EHF EUROPEAN LEAGUE MEN 2020/21 GROUP PHASE

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I INTRODUCTION TO THE NEW SEASON

It is with our great pleasure, for the very first time, to welcome you to the EHF European League Men group phase for 2020/21. As you may have seen over the summer, our European club competitions underwent several changes and, as part of that process, they all received a striking new and impressive facelift. The end product saw a new brand for the EHF unveiled, a process which saw competitions rebranded and renamed.

So welcome to the new-look EHF European League, the new name for our second tier competition, and you will certainly agree that the new logo and colour scheme reflects just how dynamic and exciting this competition is in our handball landscape.

The new, orange-coloured logo, for instance, is an abstract version of the letter 'E', rotating around the sides of a pentagon – the shape which, you will notice, is referenced through all of our club competitions. In its appearance, the logo and brand sound symbolise the energy, toughness and intensity that transform from the action on court and the performance of the teams to the visual presentation of the new competition. Words such as 'tough', 'intense' and 'competitive' spring to mind when one thinks of the EHF European League, and those phrases could not be more fitting for this first campaign as we embark on what promises to be a fascinating group phase. What all fans can be looking forward to most over the next 10 rounds of matches is witnessing a real eclectic mix of teams going head-to-head over the coming months as they fight for their places in the all-important knockout stages.

Seventeen nations across the EHF are represented among the 24 competing teams, which gives this season's competition a hugely diverse combination of styles, further proof of what makes this competition so captivating. What lies in wait for handball fans is a mouth-watering series of matches featuring some of the biggest names in our sport with no easy games for any team. Just one look at some of clubs in the group phase is enough to whet the appetite. With the likes Rhein-Neckar Löwen and Füchse Berlin joining former EHF Champions League winners SC Magdeburg and Montpellier, the race to reach the elimination phase is going to be a battle of epic proportions.

We pride ourselves at the EHF and EHF Marketing on our positive and cooperative relationship with our colleagues from the press and media and we are sure that this will continue to develop in the future. WE PLAY HANDBALL: A NEW BRAND IDENTITY

We play handball. It is what we do, and it is the sport we have had in hearts ever since the European Handball Federation was born back in 1991. In the 29 years that have followed we have kept pace with an ever-evolving society that shapes the way we work and see ourselves. One thing we have not changed, however, is our commitment to staying true to the origins of handball. This spirit of an active, social community is a core part of the handball DNA even today. Since the European Handball Federation was founded, we have served each national federation, each club, thousands of players and millions of fans with respect, honesty and transparency.

A fresh approach to logo design

At the heart of the new approach is an updated and fresh representation of how the origins and successes of European handball are communicated, expressed and promoted. Therefore, subtle alterations have been made in the visual presentation of the EHF and its associated competitions with a newly developed design, created to offer consistent communication of the new handball umbrella brand across all European competitions. The shape of a handball itself is referenced throughout the entire EHF brand system. On a national team level, the circular shape of the ball is used to empower all national team competition logos.



The new, orange-coloured logo is an abstract version of the letter 'E', rotating around the sides of a pentagon. It makes reference to the EHF, while the pentagon derives from the shape of a handball's tile and is used in the new EHF brand system to empower the club competitions.

In its appearance, the logo and additional elements that will be used in the EHF European League's imagery symbolise the energy, toughness and intensity that transform from the action on court and the performance of the teams to the visual presentation of the new competition.

New claims, same aims

We do play handball. We always have and always will – but the European Handball Federation does more than that. The new era is an opportunity for the EHF, EHF Marketing, players, fans and officials to not only celebrate what has been achieved so far, but to strengthen core values and beliefs from which the EHF has been built on and make handball an even greater success story. While the new brand identity heralds the start of a new era, our goals remain the same as they have always been: to encourage the public to pick up a ball and join their local club; to promote the highest profile matches on television and across our digital ecosystem; and to motivate fans to experience the spine-tingling atmosphere of a live match inside Europe's biggest handball arenas.

We are all part of the game, so if you are ready, we will let the new era begin...

BRAND SOUND

As part of a holistic brand experience strategy, sound is an essential brand asset. Together with the sound agency WESOUND, EHF and EHF Marketing developed an acoustic identity for their brands, reflecting and representing the core of handball. Much like the visual brand identity, the brand sound identity will acoustically connect the various leagues and tournaments which fit under the EHF umbrella.

A modern brand sound approach is part of the vision of positioning handball as the most attractive indoor sport and it supports the goal of attracting a younger audience. Through the coherent and consistent use of unique and recognisable sound elements together with the consistent graphical picture conveyed, an improved connection of the competitions and their followers will be achieved.

For the EHF Brand Sound, the authors got to the core of "The Sound of Handball" and created a handball sound DNA as the recurring element across all audio-visual applications. The jump shot was identified as the most iconic and defining handball movement. Through video analysis and motion tracking, the jump shot was extracted into a rhythmic design pattern.

In the case of the EHF European League, the toughness and intensity of the sport was translated into a modern sound design through a new EHF European League sound logo and anthem. Both will come to life in the arena and will consistently complement all audio-visual communications.



