewn together using 630 double stitches and 60 corner stitches and are closed off (especially for SELECT) with a double knot.

Instant replay technologies

Several technological developments are in place at the Men's EHF EURO 2020. The use of them will also be clearly communicated to the spectators in the arena with the help of dedicated graphic icons shown on the arena cube.

Instant Replay Technology and Goal-line cameras

Instant replay offers the possibility to the referees to immediately watch a situation on a TV screen if they were not able to see the complete action on the court and if they wish to check again before reaching a decision. This specifically refers to key match situations where the referees decide to consult the TV picture additionally to their own view on the court.

The goal-line technology allows referees to utilise a number of cameras fixed to the goal to check whether the ball has crossed the goal-line. As the video is linked to the match clock, the referees can also check, if the ball crossed the goal-line before the end of half-time or full-time.

The use of both goal-line technology and instant replay (disqualification and consquences) is exclusively the responsibility of the referees and only the referees can decide to make use of it or not.

Goal-light

An LED light installed inside the goal lights up at the same time as the buzzer sounds for team timeouts and at the end of each half. This visual signal therefore provides all those involved in the match an additional signal to show that the time has stopped or ended. The signal also provides further help to the referees in deciding whether a last-second shot has crossed the line or not.

Substitution area technology

This system provides a detailed view on both substitution areas and offers video assistance in case of decisions that concern the substitution areas. The two cameras will be installed at the timekeeper table's corners. The pictures are accessible for the EHF Delegates in case of an unclear situation with player substitutions. Additionally they are also accessible for the referees in case of any serious situation in the substitution area where they decide to consult the pictures.

Important: These additional pictures are only to be used in case of a situation where an incorrect substitution has already been identified but it is unclear which player is to be punished.

Electronic team timeout request ('Buzzer')

Each team can request the team timeout directly through pushing a button on an electronic device. The button is directly connected to the official scoreboard system and pushing the button will directly lead to a stopping of the time, additionally an audio signal will be initialized to make all involved parties aware of the time-out.

In case of a mistake/misuse related to the team timeout request, all of the following sanctions apply:

- Progressive punishment or direct red card depending whether the action was on purpose or not
- Penalty throw for the team which was in possession of the ball
- Team that caused the faulty timeout request will lose one timeout

Player tracking technology

Match data collection reached new heights at the Men's EHF EURO 2020, thanks to the cooperation between the European Handball Federation and KINEXON, the leading German tracking and analytics company. For the first time at the showcase event of men's national team handball, the EHF EURO 2020 will offer player tracking technology, providing more insights into the game.

The player tracking technology will be joined by the SELECT iBall, the intelligent ball with an integrated chip for data transmission.

The technology has been successfully used at the marquee event in club handball, the EHF FINAL4, and will now premiere at the continental national team competition as well.

During the EHF EURO 2020, tracking sensors in jerseys of all players and the chip in the iBall will collect an unparalleled amount of data around each match. All players will be fitted with the tracking chip, which will be integrated into their playing shirts. The sensor weighs only 14 grams and will not influence the players' on-court performance.

KINEXON anchors will be placed around the court capturing the data from the sensors in the players' shirts and the ball. Fans, coaches and players will be able to see players' running distance, playing time, fastest sprints, highest jumps and fastest goalkeeper saves. In addition, the SELECT iBall will collect information such as ball speed, shot detection, position of the shot and placement of the ball on target.

The match data will be delivered directly to the spectators watching at home via social media and on TV. An extensive report of collected match data will be provided to the participating teams, giving them opportunity to have all information about the team and individual player performance.

All episodes will be available on ehf-euro.com and on every major podcast player.
