

# **I 4 FORMER CHAMPIONS, 6 TEAMS, 6 COUNTRIES, 6,393 GOALS**

# FACTS AND FIGURES: ALL THE NUMBERS YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE THE QUARTER-FINALS

Who will make it to the EHF FINAL4 Women 2022 in Budapest on 4/5 June? That question will be answered during the EHF Champions League Women 2021/22 quarter-finals.

While Metz Handball have already secured their ticket to the finals tournament, three more participants will come out of the exciting quarter-final pairings, which include six teams from six different countries.

Here are the competition's numbers and stats ahead of the quarter-finals:

- **0** teams from the same country face in the quarter-finals.
- teams have been part of all seven EHF FINAL4 Women events so far; Györi Audi ETO KC lead the way with six appearances.
- 1 team has already qualified for the EHF FINAL4 2022 in Budapest on 4/5 June: Metz Handball.
- 1 play-off pairing was identical to one from the 2020/21 season: Metz vs Dortmund, with the French team advancing both times.

1

team managed to win both their play-off matches: Metz Handball.

- 1 time, Györ have missed the EHF FINAL4 in 2015; once qualified, Györ missed the final only once in 2021, losing the semi-final to Brest Bretagne Handball.
- 1 team have won the trophy at the EHF FINAL4 in consecutive years: Györ, who are the only three-times-in-a-row winners (2017, 2018 and 2019).
- 2 quarter-finalists have not played at an EHF FINAL4 yet: Team Esbjerg and Krim Mercator Ljubljana though both have been in the quarter-finals before.

**3** quarter-finalists played at the EHF FINAL4 last season: winners Vipers, Brest, and Györ.



players can win their sixth CL title this season: Vipers trio Katrine Lunde, Heidi Løke, and Nora Mørk; and CSM's Eduarda Amorim.

- 4 former EHF Champions League winners, including all titleholders since the 2015/16 season, are part of the quarter-finals: Vipers, Györ, Krim, and CSM Bucuresti.
- 4 countries are represented by the seven EHF FINAL4 winners so far: Hungary (4), Montenegro, Romania, and Norway.
- 4 teams from four different countries qualified directly for the quarter-finals: Esbjerg (DEN), CSM (ROU), Györ (HUN), and Vipers (NOR).
- 4 IHF World Players of the Year, with eight titles in total, are involved in the quarter-finals: Cristina Neagu (CSM/2010, 2015, 2016, 2018), Andrea Lekic (Krim/2013), Heidi Løke (Vipers/2011), and Stine Oftedal (Györ/2019).
- 6 countries are represented by the seven teams still in the competition: France (two), Denmark, Hungary, Norway, Romania, and Slovenia.
- 8 matches since the start of the group phase, but none in the play-offs, ended with a draw.
- 9 years have passed since former two-time champions Krim last reached the quarter-finals, in 2012/13.

11

matches since the start of the group phase, but none in the play-offs, ended with less than 45 goals scored.

- 11 nations are represented by the EHF Champions League Women winners so far: Denmark, Hungary (six titles each), Austria (four), Slovenia, Montenegro, Norway (two all), North Macedonia, Spain, Croatia, Russia, and Romania (one all).
- 12 different teams have played at the seven EHF FINAL4 events so far: Györ (six times), WHC Vardar (five), Buducnost BEMAX (four), CSM (three), Rostov-Don, Vipers (two all), FC Midtjylland, Dinamo Volgograd, Larvik HK, CSKA, Brest, and Metz (one all).

# 21

goals was the biggest winning margin in a play-off match: Metz vs Dortmund 62:41.

- 24 matches so far this season ended with a winning margin of 10 or more goals, including one in the play-offs: Metz vs Dortmund 32:19.
- 24 goals was the biggest winning margin since the start of the group phase: Dortmund vs HC Podravka Vegeta 38:14.
- 26 was the highest number of points for a team in the group phase: Györ won the first 13 of their 14 matches in group B before losing the last match against Vipers.
- 29 matches so far this season, but none in the play-offs, ended with 60 or more goals.
- 39 was the lowest number of goals in a single match this season: Rostov vs FTC 19:20; 48 was the lowest number of goals in a play-off match: FTC vs Krim 26:22.
- **41** goals scored was Dortmund's tally over their two play-off matches against Metz.
- 47 matches so far this season were won by the visiting team, including one in the play-offs, when Metz won at Dortmund.
- **63** matches so far this season were won by the home team.