I HOME OF HANDBALL

1 July saw the launch of the newly designed Home of Handball website. The European Handball Federation and EHF Marketing in cooperation with Kraftwerk, the number one digital agency in Austria, are excited to introduce a new home and single hub for all fans, friends and the entire family of handball. The old website was calling for an overhaul and needed rejuvenation, both visually and functionally.

In a first step, the decision has been taken to merge the many different web assets onto one and from 1 July, the websites of the EHF Champions League, EHF European League, EHFTV, EHF FINAL4 and EHF Marketing as well as EHF national team competitions are all to be found under one single EHF roof with: eurohandball.com.

One of the main goals was to best represent the EHF's personality, culture and spirit, thus the new corporate identity. A newly-developed brand strategy will be reflected on every page, providing a modern, professional and comprehensive look and feel. Every competition is presented in its very own premium colour pallet, easily distinguishable and featuring elegant new logos. Another one of the key objectives was a 'mobile first' strategy to accommodate mobile users. A team of designers and developers kept this focus throughout the process, ensuring the site will function on all devices.

A key element in functionality is the so-called "Home of Handball-button" on the new website. It is located at the bottom centre of the page ensuring quick navigation to key features such as 'Competitions', 'TV', 'Teams', 'Tickets', 'Home' and 'More'.



Furthermore, to ensure a real-time information stream of ongoing or upcoming handball matches EHF, EHFM and Kraftwerk have developed a Live Ticker located at the very top of the page which allows the handball community to stay on the ball at all times. The Live Ticker provides live match results and follows the user on their entire journey through the new Home of Handball.

I NEW SOCIAL MEDIA SET-UP

To reflect the new digital set-up with the Home of Handball website, the EHF's social media channel structure has been adapted accordingly. Overall, there are three pillars to the EHF's social media presence:

- Top competitions keep their own channels
- 'Home of Handball' approach on website is mirrored
- 'Activities' as the EHF's educational and corporate hub

The EHF European League as the 2nd tier club competition is represented on its own social media channels on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. In addition, there are the newly created Home of Handball channels, which showcase the best content from all EHF competitions, including the EHF European League. Handball fans worldwide can keep up to date with everything happening in European handball, from club and national team competitions to beach handball, all on one channel. This also includes the video-sharing social network Tik Tok, which is mostly used by a younger audience. For the first time, the EHF European League will be featured on TikTok through the Home of Handball channel.

MORE SAVES, MORE GOALS, MORE HANDBALL

For the new era of European handball and together with digital partner DAZN, a campaign for both EHF European League competitions under the claim MORE HANDBALL was created. The basis of the campaign are the toughness and intensity of handball and the characteristics of the EHF European League. Handball is thrilling and fast-paced, intense, tough and passionate. The EHF European League showcases exactly this.

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

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

FACTS AND FIGURES: THE MOST IMPORTANT NUMBERS PRIOR TO THE START OF THE INAUGURAL SEASON OF THE EHF EUROPEAN LEAGUE MEN

The EHF European League Men enters the arena with its premiere season, a new playing system, featuring 24 clubs in the group phase from all over Europe. The field includes two former EHF Champions League winners SC Magdeburg (2002) and Montpellier HB (2003, 2018).

Here are the most important facts and figures before the start of the season:

European Cup debutant - CSKA Moscow are part of the group phase.

1 former EHF Champions League winner - Bidasoa Irun from Spain - failed in the qualification (against CSKA Moscow).

1 coach has won the EHF Champions League four times as a player: Uros Zorman (Trebnje) with Ciudad Real (2006, 2008, 2009) and Kielce (2016).

1 player, who won the last edition of the EHF Cup in 2019 with THW Kiel, can win the trophy in the new EHF European League Men: Lukas Nilsson, who joined Rhein-Neckar Löwen before this season.

2 former EHF Champions League winners -Montpellier Handball (2003, 2018) and SC Magdeburg (2002) - have qualified for the group phase.

2 former Cup Winners' Cup winners have qualified for the group phase: Ademar Leon and Chekhovskie Medvedi.

2 nations - France and Germany - are represented by each three group phase participants. North Macedonia, Russia and Sweden have two teams each in the group phase. 2 coaches had been former Croatian national team coaches and even were head coach and assistant at the same time: Slavko Goluza (Presov) and Zeljko Babic (Pelister).

former top scorers of the merged EHF Cup are part of this season's group phase of the European League Men: Hans Lindberg (Berlin, top scorer in the 2016/17 and 2017/18 seasons) and Momir Rnic (Metalurg, top scorer in the 2012/13 season for Göppingen).

2 former EHF Champions League top scorers are part of the EHF European League in 2020/21: Uwe Gensheimer (2010/11 för Löwen, 2016/17 and 2017/18 for PSG) for Rhein-Neckar Löwen and Hans Lindberg (2012/13 for Hamburg) for Berlin.

3 coaches had won the EHF Champions League FINAL4 as coaches: Martin Schwalb (Rhein-Neckar Löwen) with Hamburg in 2013, Ljubomir Vranjes (Kristianstad) with Flensburg in 2014 and Patrice Canayer (Montpellier) in 2018

3 former EHF Cup winners are part of the group phase: Rhein-Neckar Löwen (2013) and Füchse Berlin (2015 and 2018) have won the competition in the new format, SC Magdeburg (1999, 2001, 2007) in the old format.

3 former EHF Cup titles with two different teams under the belt of the new head coach of CSKA Velimir Petkovic, who won twice with Frisch Auf! Göppingen (2011, 2012) and once with Füchse Berlin (2018)

3 Danish teams - including former Danish champions Skjern and the two former EHF Cup Finals participants Holstebro and Bjjerringbro/ Silkeborg - were eliminated in the qualification. 4 teams made it from the first qualification round to the group phase: CSKA, Fivers, Metalurg and Trebnje.

4 of the 24 group phase participants have already been part of EHF Champions League FINAL4 tournaments: Chekhovskie Medvedi, Rhein-Neckar Löwen, Füchse Berlin and Montpellier Handball, the only winner among them (in 2018).

4 of the 24 teams have been part of EHF Cup Finals: the three German sides, Berlin, Löwen and Magdeburg and French side Montpellier.

6 of the 24 teams had been part of the EHF Cup Group Phase in the 2019/20 season: Leon, Nimes, Füchse, Löwen, Magdeburg and Tatabanya.

10 of the 24 teams had been part of the EHF Champions League Group Phase 2019/20: GOG, Montpellier, Eurofarm, Plock, Sporting, Dinamo, Chekhov, Schaffhausen, Presov and Kristianstad.

10 group matches are ahead for each of the 24 teams.

12 teams had directly been set for the group phase.

17 nations from all over Europe represented by the 24 participants: Austria, Croatia, Denmark, Spain, France, Germany, Hungary, North Macedonia,

Poland, Portugal, Russia, Romania, Slovenia, Switzerland, Slovakia, Sweden and Turkey.

20 of the 24 group phase participants have already been part of the EHF Champions League before.

20 times in the old and merged format of the EHF Cup, German clubs won the trophy, including six from seven times in the new format with final tournaments (2013-2019).

20 games at the most are ahead for those four teams, which qualify for the final tournament.

44 matches of two qualification rounds have already been played before the group phase.

49 years is the age difference of the oldest coach of the competition, Vladimir Maximov (Chechov/75) and the youngest, Jaron Siewert (Füchse Berlin/26).

120 group matches decide the 16 participants of the knock-out stage.

148 matches are ahead until the first ever winner of the EHF European League Men is decided, including 28 knock-out matches from the Last 16 to the final.



PLOCK AND LEON HEAD COMPETITIVE GROUP A

Four of the six clubs drawn in group A have played in the EHF Champions League within the last two seasons, which should tell you how hard it is for anyone to predict the four teams that will progress.

ORLEN Wisla Plock look like favourites, though not by a big margin. The Polish side, led by Spanish coach Xavier Sabate, features names that could ring a few bells to handball specialists. Bosnian left back Mirsad Terzic played for Veszprém for 11 years, while Michal Daszek and Niko Mindegia do not have much left to prove on the European circuit. However, Plock's anything but ideal preparation may force them to scale down their ambition.

If the theme for group A is Spanish handball, then Abanca Ademar Leon fit in perfectly. The Spanish side suffered four defeats in as many EHF Cup group phase games last season, but that does not mean they are not a dangerous side. The arrivals of Polish line player Mateusz Piechowski and Champions League-winning goalkepeer Khalifa Ghedbane should reinforce one of the team's weak points last season: defence.

Behind the leading two contenders, we could see four teams fighting to grab the last two Last 16 tickets. Felix Toulouse have not played the former EHF Cup since 2014, but they were a sensation in France last season. And with players like Ayoub Abdi and Luc Steins, they might not stay under the radar for long.

Chekhovksie medvedi have been chasing past glories for a while now. The Russian side took part in the first VELUX EHF FINAL4, back in 2010. 10 years later, they are in the EHF European League group phase, with a young team eager to match their elders' results.

HC Metalurg have also known better days in the past. In 2013 and 2014, the club from North Macedonia reached the Champions League quarterfinals. With the help of Zlatko Horvat, the iconic Croatian right wing, they could recapture some of their former lustre this season.

Fivers, on the other hand, are new to this level of competition, but the Austrian club will try to make the best of their first European opportunity since 2012.

However, it might not be all sunshine and lollypops for Leon this season after letting eight names go during the transfer season. Cadenas will have work cut out to come up with solutions to chinks in their armor as well as attempting to make everything click with the newcomers.

- Cadenas brought the club big success back in 2001 when they won the ASOBAL

It's no secret that ABANCA Ademar Leon are a team currently in development. Cadenas stated himself recently that there is a lot of room for improvement especially in defense. One of the more visible issues from this transitional period is the fact that the club were not able to bolster the right-hand side of the court in pre-season. For two years now, ORLEN Wisla Plock, under the guidance of coach Xavi Sabate, have been implementing a sport development strategy. The 2020/21 season is the third year of this strategy, and the club has been clear that now they are not only in the hunt for domestic titles but are ready for the next step on the international stage as well. And what better stage than the EHF European League for the 'Oilers' to make their mark?