- 69 was the highest number of goals in a single match so far this season, and it happened twice: Györ vs Metz 39:30, and Metz vs Odense Håndbold 38:31; 59 goals was the highest number in the play-offs: Krim vs FTC 33:26.
- **94** goals make Christina Neagu (CSM) the top scorer of the competition so far.
- +117 was Györ's goal difference in group B.
- **471** goals were scored by Györ in the group phase for an average of 33.6 goals per match.
- **314** goals were scored in the six play-off matches for an average of 52.3 goals per match.
- 6,393 goals were scored in total in the group phase (6,079) and in the play-offs (314) for an average of 54.6 goals per match.

# I ROAD TO THE EHF FINAL4 WOMEN 2022



Due to the war situation in Ukraine, all Russian and Belarusian clubs competing in European handball competitions have been suspended until further notice by the EHF Executive Committee on 28 February 2022.

In the EHF Champions League Women 2021/22, this measure involved Rostov-Don and CSKA, who finished second in group A and fourth in group B, respectively.

CSM Bucuresti, who finished fifth in group A and were set to take on CSKA in the play-offs, received a bye into the quarter-final, where they will meet Team Esbjerg.

Metz Handball, as the winners of the play-off tie with BV Borussia 09 Dortmund, were scheduled to play Rostov in the quarter-final, but have now qualified directly for the EHF FINAL4 Women 2022 in Budapest on 4/5 June.

# I IMPORTANT REGULATIONS

# WHAT HAPPENS WHEN TWO TEAMS HAVE THE SAME NUMBER OF POINTS?

All matches of the EHF Champions League Women shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

The matches shall be scored as follows:

- a) win = 2 points
- b) draw = 1 point
- c) loss = 0 points

# **PLAY-OFFS AND QUARTER-FINALS**

If, after completion of the two matches, both teams have won the same number of points, no extra time will be played. The team advancing shall be determined by the following criteria:

- a) larger goal difference
- b) higher number of goals scored in the away match
- c) penalty throws

### RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- Prior to penalty throwing, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each until a decision (a winner) is reached, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws
- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may play as goalkeepers.

- The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.
- If scores are equal after the first round of penalty throwing, it shall be continued until a decision is reached. In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).
- In the second round, a decision (a winner) is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.
- Eligible players are players entered in the match report who have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.
- Serious infractions committed during penalty throwing shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be named supplementary.
- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing area.
- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

# I CSM BUCURESTI (ROU) VS TEAM ESBJERG (DEN)



# First leg: Sunday, 1 May at 16:00 CEST, Bucharest (ROU) Second leg: Sunday, 8 May at 16:00 CEST, Esbjerg (DEN)



- CSM Bucuresti are in the quarter-finals for the seventh time in seven seasons; they reached the EHF FINAL4 on three of the previous six occasions
- CSM will try to return to the EHF FINAL4 in Budapest for the first time since the 2017/18 season, when they finished third
- the Romanian champions have the top goal scorer of the season in their roster: left back Cristina Neagu, who scored 94 times
- Brazilian five-time EHF Champions League winner Eduarda Amorim will make her debut for CSM in the EHF Champions League, after joining from Rostov-Don in April
- from their seven home matches in the group phase, CSM won four times, lost two, and drew one – against Team Esbierg: 29:29
- earlier this season, Esbjerg had narrowly won the home match against CSM: 22:21

- in their third straight EHF Champions League season, Team Esbjerg are aiming for their first EHF FINAL4 Women berth
- Esbjerg skipped the play-offs after their impressive group phase campaign, which saw them gather 23 pionts (three against CSM) and earn first place in group A
- Esbjerg are unbeaten on their home court this season, with six wins and a draw – against Brest Bretagne Handball
- coach Jesper Jensen is eyeing his second success of the season; he led the Danish national team to bronze at the WCh 2021
- Henny Reistad, MVP of the EHF FINAL4 last season, is Esbjerg's best scorer with 77 goals
- five Esbjerg players Henny Reistad, Marit Røsberg Jacobsen, Vilde Ingstad, Kristine Breistøl and Sanna Solberg-Isaksen — won the world title with Norway in December

- has been at CSM since 2014, witnessing 11 coaching changes for the Romanian powerhouse, winning the CL in 2016 with Kim Rasmussen
- since January 2021 also the head coach of the Romanian national team

# Jelena Grubisic

# Goalkeeper

- the longest-serving player at CSM, having signed for the Romanian outfit in 2015
- named the MVP of the DELO EHF FINAL 4 and the best Croatian handball player in 2016, when she lifted CSM in Budapest for their first-ever trophy in the competition
- has only played for four teams in her career; Lokomotiva Zagreb, RK Krim Mercator, Gvör and CSM
- one of the leaders of the locker, usually acting as a DJ during the trips and prior to the matches