- 10 names leave and Plock welcome eight signings for 2020/21
- Finished runners-up to Kielce in the Polish league for eight seasons in a row
- Also go by the nickname 'Nafciarze,' in Polish meaning the 'Oilers'
- The club has 15 EHF Champions League seasons under its belt

There is a certain freshness about the signings and changes that Sabate has made before this season. Gone are the likes of Zdrahala (37), Igropulo (35) and Sulic (40) and in are Fernandez (24), Komarzewski (21) and Serdio (26). An injection of youth into the dressing room. However, just in case Sabate was worried about the average age of the squad dropping too low and TikTok taking over dressing room proceedings, the Spanish coach did find a balance in signing defensive specialist Mirsad Terzic (37), who he worked with during his time in Veszprém. Jeremy Toto (28) joining from Saint-Raphaël Var Handball and Abel Serdio (26), the Spanish international coming in on loan from Barça, make for an interesting new pairing on the line. The signings do seem like a shift away from the 'old-but-gold' strategy recruitment style in the past. Was this all part of the masterplan? Or is it time for a fresh crack at leaving Kielce's shadow domestically and pushing on for that elusive guarter-final spot in European cup competitions? Whatever the reason, it is a welcome change and will make for interesting watching once the EHF European League group phase gets underway.

CHEKHOVSKIE MEDVEDI



Chekhovskie Medvedi have been an unstoppable force in Russian handball over the past two decades, winning 19 consecutive league titles. However, their ability to compete in Europe has waned over the years and they will compete outside of the EHF Champions League for the first time since 2006.

- The 21-year-old left back Sergey Kosorotov is widely regarded as one of the hottest talents in Russian handball
- Russian international Dmitriy Kiselev returned to Russia last summer, following a short stint at Vardar where he won the EHF Champions League

Between 2008 and 2011, Chekhovskie Medvedi were a force to be reckoned with in European handball with two quarter-final appearances bookending a trip to the very first EHF FINAL4 in 2010. One last foray into the last 16 in 2013 was followed by a year without European handball and with that began the exodus of star players with the likes of Timur Dibirov, Daniil Shishkarev and Dmitry Zhitnikov leaving for pastures new.

With that came six straight group phase exits, where the Russian club would always claim some wins but look likely to progress. This season offers them a new challenge in Europe's second tier and a place directly in the group phase. Their opponents are of a similar calibre to those they faced in groups C and D in the EHF Champions League, so although this may be their true level, there is no guarantee they will flourish.

In a spectacular summer for Macedonian clubs in the transfer market, Metalurg made their fair share of shrews signings as they aim to propel themselves back into contention for European glory.

- Zagreb legend Zlatko Horvat the biggest acquisition of the summer
- Former Vardar coach Zoran Kastratović leading the new-look squad
- Survived two tight qualification rounds, defeating Spacva Vinkovci by three goals and Kriens-Luzern by one

Since Vardar burst back onto the European scene in 2013, Metalurg have suffered a slow and steady decline. Five consecutive group phase exits in the EHF Champions League was compounded last season with an early exit from last season's EHF Cup and being demoted to the third best Macedonian team. Zoran Kastratović took over the reins last year and has been able to build a very solid squad, thanks to serious investment in the club. A number of proven international players have been brought in to complement the likes of the talented 20-year-old right back Martin Serafimov, moves which appear to give Metalurg a chance to make a solid if unspectacular run in the European League. Club manager Zorica Blazhevska echoes that feeling, stating: "My main objective was to stabilise our club and getting it back to the European handball elite. By reaching the group phase it is achieved." Captain Daniel Dupjachanec sees the group phase as an opportunity to help the squad blend. "My primary motivation would be our team to grow match by match. Because playing 10 matches against strong European teams would mean a lot to us in gaining experience and improvement."

Group B is on everyone's lips ahead of the EHF European League Men group phase as Füchse Berlin, the main contender, were thrown in alongside USAM Nimes Gard, Dinamo Bucuresti, Tatran Presov, Sporting CP and IFK Kristianstad.

German club Füchse Berlin, winners of the EHF Cup in 2015 and 2018 and runners-up in 2019, are the main contender in this group and one of the strongest candidates to conquer the EHF European League this year. In addition to the German side, USAM Nimes Gard, who in recent years have achieved excellent results in France, are also in group B.

Tatran Presov, Slovakian champions since 2006/07, also want to demonstrate their quality in group B and in this new competition. Having been extraordinarly dominant in their own country for so long, Presov want to transfer their domestic success to the EHF European League.

Eight-time Swedish champions IFK Kristianstad have played in the EHF Champions League in the past five seasons, but they have a whole new challenge on their hands in the EHF European League. A very tough team, Ljubomir Vranjes' men aim to re-establish themselves as Sweden's top dogs while also becoming a serious contender in Europe.

Sporting CP and Dinamo Bucuresti complete group B. Sporting and Dinamo will meet in a European club competition for the third consecutive season, after facing each other in the EHF Champions League knockout play-off round in the last two seasons.

USAM Nimes Gard won their last major trophy in the 1990s, so is there an end to this barren run in sight? Well, while it could be somewhat premature to cast them as genuine contenders for the title, the club's current trajectory does put them in the upper echelon of EHF European League Men teams. So, what can we expect from the green of Nimes?

- The club celebrates their 60th anniversary this season
- They are four-time national champions and three-time French cup winners
- Had a 25-year hiatus from European cup competitions before their EHF Cup run last season
- Their marquee signings include Michaël Guigou in 2019 and Vid . Kayticnik in 2020

2019/20 was going very smoothly for the French side: they were third behind Paris Saint-Germain and Nantes when the Starligue season was halted by the COVID-19 pandemic. On the international front, they were enjoying a solid EHF Cup campaign with two wins, a draw and only a narrow, one-goal loss, to Rhein-Neckar Löwen. You can be certain that the French outfit will be chomping at the bit to get back on the court and attempt to reignite their good domestic and international form. Last season there was one key figure for Nimes, and his name was on everyone's lips: Elohim Prandi. The 22-year old was understandably snapped up by PSG Handball ahead of this season and his raw talent will be extremely hard to replace at left back. Despite losing their star shooter, team captain and left wing Julien Rebichon is not lacking any confidence in his squad as it is at the moment: "We have a great side, which is able to beat any team; we have vast experience and players with incredible enthusiasm for the game. While we always respect our opponents, we are not afraid of anyone."

Domestically, the Slovakian champions are untouchable with 15 national titles. However, on the international stage they have struggled. Could the European League be the perfect platform for their revitalised squad to break this trend?

- Head coach Slavko Goluza has been in the job since 2017

Head coach Slavko Goluza has been hard at work researching, scouting and signing talent from abroad ahead of this season - sticking to his diverse locker room strategy of years gone by. Goluza said goodbye to Slovakian talent and left back Lukas Urban (25) who signed for Chartres after a strong outing in the EHF Champions League last season (35 goals). But Goluza is far from lacking options with five official left backs. Team captain, Oliver Rabek, Slovenian national team player Nino Grzentic will likely be the main driving force here and young Tomas Recicar will be fighting for court time this season. There have been big changes on the line. Vucko and Djeric have parted ways with the club so Goluza has only one "official" line player this season in Tunisian Jaballah who signed in the summer. But Russian, Roman Tsarapkin will likely share court time with the Tunisian.

The new-look right back position with Anouar Ben Abdallah making his way from Tunisia for his first stint abroad and Brazilian, Guilherme Linhares de Souza, will also need time to gel.

FÜCHSE BERLIN



Füchse Berlin are one of the names you can throw into the "favourites" hat for the EHF European League title. However, in a team scattered with well-known names, there is one name on the beach where people outside of Germany will be scratching their heads, after Bob Hanning & Co. have entrusted the job as head coach to the youngest coach in Bundesliga history.

- Biggest signing of the summer Lasse Andersson coming in from Barça
- The club recruited Stefan Kretzschmar as Sports Director
- Mandalinic, Heinevetter, Kristopans left Berlin in the summer

Füchse Berlin have undergone a bit of a facelift off the court over the last few months with German legendary winger Stefan Kretzschmar joining the club as Sports Director and then most recently Jaron Siewert (previously of TUSEM Essen) being given the role as head coach. The question of Jaron Siewert age (26) seems to follow him around since it was announced he would take over the wheel.

With players in the squad being up to 13 years his senior (Hans Lindberg), it's difficult to avoid getting dragged into the topic of his age. But it's fair to say this is a very unique situation. Siewert is a 'Fox' through and through, playing for the youth team and even making an EHF Champions League appearance for the club at 19. Bob Hanning (Managing Director) has had his eye on the new head coach for a while now. Stating in several interviews that Siewert showed potential as coach even from a young age. The young trainer, got off to a good – but perhaps slightly nervous - start as he won his first tests internationally in qualification for the European League (25:23 & 36:24 wins over HEDO-B. Braun Gyöngyös) and domestically (31:27 against TSV Hannover-Burgdorf) in the German Bundesliga.

Following three seasons competing in the rough and tumble world of groups C and D of the EHF Champions League, Sporting CP should be well-set to deal with the challenges posed in the European League Group Phase. Rui Silva's men already came through one nervy test in qualification, beating Constanta by a single goal, and now have 10 matches to prove themselves a true contender for the crown.

IFK KRISTIANSTAD



Following five straight seasons in the EHF Champions League, IFK Kristianstad have a whole new challenge on their hands in the European League as Ljubomir Vranjes' men aim to re-establish themselves as Sweden's top dogs while becoming a serious contender in Europe.