# **Tess Wester**

# Goalkeeper

- joined CSM in the summer of 2021 after three seasons with Odense
- played in Emmen and Amsterdam before joining German side Oldenburg at age 18
- scored 'goal of the season' in Germany in 2014/15, and joined Bietigheim that year
- awarded best goalkeeper of WCh 2015 in Denmark, where the Dutch won silver

# **Eduarda Amorim**

## Left back

- Brazlian star, who joined CSM from Rostov in April for the rest of the 2021/22 season
- five-time CL winner, who moved to Rostov in 2021 after 12 glorious years with Györ
- first arrived in Europe from her native Brazil in 2006, joining Kometal Skopje
- World Player of the Year who made All-star Team of CL and WCh numerous times

# Cristina Neagu

# Left back

- four-time IHF Player of the Year, widely regarded as best Romanian player ever
- left Romania in 2013 for Buducnost but returned to hometown club CSM in 2017
- considered quitting sport in 2011, suffering from severe shoulder and knee injuries
- one of the best CL scorers of all time, netted 800 goals in 15 seasons
- widely respected and considered one of the best sportsmen in Romania's history



# **Elizabeth Omoregie**

# Centre back

- born and raised in Greece to a Nigerian father and Bulgarian mother, played for Bulgaria, but is now currently representing Slovenia
- · considered one of the top prospects in the last years, signed with CSM Bucuresti in the summer of 2018
- · started as a track and field athlete, only to take up handball when she was only eight and never looked back
- before starting to play for Krim in 2014, she stopped playing for two years, due to disagreements with her former coach in Bulgaria



# **Yvette Broch**

# Line player



- her first experience in Romania, after playing in the Netherlands, Spain, France and Hungary
- · defensive specialist, which enhances her team's play in defence, but can also score plenty of goals

- in their 27th straight CL season, Krim are in the quarter-finals for the first time in 15 years
- Krim, CL winners in 2001 and 2003, finished group B in sixth position, with 10 points, and only secured their play-off spot in the last group match against Sävehof
- Krim defeated FTC-Rail Cargo Hungaria in the play-offs, mainly thanks to a 32:26 home win in the first leg
- former Krim player Nataliya Derepasko, a three-time CL top scorer, took over as head coach from Uros Bregar in October 2021
- right wing Katarina Krpez-Slezak is Krim's leading scorer prior to the quarter-finals, with 74 goals, just ahead of left back Tjaša Stanko, who has scored 71 times
- Krim have been vastly reinforced with the mid-season arrival of Ana Gros; the Slovenian international and CL 2020/21 top scorer joined from CSKA in March and scored 17 times for Krim in the play-offs against FTC

- the surprise winners of the EHF Champions League last season are still on course to successfully defend their title

# I Brest Bretagne Handball (FRA) vs györi audi eto kc (Hun)



First leg: Saturday, 30 April at 18:00 CEST, Brest (FRA) Second leg: Saturday, 7 May at 16:00 CEST, Györ (HUN)



- Brest have reached the CL quarter-finals for the third time in a row
- last year, Brest won the quarter-final against fellow French contenders Metz and the semi-final against record CL champions Györ before losing the final to Vipers
- only two teams (Krim and Dortmund) had fewer points from away matches in the group phase than Brest, who gathered just five
- however, Brest have lost just once at home this CL season – in their last group match against Rostov
- Brest boast one of the best goalkeeping pairs in the competition, with Cléopatre Darleux and Sandra Toft
- Brest defeated Odense Håndbold 53:51 on aggregate in the play-offs, after losing the first leg in Denmark
- Helene Fauske, who joined Brest having led Herning-Ikast to the EHF Finals 2021, is the team's leading scorer with 81 goals

- Györ have been the dominating force in the CL group phase this season as they won their first 13 matches, but they lost their last group match, against title holders Vipers in Norway
- the record five-time CL winners are striving for their first title since 2019: the 2020 edition of the EHF FINAL4 did not take place amid the pandemic, and Györ lost in the semi-final of the 2021 edition to Brest
- no Györ player has scored more than 46 goals (Ryu Eun-hee) so far this season – less than half of competition top scorer Cristina Neagu's tally – but no less than 10 different Györ players have each netted more than 30 times
- the last time Györ were eliminated in the CL quarter-finals was in the 2014/15 season, when they lost to Vardar
- Györ have a positive head-to-head record against Brest, having lost just once in seven previous games; that loss, though, came in their most important duel: last season's semi-final