- World Championship finalist Espen Christensen and former star Markus Olsson among new arrivals
- Lost Valter Chrintz to Berlin shortly before the campaign began
- Defeated Azoty-Pulawy by three goals on aggregate to progress
- First time out of the EHF Champions League in six seasons

Since taking over as coach in early 2019, Ljubomir Vranjes has yet to enjoy much success with the club but with a full season in charge now behind him, we are beginning to see his impact. Kristianstad have enjoyed a perfect start to the season with five wins in the Swedish league and two in European League qualification, the kind of consistency which will be crucial in the toughest group in town. There has been plenty of change in the squad over the summer, including the late move of Valter Chrintz to Berlin, but Vranjes has brought in some serious quality, in the form of Espen Christensen, Emil Frend Öfors and Markus Olsson. Breaking through group B will be a seriously tough task, but few coaches in the competition know the ins and outs of a successful voyage as well as 2014 EHF Champions League winning coach Vranjes.

Captain Olafur Gudmundsson is aware of the challenge ahead but fancies a proper run in Europe. "We always strive to get better and do better than last year and to be able to measure with the top teams of Europe is motivation enough. With a little luck we have a possibility to pass the group phase. We want to go through to the last 16 and develop our game. It will be hard but it is our goal."

FRENCH AND GERMAN HEAVYWEIGHTS READY FOR GROUP C

In a diverse group C of the EHF European League, two former EHF Champions League winners – Montpellier HB and SC Magdeburg – and long-time participants RK Nexe will meet less experienced contenders when it comes to European competition: Besiktas Aygaz, Alingsas HK and HC CSKA. Montpellier and Magdeburg are heavyweights in group C due to their history in EHF competitions. The French powerhouse surprised everyone in 2018 when they lifted the EHF Champions League trophy – but they failed to progress to the Last 16 in 2018/19. Under the helm of Patrice Canayer, who is one of the longest-serving coaches in Europe, Montpellier are eager to show their capability.

Magdeburg have had the taste of success in both the EHF Champions League and the EHF Cup. The German side have not reached their desired goals in recent seasons but with familiar faces they will be a hard nut to crack.

In their 12th consecutive season in Europe's second-tier competition, Nexe will try to keep up with their powerful opponents. Nexe wish to repeat their 2018/19 success, when they reached the EHF Cup quarter-finals, and coach Hrvoje Horvat has gathered young Croatian talents who will have strong support from experienced players.

Alingsas do not have the experience of playing as many group phase matches. Gaining experience and developing young players is the main task in their third group phase appearance at this level. With 2016 EHF Cup winner Niclas Barud as team captain, the Swedish club will try to spoil things for others.

Top Turkish club Besiktas are ready for their second year in the second tier after previous EHF Champions League involvement. Besiktas have been unable to make an impact in Europe so far, but Arin Mufit's team hope that they have found the perfect harmony this season. A special treat for them will be the match against Alingsas, as everyone at the club remembers when they recorded their first Champions League win in 2014.

CSKA are a fresh face in the EHF European League. The newly formed club will play in the group phase for the first time. In qualification round 2, they surprised Bjerringbro-Silkeborg. The key lies in their squad list, which includes former HC Motor goalkeeper Viktor Kireev, Russia international Pavel Atman and Ukraine international Stanislav Zhukov. However, with new coach Vladimir Petkovic, they are only part of the puzzle.

SC Magdeburg are always worth turning in to watch. With an attractive brand of handball, coupled with their ability to beat the best teams around one day, then crash and burn against underdogs the next, they are an ideal fit for the revamped and bolstered EHF European League.

The burning question – do Magdeburg have the killer instinct at this level? Magdeburg have long been considered serious contenders at this level, but have routinely fallen short in recent years. In 2017, the lost the semifinal to EHF Cup Finals hosts and eventual winners Frisch Auf Göppingen, a surprise but not a disaster. The following year was a disaster, however, as they went into the final tournament as hosts and favourites, only to be beaten in the semi-final by Saint-Raphael Var. It would be unfair to call Magdeburg bottlers, seeing as they won the German cup in 2016, but their killer instinct has been lacking in recent seasons. Whether it be the Bundesliga or in Europe, the German club look capable of beating any team on their day but have yet to show up and be counted when titles are on the line. The squad has enough players with medal winning experience to know how its done and the core of the team has remained together under coach Bennet Wiegert for long enough now to expect that something big is on the way.



Dominance in Turkey has not translated to success in Europe for Besiktas Aygaz as they often looked a bit out of place in the EHF Champions League. However, a change of approach in the squad appears to suggest long-term building and their seeding to the European League Group Phase allows them opportunity to learn and grow.

- Second consecutive year in the second tier, following five seasons in the EHF Champions League
 - In a departure from recent years, all but two of the squad have Turkish nationality
 - Müfit Arın, coach since 2004, remains at the helm

When Besiktas made their first breakthrough to the EHF Champions League in 2014, they relied fairly heavily on international players to supplement the inexperienced talent within Turkey. That remained the case throughout their four season stint in the top flight and while they threatened on two occasions to make the breakthrough to the knockout stages, there was no clear sign of progression for the club or national team. The club's change of approach was evident last season as the squad many more young Turkish players. However, they were unable to make an impact in Europe, losing to Sabac in the first round of the EHF Cup on away goals. "This year, our team is structured with young players supported by experienced team mates, aiming to catch a powerful harmony," says team manager and former keeper Mesut Çebi. The young Turkish team will be supported by the likes of Portugal's Hugo Lima, a centre back joining from Rennes, and Latvian Austris Tuminskis.



For most of the past decade, the discussion around the EHF Cup's hot favourites has revolved around the German clubs, well that is not the case in the new-look European League with Montpellier in the mix. Naturally, the restructuring of club competitions has made the second tier much stronger and the inclusion of the 2018 EHF Champions League winners is a clear sign of that.

Montpellier are not just here for a good time, they have their eyes on the prize. With a squad featuring Diego Simonet, Melvyn Richardson, Valentin Porte, Hugo Descat and Marin Sego, they could easily be competing in the EHF Champions League and there is no reason to suggest they will not be major contenders in the new European League. Coach Patrice Canayer knows exactly what it takes to win at this level and wants to be there at the business end of the season: "The ultimate objective is to fight to the end to win a new European title." Their qualification victory over Skjern in round 2's headline encounter was a serious test for them and a sign of the long road to come. Montpellier journeyed through a similarly long campaign en route to European glory in 2018. "My biggest motivation is to achieve a full season. The EHF European League must be within our reach and we will give ourselves all the means to win this competition this season," claims captain Valentin Porte.

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A club that was formed in 1973 to much success, disbanded in 2001 and then reestablished only recently. So, it's a fresh start for this "renewed" club on the European scene and they do not lack confidence.

- new head coach Velimir Petkovic replaced Oleg Kuleshov only one week prior to the group phase's start
 - captain Pavel Atman playing now for his 10th club
- Aleksander Dereven suffered a knee injury and will be out for four months

Team captain Pavel Atman stating that his goals are clear and simple: "To win every competition our team is participating in." Atman eying up his group as sees "two possible contenders for the title and we will meet them already in the group phase: Montpellier and SC Magdeburg." However, the Russian international is tipping someone else for the title: "the main favourite is, in my opinion, another German team – Rhein-Neckar Löwen," Atman added. It's hard to fully judge the level of this team, they looked convincing in one leg of the qualification and a bit shaky in the next. However, their second half performance against Bjerringbro-Silkeborg in leg one, did show us their upper potential.

Before its reestablishment, the club was a very successful entity on the handball scene. And in the 1987/88 season, the club from the capital of Russia took gold in the European Cup (forerunner to the EHF Champions League) after beating TUSEM Essen in the final only due to more away goals.

WORLD CLASS ON THE COURT AND ON THE BENCHES

If you need proof of the significance of the newly formed EHF European Handball League Men, just look at the names that will duel in group D. If we just talk about players, Stipe Mandalinic, Uwe Gensheimer, Andy Schmid, Morten Olsen, Zsolt Balogh and Zarko Sesum are only the top selection of big names. Among the coaches there are more highly decorated handball people: Four-time EHF Champions League winner Uros Zorman, former Croatia national team coach Zeljko Babic, Martin Schwalb, the only German coach who has won the EHF Champions League Men, and former Celje and Serbia national team coach Vladan Matic.

On paper, international stars such as Uwe Gensheimer, Andre Schmid and Lukas Nilsson should make Löwen favourites in group D, but the qualification round already proved how tough the new competition can be for Martin Schwalb's side. After losing their home match against Danish club Holstebro, they profited from their clear away win. Unfortunately for the Lions, their fabulous Swedish goalkeeper duo of Mikael Appelgren and Andreas Palicka is broken, as Appelgren is out after shoulder surgery.

In terms of EHF Cup titles, Zarko Sesum's tally of three makes him the king of the group. Sesum won the trophy with Löwen in 2013, and he won twice more with Göppingen subsequently. The Serbian left back forms part of a world-class back court axis at Kadetten Schaffhausen alongside Hungarian centre back Gabor Csaszar. The Swiss champions will also profit from new arrival Erik Schmidt, who won the EHF Cup in 2018 with Füchse Berlin. When Kadetten face Eurofam Pelister from the handball-crazy city of Bitola, Schmidt will duel with his former Berlin teammate Stipe Mandalinic, one of the biggest signings in the EHF European League 2020/21 season. Like Mandalinic, his countryman Zeljko Babic, previously coach of Meshkov Brest, is new at Bitola.

Two more big names coming from German Bundesliga should boost GOG: Former Bundesliga top scorer Morten Olsen has arrived from TSV Hannover-Burgdorf and line player Anders Zachariassen has joined from SG Flensburg-Handewitt. After facing Pfadi Winterthur in qualification (33:24 at home/31:35 away), the match at Schaffhausen will already be GOG's second trip to Switzerland this season. With former EHF Champions League star Zsolt Balogh in Tatabanya's squad, coach Vladan Matic hopes to make it to at least the Last 16. Balogh's experience should help guide Tatabanya's many top Hungarian talents. Slovenian side Trimo Trebnje, coached by Uros Zorman, had the longest journey to reach the group phase. Trimo Trebnje beat Belenenses twice in qualification round 1, and their qualification was decided in just one encounter against Balatonfüredi KSE. Gal Cirar's fifth and final goal secured the 23:22 victory and their ticket to the group phase.

With two quarter-final appearances in the EHF Cup in recent years, Tatabánya have become regulars in the second tier but not much more than that. With proven international class and some of Hungary's top talents, could this be the season the Tigers enjoy a breakthrough season in Europe?

In a domestic scene dominated by Veszprém and Szeged, Grundfos Tatabánya KC have cemented their place as the best of the rest in recent years with five consecutive third place finishes in the Hungarian league. While the two big dogs are busy fighting in the EHF Champions League, Vladan Matic's men have been making a name for themselves in the second tier, reaching the EHF Cup Quarter-finals on two occasions. But reaching the final tournament has eluded them and that is what you feel will properly put them in the spotlight.

Achieving that this season appears difficult as an incredible 12 players left the club over the summer, ncluding perennial top scorer Milos Vujovic to Berlin, while nine players were brought in. Mixed fortunes in early league games suggests the squad is still gelling and it is still too early to know whether they can finally make the leap to become true contenders at this level.

It has been a while since Kadetten have looked at home on the international stage. However, with an interesting change on the bench and perhaps an update in philosophy, could this be all about to change?

RHEIN-NECKAR LÖWEN



Anything short of a semi-final would be a failure for one of the hot favourites for the EHF European League title this season. Rhein-Neckar Löwen have a new, charismatic face on the beach and brought in some changes to their squad in their quest for domestic and international silverware. The start of the season won't come without its own issues though with three big names being sidelined and finding themselves into a tough group D.

- Martin Schwalb took over the hot seat in summer
- Three new names and one familiar (Baena) have signed with Löwen
- Appelgren, Kohlbacher, Nielsen will sit out start of season with injuries
- 40-vear-old Petersson's last season in handball

The core (quite literally) of the Löwen will miss the start of the season and maybe up until the new year. Their star goalkeeper Mikael Appelgren injured his left shoulder in training and will be out until at least the beginning of 2021. But luckily, Löwen can still count on yet another world class Swedish goalkeeper in Andreas Palicka. On the line, they have to do without the in-form line player Jannik Kohlbacher. The German international injured his elbow during a game back in September and this absence will be a huge gap to fill in both attack and defense. He will for sure miss the start of the European League. With further issues on the line, i.e. Jesper Nielsen being out until the start of 2021, meant that Martin Schwalb needed to act guickly. The 23-year-old Ymir Gislason will now share the workload on the line with Rafael Baena (37) who has (re)signed with the Mannheim club.



I IMPORTANT REGULATIONS

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN TWO OR MORE TEAMS HAVE THE SAME NUMBER OF POINTS

All matches shall be played in accordance with the IHF's current Rules of the Game. Variations on a technical level are possible. All matches of the EHF European League shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

The matches shall be scored as follows:

- a) win = 2 points
- b) draw = 1 point
- c) loss = 0 points

Teams' rankings are obtained by adding up the number of points won.

GROUP PHASE

If two or more teams have scored the same number of points, the ranking will be determined as follows: During the matches of the group:

- a) higher goal difference in all matches;
- b) greater number of plus goals in all matches;

After completion of the group if two teams have scored the same number of points:

a) number of points in matches of the two teams directly involved;

b) goal difference in matches of the two teams directly involved;

c) higher number of goals scored in the away match of the two teams directly involved;

d) goal difference in all matches of the group;

e) higher number of plus goals in all matches of the group;

After completion of the group if three or more teams have scored the same number of points:

 a) number of points in matches of all teams directly involved;

b) goal difference in matches of all teams directly involved;

c) higher number of plus goals in matches of all teams directly involved;

d) goal difference in all matches of the group;

e) higher number of plus goals in all matches of the group;

f) higher ranking in the group phase matchesg) greater number of points in the group phase

* If the ranking of one of these teams is determined, the criteria are consecutively followed until the ranking of all teams is determined.

* If no ranking can be determined, a decision shall be

obtained by drawing lots. Lots shall be drawn by the EHF, if possible in the presence of team managers.

LAST 16 AND QUARTER-FINAL MATCHES

If, after completion of the two matches, both teams have won the same number of points (no extra-time will be played), the teams' standings shall be determined by the following criteria:

a) goal difference

b) greater number of plus goals scored in away match
 c) penalty throws

RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- Prior to penalty throwing, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each until a decision (a winner) is reached, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws

- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may play as goalkeepers.

- The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.

- If scores are equal after the first round of penalty throwing, it shall be continued until a decision is reached. In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).

- In the second round, a decision (a winner) is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.

- Eligible players are players entered in the match report who have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.

- Serious infractions committed during penalty throwing shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be named supplementary.

- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing area.

- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.
